FREDERICTON WON ITS FIRST N. B. H. L. GAME FROM CRESCENTS, SCORE 4 TO 2

Both Teams Played Rough Hockey with Marysville Men the Worse Offenders—About 500 Fans Saw Exciting Contest—Play was Ragged but Fairly Good for Beginning of Season.

Fredericton, 4; Marysville, 2.

That was the result at the Arctic Rink last night, much to the surprise of some of the wise ones who doubted Fredericton's ability to put a team on the ice that could make any kind of a showing. The Crescents were the strong favorites before the game, particularly when it was known that Loggie, who had been playing goal for the Fredericton H. C. in practice, had refused to guard the net in the game with Marysville for some reason known only to himself. Herb Endall the other goal-tender, was out of town and George Clynick was pressed into service. He put up a great game in spite of lack of practice and other handicaps. In fact the work of the two goal-tenders was the feature of the match, Fullerton having the most work to do, as the Marysville forwards were very weak in shooting.

The Fredericton forwards were aggressive and fairly fast, although the ice was rough. Combination play was lacking. There was also a very noticeable tendency on the part of the forwards to bat the puck ahead of them.

The Marysville forwards did not appear to be in as good condition as the local men, and did a lot of offside loafing, as well as slashing and tripping. These foul tactics were displayed prominently in the second half and Fredericton retaliated, with the result that the fence was adorned with players practically all the time. The Crescents finished the game with five men on the ice. Robinson and Robertson were the strong men of the Marysville forward line.

Fredericton had decidedly the better defence, although Archie Sterling did not seem able to strike his usual gait. F. Wade, who was expected to shine at cover point for Marysville, did not get many chances.

Sandy Staples handled the game in good shape, but he might have handed out more penalties to both teams. The crowd numbered over 500 and it looks as if hockey will come into its own again in Fredericton.

FIRST HALF

Marysville started with a rush and took the puck to the Fredericton net. Feeney relieved with a fine rush and Babbitt took it to the Marysville end where it stayed for several minutes. Fredericton attacking hard.

Feeney shot, but Fullerton saved and immediately afterward stopped McLean's hard shot. Fredericton was having decidedly the better of the game. Marysville's offside were frequent.

Dennison took the rubber to the other end but Babbitt carried it back with a fine run. Play went to the Fredericton end. Sterling took the rubber behind the net. Dennison slashed at him and was given three minutes rest. Play stayed at Fredericton's end until Sterling ran down the side only to lose the puck.

MARYSVILLE SCORES

Play saw-sawed a little, but generally stayed at the Fredericton end. Clynick made a couple of good stops only to have Robertson beat him out with a good shot which brought the Marysville crowd to its feet.

DUNCAN EVENS SCORE

Marysville continued the attack. The Fredericton forwards got away on a combination run but an offside spoiled it. The puck went to the Marysville end and Duncan scored from a mix-up.

FREDERICTON TAKES LEAD

Play went to the Marysville end, Feeney shot the rubber into the net, but from an offside. His next shot was all right and the score was 2 to 1 in Fredericton's favor.

Babbitt scored on a magnificent shot from middle ice just one minute later and the crowd stood up and yelled.

Marysville with the score 3 to 1 against them proceeded to dig in and kept the locals on the defensive. The Crescents persisted in playing offside however, with the result that the game slowed down.

The Red and White relieved the pressure, but slack defence play let the rubber again to the Fredericton end. Clynick stopped several shots that were labelled for tallies.

Sandy Staples was pretty sharp on the offside at this stage. Bunky Robinson got through but shot wide. Clynick saved again.

the Fredericton end, there was a long wait. Wade was forced to retire and Brogan went on at point and Hovey went up to the forward line. Half time was called in one minute.

SECOND HALF

Fredericton started well in second half. Babbitt ran along the side but his shot went a little wide. Marysville's forwards took the puck to the other goal. Duncan made a fine run but lost the rubber.

FORWARDS MIXING UP

Forwards began to mix it up along the boards. Rowan upset Dennison and during the rest of the match these two were particularly attentive to one another. Robinson cross-checked Sterling and the Fredericton point retaliated a little later. Robinson was slashing at a great rate all through the match.

Robinson spoiled Jack Feeney's shot. Fredericton played in ragged style and play stayed at the Red and White end. Duncan rushed. Robinson tripped McLean. Babbitt went off for three minutes for tripping. McLean and Feeney were prominent in rushes. Referee Staples warned Dennison for slashing.

FREDERICTON'S FOURTH GOAL.

Fullerton stouped a hot one. Shortly afterwards he was knocked over, but saved a goal. Play went to the Fredericton end, when Feeney got away. He shot, but Fullerton saved. Jack tallied right afterward on a pass from Duncan.

HOVEY NOTCHES ONE.

Play then went to Fredericton's end and Hovey scored, the Fredericton defence giving him a good chance for a side shot.

The remainder of the match was hard and fast, with rough and dirty play in abundance. Dennison and Hovey were both penalized and the Crescents ended the match with five men on the ice.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father-son, daughter, brother or intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence and cultivation of the land in three years. A homesteader may within nine miles of his homestead, on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
