INTERESTING COMPARISON.

St. John Globe:—As to the benefit to be gained by abolishing the license law some doubt will arise in men's minds when they compare the statistics of the St. John and Fredericton police departments. In St. John, under license, 947 arrests for drunkenness were made last year; in Fredericton, under Scott Act, 181 arrests were made. That is to say, the arrests in St. John were about five and one-third times greater than the arrests in Fredericton. The population of St. John is at least five and one-third times greater than in Fredericton. Evidently, prohibition does not materially alter the condition of things, so far as drunkenness is concerned.

DEPARTMENTHL BLDG. OVERCROWDED, MORE ROOM NEEDED

Madras School Building May be Secured—Date Opening of House not Yet Fixed.

The members of the Provincial Government, in regular session this morning, considered the matter of over-crowding in the offices of the Departmental Building and the means of remedying it. It was suggested that the Madras School building on King street might be used to provide extra room. This afternoon the building was inspected by the members of the executive. The offices that are likely to be removed from the Departmental Building are those of the Agricultural and School Book Departments.

KENT COUNTY DELEGATION.

A delegation from Buctouche appeared before the Government this morning concerning a petition presented by the ratepayers of the Parish of Wellington, County of Kent, under the Provisions of Cap. 36 of the Acts of 1903, asking for the cancellation of all wholesale and retail liquor licenses in the Parish. The petition is signed by about 82 per cent. of the ratepayers of the Parish. Messrs. J. B. McCleave and Robert Gallant, hotel-keepers, at Buctouche, appeared before the Government this morning in opposition to the said petition and asked that the question be submitted to the people under the Local Option provisions of the Liquor License Act. Consideration was promised.

LETTERS PATENT GRANTED

The application of the York & Carleton Telephone Company for supplementary letters patent was approved. The application of the Fairville Drug Company for letters patent of incorporation was also approved. The application of the McQuinn Lumber Company for letters patent of incorporation, was referred to the attorney general. The application for the incorporation of E. Paturel Ltd., of Shediac, will be taken up later.

DATE NOT FIXED

Premier Hazen stated this afternoon that the date for the opening of the provincial legislature had not yet been fixed. It is generally thought that Thursday, Feb. 16th., is the most likely date for the opening of the house.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

The members of the executive attended a meeting of the Board of Education at three o'clock this afternoon and resumed business of the executive council later.

OROMOCTO BAPTISTS THANK FRIENDS FOR ASSISTANCE

The dedicatory services of the Oromocto United Baptist Church were held on Jan. 8th. Rev. F. E. Bishop, supt. of U. Baptist Home Missions of N. B. preached at all three services of the day. His discourses were appropriate, instructive and strong presentation of Gospel truth. David Patterson, United Baptist pastor was present and Rev. Mr. Helps, Methodist pastor, assisted in the morning and evening services. Miss Gladys Ward presided at the organ and the members of the Methodist choir aided in the musical part of all services. Before the formal dedication of the church the balance of indebtedness was provided for. So the church was dedicated free from the burden of debt. There has been expended \$1250 all of which has been raised since Oct. 18, 1909 with the exception of \$110 raised during the pastorate of Rev. James Copeland. For this marked blessing in securing means to build, the church takes this opportunity to thank those who were the channels through which the aid came. The donors represent all creeds and many places far and near, while the donations range from twenty cents to two hundred dollars. The building is what used to be known as the Temperance Hall. This with the land on which it stands was secured and donated by Mrs. E. E. Estabrooks. The building committee were: Chester Smith, chairman; D. Patterson, Sec. Treas.; Charles L. Ward, Robt. J. Smith and John Ball. The contractor was W. H. Ward of French Lake whose care and interest are shown in the durable and neat appearance of the work.

DEED IN MONCTON

Word was received here today of the death of Jennie Babbitt, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. K. Parlee of Moncton. The child was eight months old and had been ill but a short time. The remains will be brought here Friday evening. Interment will be made on Saturday. Mr. and Mrs. Parlee have the sympathy of their many friends in their bereavement.

GRAND FALLS POWER COMPANY ORGANIZED

Details of Organization Will Be Made Public Later—Sir William Van Horne Concerned.

The Grand Falls Power Company which is to develop electric power at Grand Falls, has been organized but details concerning the company have not been made public yet. Mr. A. J. Gregory, K. C., of this city, who represents some of the gentlemen concerned, stated this morning to a reporter of The Mail, that details of organization of the company would be made public later, as it was not considered advisable to make any statement concerning the matter at the present time. Several gentlemen concerned in the company were in Montreal early this week at which time arrangements concerning the organization were made. Sir William Van Horne is one of those who are interested in the development at Grand Falls. Mr. Jas. Robinson, ex-M. P., of Miramichi, is also interested in the company.

U. N. B. NOTES

At a general meeting of the student body of U.N.B. at noon today the resignation of H. C. Belyea '11 as president of the Glee Club was accepted.

M. W. Jennings '11 tendered his resignation as hockey manager but reconsidered the matter at the wish of the student body.

At the close of the meeting H. G. Deedes, as president of the Athletic Association, presented a gold medal suitably engraved to H. W. Binney '13 who broke the record for the 220 yards dash at the U. N. B. sports last May making a mark of 24 1/2 seconds for the distance.

The record was formerly held by Stanley Bridges '08.

The final trial debate for the Debating Team candidates has been postponed until after the honor exams it will probably be held on Feb. 6th or 7th.

The basketball team has not yet arranged any games but will probably bring a St. John team, either the Exmouths or Y.M.C.A. here next week. St. Andrews and Eastport will play here later in the season and the U.N.B. team will make a return trip about Easter. Just at present the U.N.B. management is corresponding with Upper Canada teams with a view to an extended tour.

JUDGMENT FOR ROWAN BROS. IN COUNTY COURT

Court Adjourns Until Two O'Clock Tomorrow Afternoon—Record Withdrawn in Two Cases.

Today's business at the York County Court before Judge Wilson consisted of the hearing in the assessment of damages case of Rowan Bros. vs. Ruddock and the disposal of two side-bar rules.

JUDGMENT FOR \$317

Mr. J. J. Winslow moved for judgment for \$317 in the former case which was an action brought for work and labor in connection with the towing of logs. It was not contested and judgment was given the plaintiff for the full amount \$317. This was a non-jury case.

Owing to the absence of Mr. McLellan now in New York, the trial of the case of McLellan vs. Morgan was postponed till tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock, the court meanwhile standing adjourned.

MADE RULES OF COURT

Two side-bar rules, one in the case of Coburn H. Allen vs. Brooks Edmondson and the other William Jennings vs. Wm. P. Barker, were on motion of Mr. Phinney, K. C., made rules of court. By the granting of these orders in the first case effect is given to the decision of the Supreme Court granting defendant an appeal, and in the second case the executor of plaintiff has judgment confirmed. In the cases of Olsen vs. McLaughlin and Schmidtman vs. McLaughlin record has been withdrawn.

TO LEAVE CHATHAM.

A Chatham despatch says:—At a meeting of the directors of the Father Morrissey Medicine Company, held on Saturday, it was decided to move the company's business to Montreal, where, it was stated, better facilities would be available for the carrying on of their largely increasing business. Some representatives of the local board of trade subsequently interviewed the directors with the object of finding out if terms could be arranged with the town under which the company would remain, and the president, R. O'Leary, of Richibucto, stated that in any case the company's office would be moved, but if exemption from taxation could be had for ten years the company would keep its factory here.
