KENNEDY WINS HIS CASE IN THE SUPREME COURT

Peculiar Finding of the Jury Goes Against Decision by Supreme Court in June.

The case of Martin Kennedy plaintiff and Margaret Gorman and Michael Gorman defendants was concluded Saturday afternoon at 5.30. The jury after being out all afternoon brought in a verdict for the plaintiff. The jury was divided as to whether or not the real line of Cork Settlement as located by the Crown Land Office and as shown by the plans in the Crown Land Department was correct; and therefore did not give the plaintiff the full amount of his claim. The plaintiff claims that the Crown Land plans are correct; the defendants contend that these plans are not correct. The jury found that the defendants had cut hay on Kennedy's land and gave him damages accordingly. This will throw the costs of the suit on the defendants.

SECOND TRIAL

The trial extending over last week was the second trial of the same suit the first being held here at the last June sittings. The jury then found for the defendants. One of the chief points of contention then as now was as to the location of the rear line of the Cork Settlement lots. This line had been originally run by Deputy Surveyor O'Connor in 1848. Mr. A. E. Hanson of this city was sent by the Crown Land Department in 1903 and retraced a part of it; Deputy Surveyor C. L. Tracy under instructions from the Crown Land Department established this line located by Mr. Hanson as the correct line the Crown Land Department adopted it and entered it upon the official plans of the Department. In June the jury found that this line was not correct and that another line contended for by the defendant was the correct line. Upon appeal the Supreme Court set the verdict aside on the ground that no jury could reasonably come to any conclusion other than that the line contended for by the plaintiff and accepted by the Crown Land Department was correct. By the verdict on Saturday the second jury, although divided on the point has refused to be bound by the judgment of the Supreme Court and by the records of the Crown Land Department and by the calculations and official returns of the Deputy Surveyors.

APPEAL POSSIBLE

Neither side is satisfied and both are talking of another appeal. McLellan & Hughes were the attorneys for Plaintiff Kennedy both in this trial and the appeal to the Supreme Court which set aside the verdict obtained by the Gormans last June and O. S. Crockett acted for the defendants.



NEW ST. DUNSTAN'S SCHOOL BUILDING OPENED TODAY

Owing to Delay in Forwarding of Furniture Primary Department Room Will Not Be Occupied For Some Days---Building Cost About \$30,000.

The schools reopened today after the Christmas vacation with a large attendance of scholars. On account of today's storm the term had to begin with a half session. The feature of the opening of the term was the removal of the pupils and teachers from the Regent Street school which until today had been housed in the first story of St. Dunstan's Hall, to the fine new St. Dunstan's School building which has been erected on Regent street beyond Needham street. The entire session was devoted to placing the

children in their rooms in the new building and getting them acquainted with the arrangement of the various rooms and corridors. Mr. Chas. A. Sampson secretary of the Board of School Trustees was present at the opening of the new building and assisted Principal Hughes and the other teachers in making the necessary arrangements. Some of the School Trustees also visited the new building.
