BOSTON EXPECTS TO SEE GREAT HOCKEY THIS WEEK

Wanderers and Champion Ottawas Will Play at Hub on Wednesday and Saturday.

(Boston Globe)

Two of the greatest hockey matches this section of the country has ever seen will take place Wednesday and Saturday nights at the Arena, when the Ottawa champions and the Wanderers of Montreal, the foremost professional teams in the world, will play for a purse of \$2,500.

It will be the first professional competition in hockey Boston has known.

To Ottawa belongs the undisputed title of world's champions. They are holders of the Stanley cup, the trophy that goes to the best team in Canada, and the Wanderers, the title winners a year ago, gave the champions a hard tussle for final honors this winter.

The conditions of the two matches at the Arena are that the gross scores of the two games shall decide the winner of the purse, so the teams will be forced on both occasions. Each contest will be divided into three 20m periods.

The Montreal seven is one of the most expensive that ever stood on skates. Art Ross is one of the players who actually received \$10 a minute for every Stanley cup game he played, till the ban was put on high prices.

Ottawa has scored 13 wins in 14 games this year. The team won 10 straight, then lost three through a series of accidents and illness and wound up with two wins.

Each of the Ottawa regulars started out as a forward. Up in Canada every player must be a scorer and Ottawa has six players who are great men caging the puck. It is said that the scoring ability of the team is the secret of the success this season.

Percy Lesuer is captain of the team and plays goal, where he has been stationed five years. He has no superior in Canada. Fred Lake at point weighs 178 pounds. He has only one eye, losing the other when he first broke into the professional ranks, but in spite of this fact he is considered the best man in his position in Canada.

Jack Darragh is the youngster of the team and is a sensation as a rover in the forward line. Marty Walsh, the center, is the champion scorer of the N. H. A. He is a graduate of Queen's college. Bert Kerris is rated as the fastest forward among the professional issues and will be a revelation to those who have fancied Jack Spratt of St. Michael's was the top-notch man of Canada.

Alperman and Wilhelm, former Superbas, have just reported for practice to John J. "Jazz" of the Rochester Eastern league team.

John Coveleskie, a younger brother of Harry Coveleskie, who has dropped back into the minors, is being given a tryout by the St. Louis Browns.
Devereaux J. Peters, the Santa Clara college lad signed by Connie Mack, can go some on the cinder paths. He has run, according to the college record, the 100 yards in 10 1-5 seconds and the 220 yards in 23 seconds.

Gambler have invaded the Southern League and chalked up their prices on the coming race. Chattanooga are made favorites at 8 to 5, with New Orleans second choice, and the rest strung out at all kinds of figures up to 60 to 1.

George Mullin will pitch Detroit's opening game. This will be his sixth performance on an opening day. Mullin has never had a sore arm, so his workouts in the spring put him into condition quickly. He has been with Detroit since 1902, so is the oldest player in point of service.

He will have his first show next Friday night.

Billy Melody and Bill Hurley have been matched to box at Glens Falls, N. Y., next Monday night.

In addition to the 12-round bout between Hugo Kelly and Bill McKinnon next Tuesday night at the Armory A. A., there will be six-round bout between Joe White and Freddie Young McDonough and George Perry and Joe Geary, and an eight-round bout between Joe White and Freddie O'Brien.—Boston Globe.

RIGGERT AND PERRY WILL REMAIN WITH RED SOX

Two Youngsters Who Are Showing Great Form—Boston Americans Look Good so Far.

A summary of the work of the Red Sox players on their spring practice trip reveals the fact that the team has picked up a few newcomers who are bound to remain in the big show. Two of the new men are outfielders and to date have done better work than the two veterans whom they are seeking to replace. These promising players are Riggert and Perry, and there is no doubt of their being retained after the spring trip is over, for they have exceeded the fondest hopes of manager Donovan by their excellent all-round work.

Three others of the newcomers who have shown to advantage and who look good for retention are Yerkes, short-stop, a Carolina league star; Mahoney, formerly of Holy Cross, who has been playing centerfield, and Nebinger, a third baseman, who has caught the eye of the coast fans and the baseball writers by his sure, all-round work at the third sack. In addition he has shown up surprisingly well with the stick. Yerkes has been hitting the ball consistently and his fielding has been above the average.

Engle looks to be the selection for first base this season. His work on the coast has been satisfactory to manager Donovan, and the young man has put his whole heart in the game with the result that he is batting better than last season or any other since he was introduced into major league company. He has both Myers and Bradley beaten for the first sack in a walk.

Sp'aker has been doing his usual superb hitting and he leads the regular members of the team in batting. Tris is in shape for a season's hard work. Both Wagner and Harry Hooper are doing very well. Lewis and Gardner have not so far given very good accounts of themselves, but no doubt will be as effective as ever when the bell rings for the opening game.

Though Janvrin and Preipke have shown up strongly in the field, they have been weak with the stick, and the chances are they will see more of the bench than the field.

The pitchers have been taking things easy, with the exception of the ambitious youngsters. Neither Collins, Hall, Karger, Wood S. Smith, C. Smith, Arellanes nor Oicotte has over-exerted himself. The baseball men speak very highly of Killaly, Pierce and Pape.

The catchers are acquiring form slowly. Carrigan is not yet hitting in his old form, while Madden is several points shy of his usual work. The latter is catching well, but not meeting the ball with any degree of success.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
