## VICTIMS OF ACCIDENT WANT DAMAGES

Montreal, Aug. 25—Actions involving several thousand dollars, were started in the civil courts yesterday, an echo of the King Edward Park accident on June 25th last, when several patrons of the park were precipitated into the water, as a result of the collapse of a portion of a board walk. The actions are for damage to person or clothing. The three principal claimants are Dame Lea Frappier, who sustained a fracture of the arm, and collar-bone, wants \$1,900. Dame Ada Kirkland, claims \$1,500 for a severe injury to the spine. James McLaughlin demands \$1,000. The other claims filed cover damages to and loss of clothing, personal effects etc.

## CHILDREN HAD THIEVES ARRESTED

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 25—Blanche Edward Edwards and L. J. Launders, fifteen year old children, were responsible for the arrest last night of two men, whom they saw assault and rob an aged man at the Grange. They saw the victim dragged through the grange entrance and his assailants leave the grounds and followed them until they sighted a policeman. The alleged robbers were taken into custody, and said they were Charles Martin aged 25 years and Wm. Cassart 50 years both of Toronto.

## BATTLESHIP UTAH COMPLETE

Philadelphia, Aug. 25—The giant battleship Utah will be turned over to the Government at the League Island Navy Yard tomorrow by her builders, the New York Shipbuilding Company of Camden. The Utah and her sister ship, the Florida, now nearing completion at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, are the latest and mightiest fighting units in the United States Navy and one of the other will supersede the Connecticut at the flagship of the Atlantic fleet.

The Utah was built and equipped in record time and when turned over to the Government tomorrow will have taken only a little over eighteen months to be made ready for active service. It is expected a speed of 22 knots will be made by the vessel, propelled by the enormous turbine engines of the Parsons type. She is the first of the large battleships to use these turbines.

When completely manned the Utah will carry 1,000 officers and men, and will have the largest steaming radius of any vessel at present in commission because of the unique feature of the oil tanks constructed along the bottom of the ship, which will carry a large quantity of fuel oil to be used under specially arranged boilers.

## NATIONAL STOCK CHASSIS RACES

Elgin, Ill., Aug. 25—The national stock chassis races, the biggest events in the way of automobile contests that the West will see this year began over the three and a half mile Elgin circuit today and will conclude tomorrow. The entry list is unusually large and the arrangements made by the Chicago Motor Club, which is in charge of the events, are pronounced of the most perfect character. With favorable weather conditions for the two days the meet is expected to be one of the most successful of its kind ever pulled off in America.

## IMMIGRANT RUSH TO CANADA CONTINUES

Ottawa, Aug. 24—During the month of July there were 29,621 immigrant arrivals in Canada, 18,609 at ocean ports and 11,012 from the United States. As compared with July of last year the increase is seventeen per cent. For July last year the figures are 16,019 at ocean ports and 3,193 American.

For the four months of the current fiscal year, the arrivals at ocean ports numbered 127,925 and from the United States 54,814, making a total immigration from April to July inclusive of 182,739. The corresponding months last year gave 100,872 at ocean ports and 4,699 Americans, making a total of 105,571.

## OCEAN GREYHOUND FOR HAMBURG LINE

London, Aug. 25—The new Hamburg American liner which is being built in Stettin for the trans-Atlantic service is to be named the Imperator. She will be larger than any craft yet afloat, and on her present condition on the ships at Stettin she presents a wonderful spectacle. The huge vessel appears something like the skeleton of an eleven story skyscraper, in course of construction as she stands fully 100 feet high, is nearly ninety feet in beam and has a length of 710 feet. The Imperator's displacement will be 150,000 tons and she will provide accommodation for 5,000 passengers of all classes.

## GREAT INCREASE IN CANADA'S TRADE

Ottawa, Aug. 24—The near prospect of the coming into force of the reciprocity agreement is evidently having no effect in restricting Canada's trade.

Another increase of more than \$5,500,000 in the total trade of the dominion was registered last month. Imports and exports for the month totalled \$67,151,284, an increase of \$5,694,714, as compared with July of last year.

For the first four months of the current fiscal year the total trade has been \$249,031,772, an increase of \$16,401,512 over the corresponding period of last year.

Imports have totalled \$156,967,380, an increase of \$13,645,357. The customs revenue for the four months has totalled \$25,454,808, an increase of a little over \$3,000,000.

## EDITORS AT WICHITA FALLS

Wichita Falls, Aug. 25—Nearly the entire membership of the Northwest Texas Press Association was assembled here today at the opening of the association's annual convention. The sessions will continue over tomorrow.

Yvette Guilbert, who will appear in concert under the management of R. E. Johnson, will bring an orchestra of seven to accompany her on old fashioned instruments in a sketch called "An Evening with Marie Antoinette at Versailles."

## PLANNING TO WELCOME SIR WILFRID LAURIER

(St. John Telegraph)

Preparations for the reception of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and for the great Liberal demonstration Monday evening have been completed and the occasion will be marked by a display of enthusiasm which will show in no uncertain manner the loyalty and strength of the Liberal party in this constituency.

A reception committee consisting of the mayor of the city, the president of the board of trade, and a large number of prominent citizens, will officially welcome the premier to the city and, if time permits, an address will be presented to him at the station. From the depot he will be escorted to the Royal hotel, where he will be entertained during his stay in St. John.

At the rink preparations are being made for a crowd of at least 8,000 persons. Seating accommodation will be provided in the auditorium for about 5,000, the platform will seat another 400, and there will be standing room for about 2,500. A stand is being erected outside the rink from which the premier will review the procession, and this will also be used as a speaker's platform if it is found necessary to hold an overflow meeting out of doors.

F. J. G. Knowlton, chairman of the Liberal executive, will preside at the meeting and the speaker will include Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. Wm. Pugsley James Lowell and members of the premier's party.

## WOTES ON COMMISSION PLAN

Knoxville, Tenn., Aug. 26—A special election was held in Knoxville today to decide the question of the proposed amendment of the city charter so as to provide for the commission plan of government. Advocates of the commission plan, including nearly all the business men of the city, have waged a vigorous campaign in its behalf and are confident that the final results of the balloting will show a substantial majority in favor of the charter amendment.

## CALIFORNIA STATE FAIR

Sacramento, Cal., Aug. 26—The California State Fair was formally opened this morning under auspicious conditions. The management has been working hard to make the exhibits of more than ordinary interest, this year and the result has been the largest and best collection of agricultural, horticultural and live stock exhibits ever shown here. The entertainment features also are of an unusually high class.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
