FREDERICTON--

MARATHON GAME NOT MATERIALIZED

Attempt to Arrange Series Made But Was not Successful--Local Club Stands by Decision

The baseball situation as far as Fredericton and St. John is concerned remains unchanged. For a while last night it looked as if a series of games with the Marathons would be arranged. Manager D. B. Donald's defe published in yesterday's St. John papers together with the announcement that a deposit of \$250 had been put up caused a number of local men to make the attempt to get the two teams together. The gentlemen mentioned offered to finance the team for the series.

A meeting of the Fredericton Baseball Club was held last evening to consider the matter. After some discussion, it was decided that to be consistent the club could not consent to the players of the Fredericton team having any dealings with the St. John Marathons while D. B. Donald was manager of the latter. St. John parties were communicated with by telephone and the proposition of "canning" Mr. Donald submitted. The reply was that the St. John people could not see their way clear to let "D. B." go.

JIMMY McALEER MAY CONTROL THE WASHINGTON TEAM

Detroit, Aug. 24--Officials of the Washington Club admit that James R. McAleer, at present manager of the Nationals, may become a stockholder in the club. Officials of the club are anxious to have McAleer associate himself with them financially as they believe that a manager who has money invested will be all the more interested in the success of the team.

Rumor has it that if McAleer should be chosen president of the club he would quit the managerial end devoting all of his time to the business end while he is said to be grooming George McBride to handle the team.

McAleer's name was not long since connected with an effort to buy an interest in the Boston Americans.

UHLAN MADE NEW TROTTING MARK AT GOSHEN

On Half-mile Track Great Trotter Came Close to Best World's Time--Doc Tanner Up

Goshen, N. Y., Aug. 24--A crowd of 8,000 people turned out to witness the third day's racing of the grand circuit. Pres. F. D. Underwood of the Erie, came up from New York in a special train. C. K. G. Billings also came up from New York in a special train to see his champion Uhlans go against time, the feature of the afternoon's program.

There was a slight sprinkle of rain before Uhlans started a few minutes after three o'clock on what proved to be a record breaking mile. "Doc" Tanner was up behind the gelding and he was paced by a runner that kept a length or more behind him during the entire mile.

The eighth pole was reached in 15 seconds, quarter in 31, half-mile in 1:01, three-quarter post in 1:32 and mile in 2:02. This is a new world's record over a two-lap course and will probably stand for some time.

The mile was perfect and well rated. "Doc" Tanner and Uhlans received ovation when the time was announced. The best previous record here was 2:08, made Wednesday by Willy.

2:17 TROT.

Shaw Bay drew the pole in the 2:17 trot, but The Shoplifter soon forged ahead and set the pace. Coming down the home stretch, Shaw Bay, The Shoplifter and Chatty Direct were all bunched and the latter won by half a length from Shaw Bay.

The second heat Baden came under the wire a winner. Chatty Direct made a break coming down the stretch, the first time round in this heat and fell back two or three lengths. The mare made a strong drive for the heat, but went up again a short distance from the wire and was only able to finish third.

Robert Milroi, who was 5 to 4 in the other two heats, came to the front in the third heat and won handsily and also captured the next two heats and race.

2:10 PACE.

There were ten starters in the 2:10 pace. My Shady Belle drew the pole and set the pace in the first heat, winning in a close finish with Hal B Jr. The latter proved too speedy for the field in the next heats and went around the leader early and was able to come home a length ahead of My Shady Belle. The third heat was the fastest of the race, 2:07, and was won easily by Hal B Jr, who also captured the fourth heat and race.

There was a good lot of colts out for the three-year-old trot. Manly Guy, owned by David H. Young of Holyoke, Mass., finished half a length ahead of Kalaria in the first heat in 2:19. The next heat she won by two lengths and stepped in 2:16. Roy Miller finished second with Lady Lurgan.

During the latter part of the 2:17 trot and 2:10 pace rain fell and the track was a trifle heavy. It is raining hard tonight and the indications are that the races may be postponed.

RAIN SPOILED GRAND CIRCUIT RACES AT COLUMBUS

Neva Todd and Nutmore Winners in 2.12 Trot and 2.09 Pace--Independence Met Success

Columbus, O., Aug. 24--Rain put a heavy crimp into the doings at the Columbus driving park today. The elite trotters composing the 2.05 class which field broke a world's record last week, and the three trotters, Joan Soprano and Hailworthy, in the Madden trotting sweepstakes, were all kept from the slippery course, their events going over to Friday, when a card of five races will be started at noon in an effort to complete the program.

Morning rains kept the field from the track until 3 o'clock. According to the contract for the Madden stake the track was to be good and the day fair when the race came off. Drivers agreed not to start until Friday for that reason.

The three starters all posted their \$1000, which with the \$1000 the association added and the \$500 forfeit money of V. L. Schuler, owner of Sterling McKinney, will make the stake valued at \$4500.

The races today included the 2.12 trot an over-night event for horses that had not won money earlier in the meeting, and the 2.09 pace, each won in straight heats, the victor scarcely turning a hair.

Nutmore with a half mile track record of 2:06 had his pacing field at his mercy and never had to extend himself. The time was of course slow on account of the bad track.

In the trot, Neva Todd won as she pleased. Viola Strong, favorite before the race, finished outside the money.

It was announced that Independence Boy will be laid up until the Indianapolis meeting, week after next. He will not appear at either the Readville or Hartford meetings, swinging back into the circuit again at Syracuse. He will ease up until then on account of the condition of his knee.

Pres. Swisher of the Columbus driving association today announced that the independent meetings had been so successful that meetings of this sort would be given entirely in the future, "patterning after the Lexington meetings. The summary:
