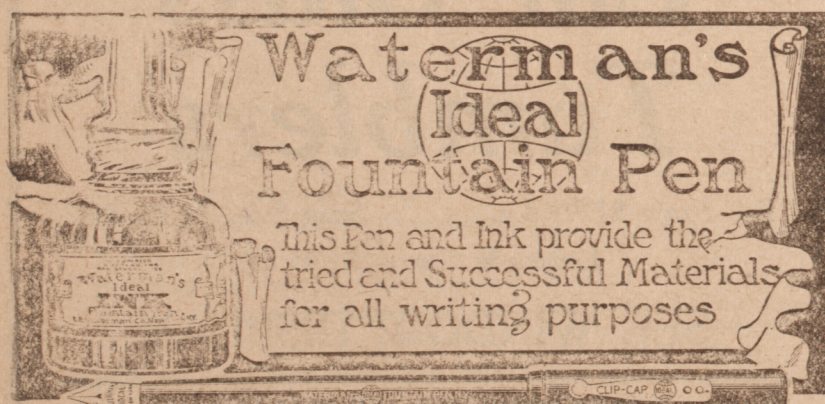

FREDERICTON PLAYED POORLY WON FROM CHATHAM, 2 TO 0

Titus in Goal Proved Salvation of Local Team--
Chatham Displayed Improved Form and Outskated Fredericton Men--Feeney's Absence Much Felt.

Fredericton won out 2 to 0 from Chatham last night and to "Tart" Titus is due all honor for the victory. Seldom if ever, has a goal-keeper put up the exhibition of defence play that Titus did last night. Chatham sent in shot after shot on the Fredericton net only to have the ex-Capitol block them and clear his net in great style. The credit of the other members of the team, particularly Archie Babbitt, it should be said that they prevented Chatham from getting any chances of running in on the net.

Fredericton was away off and Chatham was better than in the game against Marysville. Both teams had changes in the line-up. Jack Feeney was threatened with an attack of grip and acted as sub. Galloway played centre and did well considering that that is not his position. Duncan and Fred McLean had an off-night, in fact none of the forwards played as they usually do until the last ten minutes of the game when the play was the fastest yet seen here this season. Currey, the Chatham cover point was sick and Synott dropped into his place from centre. Winslow played centre and Hildebrand replaced McLean, who had his leg cut in the Marysville-Chatham game. The changes did not injure the Chatham team. Hildebrand was an improvement on McLean.

Fred McLean the Fredericton rover was suffering from a heavy cold and played in listless style until the second half. He distinguished himself shortly after the game began by slashing and getting into a mix-up with a Chatham forward. For the offence he went to the fence for five minutes. With Fredericton a man short Chatham skated the feet off the locals and tired them out. All through the match the Fredericton forwards failed to go back to the assistance of their defence men.

The two tallies of the game were scored in the first half. There were two other near-goals that the crowd thought should have counted for Fredericton, but goal-judge and referee thought otherwise. The Fredericton seven will have to get in some hard practice today and next week if it is to make any showing at St. John and Sussex.

The general opinion of those who saw Chatham last night is that the North Shore team on ice that it is acquainted with will make any team in the league hustle. Some prophets go so far as to say that it will win all its home games.

SLOW START

Fredericton started out very slowly and Chatham kept it at the locals' end. It finally went to the Chatham end where McLean was penalized for slashing. With a man short Fredericton kept it at Chatham's end. Wgtters spoiled a nice shot of Babbitt's. Hildebrandt and Godfrey took the rubber to the other end. Babbitt rushed it back. Watters made a good stop. The disc went to the other end Duncan carried it down the ice and passed to Galloway who netted Fredericton's first goal.

CHATHAM PLAYED HARD

Chatham brightened up and broke up Fredericton's attempts at combination. "Tart" Titus stopped a corving shot and cleared his net. Immediately after Hildebrandt got three minutes for tripping. Play was around the Fredericton net. Rowan and Duncan took the puck down again. Watters stopped a couple of shots and shortly afterwards Titus did the same.

Flood tripped Sterling and got three minutes with the timers. Babbitt tried a shot but Watters was waiting.

Godfrey broke a skate shortly afterward and there was a long wait. Watters stopped one of McLean's. McLean netted it immediately afterward, but it was from an offside. The play stayed at the Chatham end and Duncan netted the rubber 30 seconds before half time was called getting the puck in on a wing shot.

SECOND HALF

The whistle had hardly blown for resumption of play before Godfrey drove one in on Titus' "Tart" blocked it nicely. Fredericton forward went down the ice but the rubber came back.

Duncan took it down the ice by himself but Watters saved. Play went back to the Fredericton end. It went back and there was face-off after face-off in front of the Chatham goal.

PLAY GETS FAST

The players seemed to warm up as the end of the game neared and for the last ten minutes play was as fast as has been seen here this season. Fredericton had chance after chance to score, but lost them. In some cases it was hard luck, in others Watters' good work, but usually the poor shooting of the Fredericton forwards that prevented a score. The game ended with Fredericton aggressive.

HALIFAX PROS BEAT MONCTON LAST NIGHT

Five Thousand People Saw Game--Scott Starred For Moncton and Condon For Halifax.

Halifax, Jan. 13.—In the greatest hockey match ever witnessed in the Maritime Provinces, the Halifax professionals defeated the Moncton Victorias tonight, by a score of 7 to 5, in the second game of the professional series, and the first to be played in Halifax. There was some doubt as to how the professional game would take here, and many predicted that the game would be a frost, but nearly five thousand people crowded the Arena tonight and witnessed the struggle.

It was sharp 8.30 o'clock when Referee MacNamara, of Montreal, called the men together and gave them the usual warning, and they faced off sharp on time. In the first half the locals players seemed to have much the better of the play, scoring three goals in succession, while the visitors only found the net once; the half ended 3 to 1 in favor of the local team.

With the beginning of the second half the Victorias started in to rush matters, and Scott, by brilliant playing, made a dead set on the Halifax team's goal and the struggle waxed warm, the Moncton team scoring four goals in quick succession. The Crescents also found the net four times in the second half, and the game ended, 7 to 5 in favor of Halifax.

Scott was the star player for the visitors, and one of the best men ever seen in Halifax.

Frank Condon played the last game of any man on the ice, and it was his brilliant work that won the game for Halifax.

The St. John Telegraph says—"The hockey teams of the N. B. H. L. have all been initiated to the game now and while it is early yet to make any predictions, yet one has a much better idea of the relative strength of the teams than it was possible to ascertain a week ago. It is hard to make any forecast or even express a definite opinion as yet, but judging from what has already taken place, St. John ought to have an excellent chance of running off with the bunting this winter. From what has been seen of Chatham and Sussex, there should be little to fear from either of these sources, but than as hockey goes these days the unexpected frequently happens. Nevertheless, the locals should win from both these teams on the road, because on what Chatham and Sussex showed here, St. John has no business to lose to them even on their own ice.

From the viewpoint it looks like St. John and Fredericton with Marysville fighting hard to keep on top of Sussex and Chatham. Should it come down to a saw-off between the capital and the metropolis, one would not be greatly surprised to see the teams divide games, but on a play-off or deciding the championship on the number of goals scored, one would pick St. John to turn the trick by a big enough margin to leave no room for doubt."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
