Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of

Duties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely

or sister. In certain districts a homesteader quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties-Admission 25 and 15 cents Must reside upon the homestead

pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry Lessee and Manager. (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties-Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
