

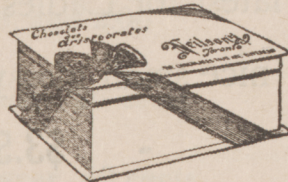

RECIPROCITY AND THE POTATO GROWER

The idea behind the resistance to reciprocity seems to be that if the farmers and fishermen are allowed an inch they will take an ell; that if they are let have reciprocity they will come back and demand that all tariff protection be swept away.

Those who thus discount the future have a queer idea of the way the average mind is acted upon by events. They seem to think that the way to make an enemy of the farmer is to show him a little kindness.

When they seem not to have counted upon at all is what his state of mind may be if it turns out that the cup is dashed from his lips.

Take the New Brunswick potato grower, for example, with his twenty dollar land just across the border from the forty dollar land of the Aroostook Maine. Will he be in a vindictive mood if the agreement carries, if his farm jumps two thousand dollars in value, if his earnings are twice what they were? Or will he be more likely to want to take it out of somebody's hide if the chance he has so long waited is lost on orders from the manufacturers whom those who made the treaty were careful not to hurt?

It depends a lot on human nature but human nature must have changed greatly if the tariff protection manufacturers enjoy is going to be safer with the country full of angry and disappointed farmers.

But the farmers will not be disappointed. They have it in their own hands to put the agreement into effect, and they are going to do it.

GOMEZ SON WANTS TO FIGHT A DUEL

Havana, Sept. 12.—Miguel Marcano Gomez, son of the president of Cuba, has challenged Representative Arnaldo Andre, editor of El Dia, to a duel. Recently a pistol fight took place between Gomez and Andre in the hotel Inglaterra, in which neither was injured. The seconds for Gomez in the proposed duel, made an unsatisfactory report after a visit to Andre. Editor explained that he could not fight a boy, so pointed out that 'a criminal case was pending against Gomez, the charge being assault.

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MR. BORDEN IS YOKED UP WITH THIS MAN

Mr. Bourassa is the man the Conservatives rely on to save the Empire by taking a majority out of Quebec.

What did Mr. Bourassa say about Sir Wilfrid Laurier's imperialism? Here it is in a signed letter to Le Devoir, the paper the Conservatives are freely circulating in Quebec province. Mr. Bourassa wrote it in July last.

"Mr. Laurier did not stop at the violation of the Canadian Constitution, from his own admission, by taking, without authorization, the money of the Canadian people to arm the Canadian troops and to have Canada participate in this infamous war (South African war); his cynicism carried him to the point of proclaiming—in the full light of parliament—that this war was the most just that England had ever carried on. No responsible statesmen, not even Mr. Chamberlain, had ever dared to go so far.

"Yes, the Nestor of the Imperial Conference, the Canadian Washington, found it right and good that 50,000 men should be massacred, millions of farms to be burnt and ravaged, peaceful homes to be pillaged, women to be outraged and little children to be shut up in pestilential camps, where they died like flies.

"English and Afrikaner soldiers who fell on the field for the glory of Chamberlain, women who died from shame or misery for the glorification of Laurier, children whose entrails have dried up in the concentration camps for the honor of the Empire! What do you think of the man?"

LAURIER'S DECLARATION

"I appeal to you who know me and the work of my administration to uphold me and my government against the unholy alliance of the Tories of Quebec and of the Tories of Ontario. I am branded in Quebec as a traitor to the French, and in Ontario as a traitor to the English. In Quebec I am branded as a jingo, and in Ontario as a separatist. In Quebec I am attacked as an imperialist, and in Ontario as an anti-imperialist."

"I am neither. I am a Canadian. Canada has been the inspiration of my life. I have had before me as a pillar of fire by night and a pillar of cloud by day, a policy of true Canadianism, of moderation and of conciliation. I have followed it consistently since the day of our triumph in 1896, and I now appeal with confidence to the whole Canadian people to uphold me in this policy of sound Canadianism which makes for the greatness of our country and of the empire."

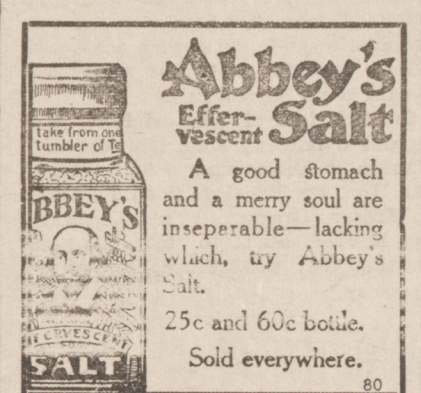

LABOR AND RECIPROCITY

At the big Fielding meeting in Halifax on Saturday evening, H. J. Logan in the course of his speech read the following letter from J. G. O'Donoghue, the Solicitor of the Dominion Trades Congress, representing over 200,000 organized Canadian workmen:

Toronto, Aug. 30th 1911. H. J. Logan, Esq., K. C., Barrister, etc., Amherst, N. S.

Dear Mr. Logan: You ask me where the organized workers stand on the question of Reciprocity? They themselves have already answered that in their annual conventions. They are undoubtedly for it, because it means the removal of a tax that has been imposed upon the whole people for the benefit of the few, and the workers are always against class privileges. As a member of over thirty Boards of Conciliation, I have had a lot to do with the question of the cost of living of the workers, and it is my firm belief that the adoption of Reciprocity pact will mean a cheaper breakfast and dinner table to the workers.

That means a couple of dollars a week to the workingman's wife and as she has to 'square' the butcher and the baker and the grocer she deserves every consideration. THE TRADES COUNCILS OF WINNIPEG, TORONTO, OTTAWA AND MONTREAL HAVE DECLARED FOR RECIPROCITY.
