PUBLIC REALIZES IMPORTANCE OF MINISTER'S REMARKS

Improvement of River Channel and Construction of Wharf Means Much to Fredericton

The announcement made by the Minister of Public Works at last night's great meeting in the Opera House to the effect that a contract for the building of a first class suction dredge for the improving of the river channel had been entered into was received with great pleasure by all whose business is at all connected with water-transportation. Coal-dealers and coal consumers were particularly pleased as an improvement, in the means of navigation will undoubtedly result in the cheapening of coal as it will be necessary with a clear channel between this city and St. John for coal-laden schooners to lighter part of their cargoes before proceeding to Fredericton.

During the past summer citizens of Fredericton have had brought more forcibly than ever before the necessity of having the channel dredged. The water was unusually low and the result was that three coal-laden schooners went aground on the bar of the B. & B. Club House at other points on the river low water also caused inconvenience to vessels. Hon. Mr. Pugsley stated last night that his department would act in this matter at the earliest opportunity and the announcement was received with cheers.

CONCRETE WHARF

The Minister's statement with regard to the new wharf at the rear of Phoenix Square put the responsibility concerning the delay in connection with that important public work was placed where it belonged, at City Hall. The Minister showed that upward of a year ago he was prepared to go ahead and build the wharf but that the city officials had taken in steps to transfer to the Dominion government the site of the wharf.

The building of this wharf will mean a marked improvement in the appearance of the water-front as well as an enlarged market-space which is urgently needed. Farmers and citizens who use the market will certainly appreciate the improvement.

CHANGE IN MODE OF ADDRESS TO GOVERNOR GENERAL

Addresses of Welcome to be Presented to Duke of Connaught on his Arrival at Quebec

It is probable that steps will be taken on the part of the Provincial Government to present to H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught an address of welcome on the occasion of his landing at Quebec to assume the office of Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of the Dominion of Canada. Communications with regard to the matter have been sent out from the office of the Secretary of State, Ottawa, to the various lieutenant-governors and by their private secretaries to the heads of municipalities and cities.

His Worship Mayor Thomas has received a copy of this communication and it is possible that the City Council will be asked to consider the matter.

The new governor general will land at Quebec early in October and addresses to be presented to him must be forwarded to the Secretary of State at an early date. The title "Your Excellency" is not to be applied to either the Duke or Duchess of Connaught, although in the past that title has been applied to the Governor General and his consort. The title by which the Duke and Duchess are to be addressed is "Your Highness."

LENGTHY TITLE.

The communication from the Secretary of State to the Lieutenant-governors contains the full title of the new Governor General, which is rather lengthy.

The communication contains the following:

The style and title of His Royal Highness will be: His Highness Prince Arthur William Patrick.

"Field Marshal, His Royal Highness, Duke of Connaught and of Strathearn, Earl of Sussex (in the Peerage of the United Kingdom), Prince of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Duke of Saxony, Prince of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, K.G., K.T., K.P., P.C., G.M.B., G.C.S.I., G.C.M.G., G.C.J.E., G.C.V.O., Personal A.D.C. to H.M. The King, Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of the Dominion of Canada."

All addresses should begin as above, but in reading an address only the following should be read so as to shorten the time:

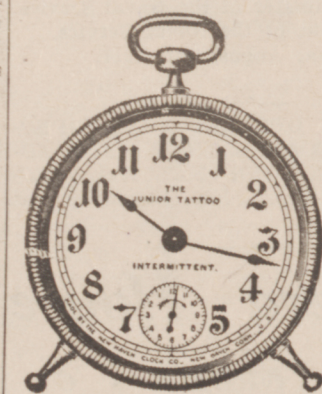

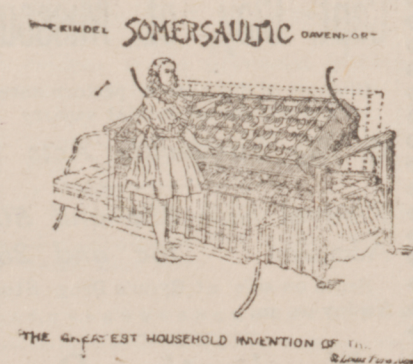
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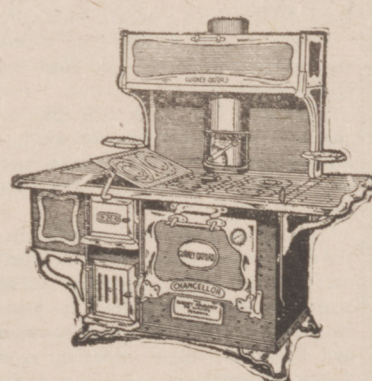
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
