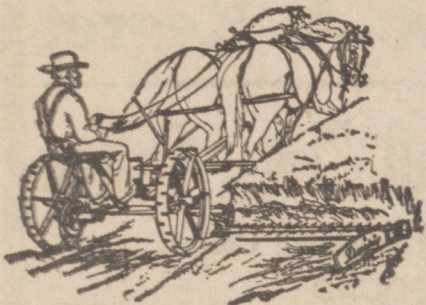

MATCHED WITH
PATRICK CURRAN**

Tom Flanagan Makes the Match--
Champion is Getting Fat--Weights
About 200 Pounds.

London, July 7.—Jack Johnson celebrated the anniversary of this Reno battle by signing articles for a fight with Patrick Curran to a finish in Dublin. Curran, who defeated Jack Roach, is considered Britain's best heavyweight. The match was arranged by Tom Flanagan. Johnson has been living high since his arrival here, getting fat. In a sparring match with Monte Cutler on Monday night Johnson exhibited constant fear that Cutler would hit him in the stomach, which showed that it was well fed. The champion appeared to weigh fully 250 pounds. Curran who weighs 200 pounds is in the best of condition.

**CHICAGO--PITTSBURG
GAME TO BE REPLAYED**

New York, July 6.—The protested Chicago-Pittsburg National league game of the morning of May 30 will have to be played over. Announcement to this effect was made at National league headquarters tonight. Chicago protested the game and Pres. Lynch sustained the protest and ordered the game played over. Pittsburg appealed to the directors of the league, and tonight it was announced the board has sustained the decision of Pres. Lynch.

London, Ont., July 7.—In the 2.15 pace event yesterday afternoon Frank Patch, J. Adams, Halifax entry driven by the owner was distanced in the fourth heat after getting fourth place in the three preceding. Harry Hill won a six heat race in this event the best time being 2.12 in the first heat.

**AMERICAN ATHLETES
TRAINING IN ENGLAND**

Brighton, England, July 7.—The Harvard and Yale athletes began practice in earnest. Afternoon practice also was indulged in. Pits and take-offs had been prepared for the jumpers, who began real work. The sprinters and quarter-milers engaged in speed practice, while the distance men jogged several miles. All the visiting athletes are in excellent condition.

**FIGURES NOT BE
ALLOWED AS RECORDS**

New York, July 7.—A.A.U. officials have considered whether they will allow Martin Sheridan a new record of 141 ft. half an inch for the distance throw, which he made at Tuesday's athletic carnival at McCarren Park in Brooklyn. Because he did not comply with all A.A.U. rules it is thought probable the record will not stand. Another notable performance at the games was the running of the 100 yards by Gwyn Henry, the Texan, in 9.45 seconds.

**CANADIANS LOST
IN EMPIRE SPORTS**

London, July 7.—Canada's boxer and wrestler in the Festival of Empire sports were beaten today. Julius Thompson, the Toronto heavyweight boxer, drew a bye in the first series of the boxing. **WOLGAST TRIES
TO BELITTLE WELSH
IN NEGOTIATIONS**

English Boxer Says He is Ready to Carry Out Agreement--Cheques Posted.

San Francisco, Cal., July 7.—Ad. Wolgast will take a rest for several weeks. Wolgast and his manager, Tom Jones, are willing to carry out the provisional agreement entered into at Millet's Road House, on June 20th, with Jones and Baron Long, representing Freddie Welsh, posted cheques for \$1,000 to bind a match, in which each side would put up a side bet of \$10,000. Welsh advised his friends in Cardiff, Wales, of the proposition for the fight for the world's championship, and its \$20,000 stake. Yesterday he received a cable from his backer, A. W. Welsh, stating that Harry Marks would find the £2,000 necessary to make Welsh's end good. Wolgast and Jones are not over sanguine about Welsh completing negotiations. Wolgast declares that Welsh wants \$10,000 as his share of the purse, and that his demand is made simply to make the match an impossibility.

Joe Jackson continues to play fine ball, and with Lajoie back in the game the Cleveland Naps will be able to start something.

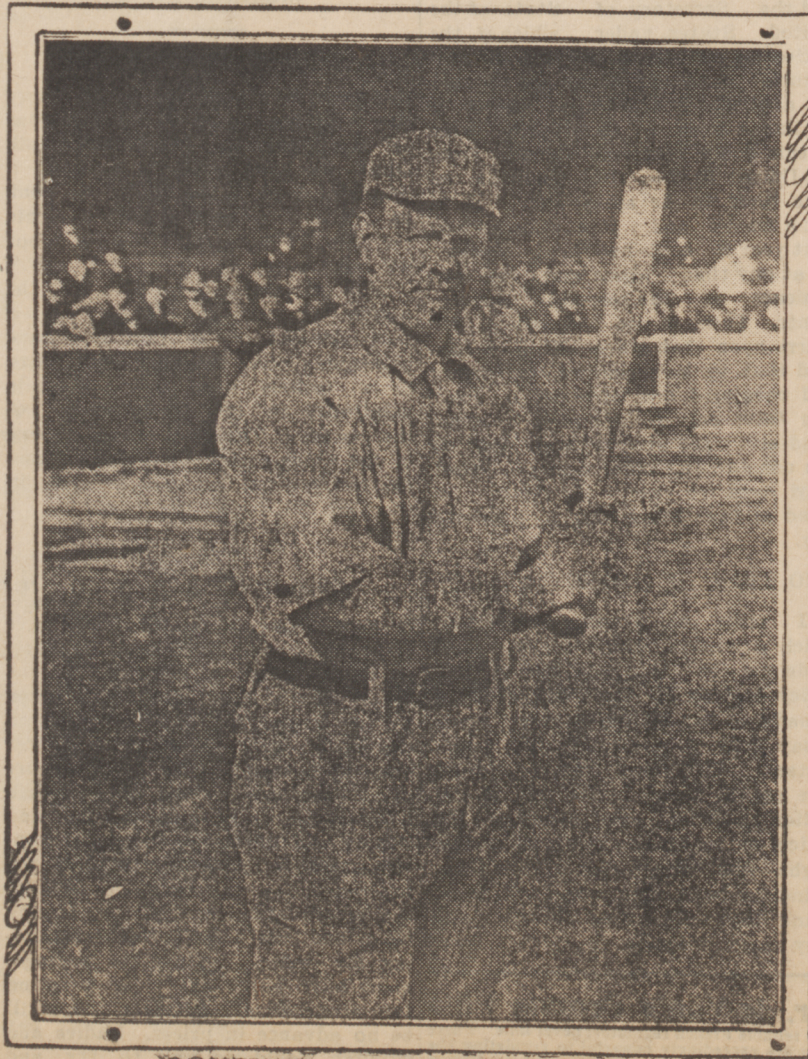
Alexander the Great put a crimp in every team he met until Gestruck Brooklyn. The Superbas hung a weewah on the Quaker star.
