

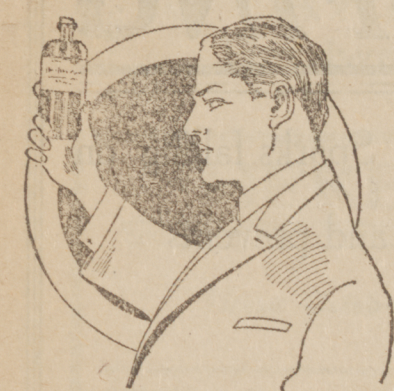

## REV. DR. DAVIES CONSECRATED

Worcester, Mass., Oct. 18—The Rev. Dr. Thomas Frederick Davies Jr., for eight years rector of All Saints' Church, this city, was today consecrated bishop of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Western Massachusetts. The ceremony took place in All Saints' Church in the presence of a large assemblage of bishops, clergy, and laymen. Bishop Tuttle of St. Louis presided and was assisted by Bishop Lawrence of Massachusetts and Bishop Brewster of Connecticut. Bishop Burgess of Long Island preached the sermon, and Bishops Johnson of Los Angeles and Williams of Michigan were the presenters. The complete ritualistic ceremony of the church was carried out in the consecration.

## FINANCIAL SKIES BRIGHTEN ABROAD

London, Oct. 14—After all the earlier misgivings of the month, this has been a week of quiet and steady improvement. In particular some absurdly exaggerated rumors regarding credit are dying a natural death. This does not mean that everything is as yet entirely sound. But the speculative markets are manifestly oversold and the return of comfortable monetary conditions has occasioned extensive closing of bear accounts in consols. This with some small, new buying partly professional and partly from investors, explains the movement of recovery which is thus far natural and justifiable.

Nevertheless after having discussed with numerous quarters of the highest standing the financial and political situation. I am still impressed with the necessity of maintaining an attitude of conservatism. Although the recent extensive liquidation has purged financial Europe of the ills caused by its recent excesses, it is still a sickly patient, requiring all possible care to promote recovery, and absolute freedom from new shocks.

## EUROPEAN MONEY MARKETS

The present cautious attitude of our strongest financiers is inspired by doubt as to whether these ideal conditions can be counted on. France is believed to be still hoarding cash, and Germany is still finding difficulty in obtaining accommodation at London. It is recognized that New York's loans to Berlin have been an important source of relief, though London believes that they do not exceed ten to fifteen millions sterling. If gold exports from New York were to be resumed, it is still believed that the gold would go to Paris, rather than to London where it is not required.

## DUKE OF CONNAUGHT'S MESSAGE TO CANADIANS

Quebec, Oct. 13—"For myself personally I have only one wish, and that is to serve Canada, to make myself at home in this country, and to do all I can to promote its best interests, and also to promote that connection to the Empire which I think of such importance to Canada. These were the words of H. R. H. The Duke of Connaught, Governor-General of Canada, on the occasion of the first public event after his installation. It was his first message to the Canadian people as their Governor-General.

The Duke and Duchess were the guest this afternoon of the Canadian Government at a luncheon in the Chateau Frontenac. Premier Borden presided and there was present besides the Vice-Regal party the members of the Canadian and Quebec Government with their wives' and families, a total of 150 guests.

## THE STATE LUNCHEON

When their Royal Highnesses arrived at the Chateau Frontenac from the city, whether they had repared after the installation, they were received with applause by the resident guests of the hotel, assembled in the rotunda. The Duke of Connaught led the way along the passage to the dining hall, with Mrs. Borden on his arm, the Premier followed, escorting the Duchess. The dining-room on the first floor was beautifully decorated with autumn maple leaves and palms. On the table were red roses, with a groundwork of asparagus fern.

## PREMIER BORDEN'S ADDRESS

After the health of the King had been proposed by the Premier and drunk, Mr. Borden proposed the health of the new Governor-General, saying in part: "The representatives of the great overseas dominion occupies a position and exercises functions of the highest importance and responsibility. As the autonomous powers of these dominions have increased, the Crown has come to represent more and more to their people the majesty and the power of the whole Empire. Thus a common allegiance to one Sovereign is not the least of those governing ties which today bind the self-governing dominions to the heart of (Continued on page seven.)
