MINISTERIAL RE-ELECTIONS

The Quebec Liberals are talking of opposing the re-election of Hon. L. P. Pelletier in Quebec County and are pressing Hon. S. N. Parant to be their candidate. It is unusual to oppose the re-election of new ministers, but sometimes it is done.

It was done in January, 1896, when Sir Charles Tupper came back to take the leadership of the shattered Conservative party; it was done in October, 1877, when Wilfrid Laurier went back to Drummond and Arthurs and was defeated after his appointment as the minister of inland revenue in the Mackenzie cabinet; it was done in August, 1896, when Hon. William Patterson had to fight a bye-election in North Grey, after his defeat in Brant at the general election, and upon his appointment as controller of customs; it was done in December, 1895, when Hon. G. E. Foster was appointed minister of marine and fisheries; it was done in December, 1902, in Maisonneuve, when the late Hon. Raymond Prefontaine was appointed minister of marine and fisheries; it was done in August, 1896 when Hon. A. G. Blair sought election in Sumbury and Queens, after his appointment as minister of railways and canals; and it was done in North York in November, 1905, when Hon. A. B. Aylesworth was appointed postmaster general.

Thus it will be seen that the rule is one which has been often violated. Whether it shall be observed in the cases of all the new ministers is a matter for the Liberal leaders to decide, but except in exceptional cases, where local interests may seem to demand a contest, we do not see any advantage to be gained by opposition to Premier Borden and his colleagues.

Chatham World, Tory.—Mr. Hazen, the new minister of marine, must get a seat in parliament, and it is supposed that Dr. Daniel will make way for him in St. John. How would it do for Mr. Crockett to resign, allow Mr. Hazen to become a candidate for York, and then become a candidate himself, in order to give the people of that county a chance to express their preference? The member who resigns will, of course, get the governorship, a senatorship or some other reward. Perhaps Mr. Loggie would accept the governorship, if it were offered to him, and then Mr. Hazen would have a chance to capture a seat from the Liberals. But would he run the risk of defeat in Northumberland?

The census returns show that the population of New Brunswick increased by twenty thousand during the last decade. This is greater by ten thousand than the total increase for the two previous decades. Between 1881 and 1891 the population of New Brunswick increased by thirty seven and between 1891 and 1901 the increase was 9000.

The population of Fredericton during the past ten years increased ninety one souls. This is certainly a miserable showing for the capital city of New Brunswick and indicates very plain by that there is a screw loose somewhere.

The prairie province of Saskatchewan during the past decade increased its population from 91,279 to 459,574 yet at the recent election the people of that province did not vote to "let well enough alone."

The little province of Prince Edward Island suffered a loss of ten thousand in its population during the past ten years.

Hon. J. K. Flemming is the first prime minister of the province to hold the portfolio of surveyor general. Hon. H. R. Emmerson, when premier, held the portfolio of chief commissioner. In all other cases since confederation the portfolio of attorney general or provincial secretary was held by the premiers.

New Brunswick one of the four original provinces of Canada must now take a back seat so far as population is concerned to Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

The census returns given out at Ottawa yesterday show that the population of Canada increased by a little more than two millions during the last decade.

Premier Flemming should see to it that the St. John Valley Railway contract is signed without delay. He can no longer lay the blame on Pugsley and Carvell.

The local Tory organ announced a few days ago that Hon. Mr. McLeod was to succeed Hon. Mr. Grimmer as surveyor general. The organ for once was astray in the reckoning.

Anyway, it was not the fault of the member for York that the Presbyterians are not represented in the Borden cabinet.

Will the present provincial administration be known as the Flemming-Grimmer government, or the Flemming-McLeod government?

It is something new for the provincial secretary of the province to be acting as crown prosecutor.

THE STOCK MARKET
A LITTLE STRONGER

New York, N.Y., Oct. 18.—Further than indicating very clearly that the pressing liquidation in the stock market had run its course, yesterday's transactions were of little significance, being confined almost wholly to the room professional element. The rally which began upon publication of the Tobacco plan and which promised to be of considerable proportions, was nipped in the bud by the development of opposition by Attorney General Wickersham. It is believed, however, that the court will not countenance any objections which do not fully protect stockholders in accordance with the decree of the higher court. General news is rather colorless and the market is obviously awaiting the development of fresh news to furnish an impulse one way or the other. In the meantime there is a moderate but persistent investment demand which is gradually absorbing the floating supply of the better class of stocks. This should make for a better market when general news takes a more favorable turn.

Dr. Rankin (bullet put in evidence) I was present when the autopsy was held, and this is the bullet removed from deceased's body.

To Mr. Carvell—When the revolver was handed to me, I put the revolver in a sealed box and put it in the safe of Dibblee & Augerton. Bragdon asked me after his arrest if I would take him to see McCluskey. I did not do so because I thought I had no right to do so. The revolver is in the same condition as when I got it from Bragdon.

Other witnesses examined were Miss Etta Lane, Dunwood McIntyre and Dr. Grant.

COMING TO CANADA

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 18.—Arrangements for the visit of the Royal Caledonia Curling Club, which will tour Canada this winter, were made at the semi-annual meeting of the Ontario Curling Association yesterday.

They will visit Kingston, Peterborough, Toronto, Hamilton, Galt, London and Detroit and Messrs. J. W. Corcoran, J. A. Swabey, and J. A. MacFadden were appointed a committee to look after the visitors.

They will arrive at Halifax in January and will remain five days in the Maritime Provinces, three days in Quebec, six days in Montreal and three in Ottawa. They will visit Kingston on January 23rd and will be in Toronto on the 27th. His Excellency the Duke of Connaught, governor general of Canada, was chosen patron. The hon. president is Lieut. Governor Hon. J. M. Gibson and C. W. Cartwright of Hamilton, is president.
