ATHLETICS TOOK ANOTHER IN ELEVEN INNING GAME

Baker Made Another Home-run—Philadelphia's Batting won Game—Giants Led Until Fatal Ninth—Mathewson Pitched Steady Ball but Got Poor Support

COOMBS' GREAT WORK

Jack Coombs, hero of last year's world series, earned further laurels today by letting down the Giants with only three hits in the prolonged contest. Two of these hits came in the third inning, resulting in a run, and then the durable Coombs was unsolvable until the eleventh inning, when Herzog sent a rattling double to the left fence.

MATHEWSON WEAKENED

Manager McGraw pinned his hope for today's game on Mathewson, and until the fatal ninth inning "Christy" held the Athletics useless, letting them down with five hits. He was favored by the "breaks" of the game, which enabled him to pull out of holes in the third and fifth innings.

Mathewson was a broken reed when Frank Baker smashed his solid home run drive into the far right field seats in the ninth inning, tying the score. He escaped the tenth without difficulty, but in the next and last spasm the Philadelphians unlimbered their heavy artillery and before the cannonading of timely drives was over two runners had sped across the plate.

The Philadelphians were again successful in stealing on Myers who was able to check only one of their attempts. Lapp caught a perfect game handling Coombs' swift shoots in fine style.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate and erect a house worth \$300.00.
