DUKE OF CONNAUGHT'S MESSAGE TO CANADIANS

The Empress, on behalf of my colleagues and myself, on behalf of those who are here assembled, may, more, on behalf of the people of Canada, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, I have the high honor of extending to their Royal Highnesses, in this ancient and historic city, a right royal Canadian welcome and of expressing the earnest and confident hope that their sojourn in this country may ever be invested with the happiest memories. I ask you to drink to the health of their Royal Highnesses the Governor-General and the Duchess of Connaught."

A HAPPY AUGURY

The Governor General, who was loudly applauded, on rising the reply said: "Mr. Borden and members of his Majesty's Canadian Government: I desire to thank you in the Duchess' name as well as my own for the very kind and cordial manner in which you have welcomed me. This is the first event that has been taken since this morning's function, and I can assure you that is a very happy augury to me as Governor-General that the first act of the new Government has been that you are entertaining in this present and splendid manner your new Governor-General. You, sir, have referred in very felicitous terms to the representatives of the Crown of the dominions within the Empire. I fully realize every word you have said. It has been my good fortune to have been in many portions of the Empire, and what struck me most was that it was the King and Crown which was the great source of unity among them. It is, therefore, a satisfaction to me to hear from you that you think that Canada has been lucky in the representation sent to you. And when I think of the names of those who have been here I feel there is great justice in your remark."

Providence, R.I., Oct. 18.—The Republican State convention met at Infantry Hall today with Congressman George H. Utter presiding. As there were no contests for places on the State ticket the work of the convention was speedily accomplished. Governor Aram J. Pothier was renominated amid great enthusiasm. Lieutenant Governor Zenas W. Bliss and other leading State officials were likewise renominated. The platform declares in favor of reciprocity and the principles of protection as enunciated in the last national platform of the Republican party. As regards State issues most emphasis is placed on the necessity of tax revision.
