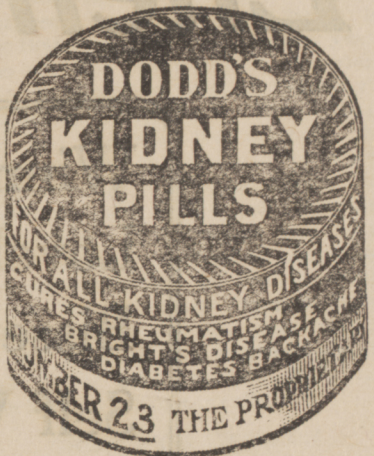

WESTERN LAND BOOM IN EAST  
DISCUSSED BY CORRESPONDENT

To the Editor of The Mail:

Dear Sir:—Within the past year or two there have been many citizens of Fredericton and parties living in various districts in York and Sunbury counties, New Brunswick, who have been purchasing blocks and lots of land situated in town and city plats in the Canadian Northwest with the idea of making a big profit on their investment. In many cases this Western land is bought on the installment plan and in very many cases the buyer is having to make life miserable to enable him or her to meet these payments when they become due, with no certainty of their ever realizing even the monies they put into these properties. People who live in the districts where these blocks of land exist often do well in some cases by investing in real estate but in lots of cases these plans of so-called town lots in Western Canada are more or less a downright scheme of certain land companies to sell by piecemeal a tract of barren land which they wish to get off their hands. Would it not be a thousand times better for our citizens and countrymen to devise and float a big scheme of honest intent, and build and operate as joint stock companies a number of ordinary-sized factories, viz: factories for the making and manufacture of furniture, starch, toothpicks, shoe lasts, slate for roofing, apple barrels, farm machinery, straw hats and all work in the machinery and boilers and engines carried on by foundries and machine shops. These above mentioned industries can be fostered and encouraged by those very people who are investing this surplus of their cash in Western lands and in most cases under careful management their investments in home industries will yield a substantial dividend and at the same time build up their native country. Remember, my countrymen, this is the time to make the move, for if we read the signs of the times, the Canadian West will soon have a great tide of population moving into their wheat belts and they will be crying out for the provisions and the manufactured article and the trade with these people will mean cash. Never did we in New Brunswick have a better opportunity to make a showing; we have served our apprenticeship in buying the manufactured article from Ontario and Quebec. I know it is hard to get out of an old path or rut, but if our people would buckle to and make a move in this direction, our wealth and population people in the British Isles who have money to invest in above named enterprises would do so here instead of elsewhere when they were satisfied that our own people put faith in their own country and enterprises.

If we could only get a stimulus of trade in New Brunswick (and mind you there is no country on the face of God's green earth which deserves it more) whoever could bring it about would be worthy of the name of a true patriot. This article is

would increase and this, our province of New Brunswick, would have an attraction which it already has but does not show to advantage and it would not be long before we would have in our country all mechanics and workmen and factory hands and written down our great Canadian Northwest but for the purpose of awakening Frederictonians, their neighbors and people in New Brunswick generally to make a move and try some plan as a people to show the outside world they are possessed of ability to make their beautiful province a shining diamond among the provinces in our great Dominion of Canada. The great Creator has given us our talent, and why not use it. If our country could only be made to arrive in the manufacturing line, it would soon be thickly populated, for we have a lovely country, especially well watered and wooded, with a variety of groveous scenery, several lines of railroad, good laws, schools, churches, medical men (physicians) and a healthful climate to live in and a creditable criminal record, second to none in the wide world. Our citizens are a God-fearing people and our law courts show it. With all these good qualities why don't we make a better showing in trade. We have an over-abundance of raw material for manufacture and if our output of manufactured goods and wares would be of sufficient quantity we would be able to ship to Britain and other countries across the ocean, as well as to the Northwest and other parts of Canada; and, mind you, my countrymen, if we could only have such a real estate boom here, that would make other countries open their eyes; let thinking people ponder. "Necessity is the mother of invention," let some others take up this subject in the press and let us make such a noise about manufacture that outsiders as well as our own people will get the fever and the project will become a reality. Wake up, wake up, New Brunswickers and get some of the plums which shall be yours if you will but make the fervent effort for them.
