Tweeddale Throws Valley Road Bombshell Into The Hazen Ranks

Quebec and New Brunswick Railway Company Offered a Month Ago to Build the Road—Why Has Premier Hazen Kept the People in the Dark?—Victoria Opposition Member Gave the House Startling Information Yesterday—His Thorough Exposure of the Present Government's Way of Handling Provincial Affairs.

In his speech on the budget, which he began on Tuesday evening and concluded on Wednesday afternoon, Mr. Tweeddale, of Victoria, brought before the House in forceful fashion some of the most salient points to be noted in connection with the affairs of the province. Mr. Tweeddale is a man who is gifted with the faculty of recognizing the things of real importance in connection with public affairs and is also gifted with the faculty of bringing his view of those things clearly before those who listen to him when he takes the floor to discuss them.

In his latest speech the Victoria member thoroughly exposed the absurdity of many of the claims that are now put forward by members of supporters of the Hazen ministry. He showed conclusively the inconsistencies of Messrs. Grimmer and Maxwell and other members of the government and by quotations from the official reports of the House neatly turned the attempts which were made to clear the ministers. He also made clear how great have been the over-expenditures by this government which took office pledged to have no outlays of the kind and by quotations from the St. John Standard showed that since taking office as well as before he did so Hon. Mr. Fleming had declared that there would be no over-expenditures in the government of which he is a member.

Mr. Tweeddale also paid some attention to utterances of Mr. Hatheway, whose protestations of his devotion to the cause of the people, the laboring man, have so often been heard. Mr. Tweeddale showed that while Mr. Hatheway had tried to blame members of the Opposition because certain franchises of which he (Mr. Hatheway) does not approve had been granted in this province the St. John man himself had made no protest when the present ministry which he supports had practically given away the iron mines of Gloucester to a powerful corporation for more than two generations.

In these and other ways did Mr. Tweeddale give the government a very bad time. But he threw a bombshell into the Hazen ranks when he was able to read a copy of a letter which Premier Hazen received a month ago from a company offering to build the Valley Railway. While Mr. Hazen has known of this offer for a month he had given the House no information in regard to it whatever and it is said that even his followers knew nothing of it. The reading of this letter together with Mr. Tweeddale's masterly review of the Valley Railway matter exposed the peculiar course which the ministry has been following in regard to this most important project and left the government ranks utterly discomfited.

The House met on Wednesday at three o'clock. Mr. Robinson presented the petition of the City Council of Moncton in favor of bills to establish a Salvage Corps and to authorize the city to issue debentures for the extension of the water system and to purchase Exhibition Association property. Mr. Byrnie presented the petition of P. J. Veniot and others in favor of a bill to authorize the Town of Bathurst to borrow money. Mr. Hatheway presented the petition of the City of St. John in favor of a bill to authorize the city to take a plebiscite on the question of building a bridge across the harbor. Mr. Sweeney presented petitions of the City Council of Moncton in favor of a bill to amend their act of incorporation; also in favor of a bill relating to the inspection of buildings. Mr. Tweeddale presented a petition in favor of the bill to amend the Act of Incorporation of Andover. Mr. Robinson presented the petition of the City Council of Moncton in favor of a bill to authorize the sale of the contagious diseases hospital. Mr. Robinson presented the petition of J. S. Magee, City Clerk of Moncton, in favor of the several bills prepared by the City Council of Moncton. Mr. Tweeddale introduced a bill to amend the Act incorporating the Maine and New Brunswick Electrical Power Company, Limited. The Attorney General introduced a bill to incorporate the Atlantic Trust Company.

Mr. Tweeddale in resuming the debate on the budget, said that last evening when he moved the adjournment of the debate, he was referring to some of the inconsistencies of hon. gentlemen opposite as shown by their attitude on public questions when they were in Opposition and their attitude now that they are in power. He mentioned particularly the hon. member for St. John, (Mr. Maxwell.) In 1906 the hon. gentleman is reported on page 74 of the "Synopsis Report" to have said: "The government has been continually developing new methods of taxation. They have imposed taxes on banks and insurance companies. They have brought about a direct taxation by their Highway Act and now they are proposing to increase the Succession Duties. I wish to protest most emphatically against any bill to increase these duties for I believe it is simply a robbing of the widows and orphans. The bill if passed will place a heavy burden on many people."

That was the hon. gentleman's opinion then and he (Mr. Tweeddale) thought he could also go back to the records and show that the pre-

sent Surveyor General severely criticised the former Attorney General because that official received a percentage for the collection of Succession Duties though Mr. Hazen also gets a percentage now from the same source. It was the inconsistencies of these gentlemen that he criticised, and if they were sincere in their former remarks why did they not carry these sentiments into effect now that they are in power? The hon. member for St. John (Mr. Hatheway) had made some reference to men who wanted their past to be forgotten but if there were any such it surely is those who were in opposition a few years ago but now hold the reins of power.

PUBLIC WORKS

He wished he said to refer to some of the expenditures in the Public Works Department. On page 121 of the Auditor General's report is an item of \$3,171.50 for "Roads, Settlements, Lands, Victoria County." This was supposed to be for opening up a road through the Blue Bell Tract but in his opinion the expenditure had not been judicious in as much as a very large sum had gone to a man named Melville for superintendence and expenses. There is the same condition on all public works outlays—too much money is absorbed by the officials. Too much goes to individuals and not enough for the public services. He also criticised that expenditure, because apparently in the opinion of the Provincial Secretary there were not men good enough in Victoria to superintend that work and so he had men brought in from Carleton County. That was not fair to Victoria County even if the government would not take any recommendations from him and his colleague.

Another thing in connection with the Blue Bell Tract was a misrepresentation made in Victoria county and elsewhere by the present Solicitor General and the papers supporting the government.

A SPLENDID BARGAIN

They charged that Hon. Mr. Robinson, when provincial secretary, had committed an act of mal-administration in connection with the purchase of that tract of land and that he was wronging the people by allowing them to settle on those lands because the title to the property was not clear. The hon. gentleman (Mr. McLeod) must have known he was guilty of misrepresentation. It is to the credit of Mr. Robinson that he had worked out that transaction whereby for \$38,000 the province came into possession of land now worth millions of dollars which could have been put upon the market the day after it was bought and sold for \$350,000. That transaction was promoted by himself and his colleagues and it could be pointed to as one of the best transactions ever put through by any government in the history of New Brunswick. The province received last year from stumpage from the Blue Bell Tract about \$7,000 and he believed that if all the revenues which had come into the treasury of New Brunswick from that tract were added up it would be found that already the original purchase prices was more than refunded and the province still owns the lands for settlement purposes. Those, he said, are instances of the character of the misrepresentations indulged in all over the province by hon. gentlemen opposite and those are among the things they would like to have forgotten.

UNFAIR COMPARISONS

The Provincial Secretary in discussing the financial methods of his department laid great stress upon what he called the improved method of accounting. He (Mr. Tweeddale) believed the public services had received no more money than before, although the present government has a greatly increased revenue. On the contrary, he believed that a fair comparison would be favorable to the old government. It is easy enough to make it appear that the present administration has repaired more bridges than the old government did by counting every little culvert that is fixed up, and had cost in some cases \$22 for superintendence or \$4 for the actual work, but that is not a fair method. The Provincial Secretary had an over-expenditure last year of \$60,000, and if he was honest he would admit that there are bills (Continued on page three)
