## Hockey Bowling

## MORAN WAS OFF-COLOR IN BOUT WITH McFARLAND

His Blows Lacked Force and His Brain Escorted Slowly—McFarland Almost Scored Knock-out in Seventh Round.

The Boston Globe, in its account of the McFarland-Moran bout says: In a lightning fast bout of ten rounds, with every second spent in getting scores of punches, hooks, swings and jabs, Packey McFarland the stocky champion of Chicago, outpointed Owen Moran of England at the Fairmont A. C.

In every session of the milling, with the possible exception of the fifth round and the ninth round, which were even, McFarland proved his superiority as a boxer, as a puncher and as a heavy-hitting fighting man. It was a rare fistic treat between two exponents of the art of boxing, men of cleverness who convert the crown Ad Wolgast, champion lightweight, won.

### INTERNATIONAL BATTLE

It was an international battle. McFarland represented America and Moran, England. McFarland was the aggressor throughout the boxing and he was always moving. Like a flash of light he moved around Moran, shooting over Owen's guard, finding ragged openings in his defence and planting blows beneath the Englishman's guard at will.

Moran could not locate Packey, who was too clever for Moran. His brain was too sharp and active. He used his famous uppercuts frequently and scored great damage with them.

Moran's punches lacked steam—had once did he hit McFarland a hard blow. Thrice only did he reach McFarland's face with stinging punches, and those landed so high upon the cheek bones, ear and brow, that they failed to hurt Packey.

### FATAL SIXTH ROUND

It was in the sixth round that Moran came to the cross roads of his boxing career. He found a barrier opposed to him erected by McFarland's fists.

Packey had lured him into his trap. He spun blows to Moran's face that dazed him and entangled his feet. Packey reached out with his left hand after planting blows to Owen's face, caught him around the neck and holding him at arm's length, jolted him under the chin.

The blow had the lifting power of dynamite behind it and sent Moran reeling across the ring. His balance was lost, his body doubled up and he hit the ropes with a crash, falling through the lower strands to his haunches.

It was that blow that clogged Moran's brain and he never was there after as crafty. In the seventh round Packey increased his lead by a wide margin and gave the bewildered Moran no rest. He was after him from every point of the compass. No matter which way Moran turned, he was met by a hurricane of driving, crushing, smashing punches to the face and body.

### MORAN STAYED

A right uppercut stayed Moran and the crowd thought it was all over and shouted for Packey to knock him out, but McFarland lacked the blow to do this and Moran managed to recuperate during the minute's rest to such a degree that he fought out the bout to the end. Only Moran's great virility saved him from being knocked out in that round.

## JAY WILKES BEAT PATTY BANGS AGAIN

St. John, March 16.—Jay Wilkes won again yesterday morning in an interesting race at Torriburn, with Patty Bangs. The former horse, owned by Rose Brothers, took three straight heats from the McDonald horse in easy style and upheld his reputation as a speeder.

The race was started about eleven o'clock with Martin Dolan as the starter, and with a very large number of spectators. The race was for \$50 a side. Tommy Hayes drove Fangs, while James Brickley held the lines over Wilkes.

## AMHERST RAMBLERS BEAT VICTORIAS OF BOSTON 3 TO 2

Boston, Mass., March 15.—The Amherst, N.S., Ramblers defeated the Victoria hockey team, of Boston, in one of the roughest games of the season at the Boston Arena tonight. The score was 3 to 2. Thirteen men were ruled off the ice for rough play.

## P. A. BELLIVEAU OF MONCTON AFTER SPEED

Boston news in The American Horse Breeder says:

P. A. Belliveau, a prominent horseman and secretary of the track at Moncton, N.B., was in town last week Mr. Belliveau is looking for speed. He says that the outlook for a good racing season across the line is excellent, and that the track managers down there have made up their minds that it is a mistake to bar horses from this side. The races this season will be open to all. Among the horses that Mr. Belliveau will race this season are: Candy Girl, 2:17; by Alcantara; Rose Hathaway, 2:23; by Bingen, out of Czarine, by Gilt Edge, and Protien, by Our King, out of Protien, 1:11.

## NEW AMATEUR RECORDS MADE IN NEW YORK

New York, March 15.—Three amateur indoor records were broken at the Pastime Athletic Club games at Madison Square Garden last night. In the mile relay race, two new records were made, the intercity and the Y. M. C. A. In the intercity contest, a New York team composed of L. B. Dorland, J. M. Rosenberger, Melvin W. Shepard and H. W. Gissing, led against a team from Philadelphia and the Boston team. The time was 3.25 1-5, compared with the previous record of 3.25 4-5.

In the Y. M. C. A. national relay, the West Side Branch of New York established a new record of 3 minutes 30 seconds. All competitors were New Yorkers.

In the three standing broad jumps, D. Healy, representing the Pastime A. C. made a jump of 34 feet 3 3-4 inches. The former record made by Platt Adams, of Boston, was 34 feet 6 inches. Adams was second tonight with 34 feet 7 3-8 inches.

### PUCKERINGS

There were only 2,500 people at the Galt-Ottawa game last night. The average attendance at Ottawa this season has been 4,500. The Canadian Press despatch on the game said that Galt checked like "bushwhackers."

The Allan Cup trustees have accepted a challenge from the St. Mary's Club of Calgary, who have not won anything entitling them to play. Calgary won Alberta League championship, but their challenge was refused for professionalism and other reasons.

There was a unique match at Quebec on Saturday night, when the seven Morency brothers met a team from the St. George Club. In addition to the seven brothers on the ice there was an eighth brother on the side in uniform as spare man. This is a record for Canada in regard to family teams. The Morency brothers provided themselves good enough to make St. George's team travel at rapid speed all through the game, but they were defeated by a score of 5 to 6.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-  
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
