

LONDON PAPERS

ARE ENTHUSIASTIC

Much Pleased Over the Prospect of an Anglo-American Arbitration Treaty.

London, March 14.—The afternoon papers welcome with enthusiasm the cordial support of President Taft's known wish for a general Anglo-American arbitration treaty, given in the House of Commons last night by Sir Edward Grey. It is assumed that the American executive cherished the hope that an amendment to the existing arbitration treaty will remove the present prohibition in article one against the submission to arbitration of questions of vital interest to the two parties or involving their honor.

The foreign secretary referred to President Taft's recent arbitration speech as "bold, courageous and pregnant with consequences." And added that he believed that the British government and parliament would place the stamp of their approval upon the sentiments expressed. The Evening Standard holds that "a real and natural dual alliance would be notable between England and France or England and Japan or between England and the United States." If, says The Standard, these two governments could agree that their armaments of one should be available to resist an attack upon the other, there could be no more danger from aggression either in the Atlantic or Pacific regions. The Pall Mall Gazette says that Sir Edward's response to President Taft's suggestion, "carries with it the full strength of English feeling and opinion."

The Westminster Gazette expresses the hope that this great movement of English-speaking people toward peace will go forward and prosper.



WINNIPEG MAY BUY THE STREET RAILWAY

Winnipeg, March 15.—The offer of Sir William Mackenzie to sell out the Winnipeg Electric, lock, stock and barrel, to the city, or to enter into an agreement with the city to buy 15,000 horsepower from the city's new power plant when completed, next July, is the sole subject of conversation about the City Hall and among business men. It is understood that President Mackenzie offered to sell out at \$250 per share of the company's stock, which now sells at about \$190. This would make the price about fifteen millions, and the city would have to assume the bonded indebtedness of six millions. As an alternative, he offered to submit the price to arbitration, the arbitrators to consider the valuation of the company's property as a "going concern."

This latter proposition is not likely to appeal to the city, as the company's right to do lighting and power business is still before the courts although the Supreme Court here has decided that the company has no right to continue in this business. The company has appealed on this point to the Privy Council.

If the city does not care to buy Sir William Mackenzie that the company would be willing to buy from the city 15,000 horsepower at a price which will pay interest on the city's entire investment in the new Point du Bois power plant, but this only on condition that the company is granted an exclusive right to engage in commercial lighting. The whole proposal is generally taken to mean that the company has become alarmed at its standing before the courts in its dispute with the city and is seeking a settlement. A committee of the Council has the whole matter in hand and will deal with Sir William direct.

Mayor Evans made an announcement at the meeting of the City Council tonight that power would be asked for at this session of the Legislature, which is expected to close this week to submit a by-law to the ratepayers authorizing the city to purchase the power, lighting and street car plants of the Winnipeg Street Railway.

BE YOUR OWN MANICURE

You can train yourself to be your own manicure; there is no need to buy a book on the subject, nor is an elaborately fitted manicure case necessary.

Four implements suffice, and, in fact, three are all that are absolutely required—a pair of nail scissors, a nail file, and a chamois covered polisher will answer all purposes, but an orange stick may be added for keeping the cuticle, or scarf skin, back from the nail.

The nails should be kept just the length of the fingers and trimmed in an oval curve. After trimming the nails push the scarf skin down closely about the base so that the lunula—commonly called the "half moon"—shows distinctly.

If the nails have been neglected it will take time and patience to get them right; but a few weeks' attention daily will accomplish wonders. If the scarf skin has grown upon the nail do not trim it off, but push it carefully back, using the rounded tip of the file; if necessary, lift the skin from the nail, but avoid breaking it. A little polishing powder may be used once or twice a week and a light
