Mail Tour Contest Opens with the Names of Many Lovely and Popular Ladies Placed in Nomination

CHINA FOR THE CHINESE

Rebel Proclamation Sets Forth the Object of the Revolution

Will Establish a Republic and Restore the Land to the People on a Basis of Social Equality

(Canadian Press.)
London, Oct. 16—A copy of the proclamation of the Chinese rebel leaders is published here. After appealing to everyone who has blood in his veins, to follow the example of his ancestor and drive the Manchus out of the country, the proclamation sets forth the object of the revolt which is "To expel the Manchus and restore China to the Chinese, to establish a republic and restore the land to the people on the basis of social equality."

It proposes to carry out these changes in three periods, the first period, of three years, in which a military government will preside over the nation and will cut all national disgrace. The second period of six years in which the military government will furnish the people with the privilege of self-government and take general superintendence over national affairs. The third period in which the military government will relinquish its powers and the constitutional laws will become the basis of administration for all the affairs of the nation.

London, Oct. 16—A Peking despatch to the Times says that General Chih Chang and his staff left for the South Sunday afternoon. Thirteen transport trains were despatched from Peking and Pao-Ting-Fu Saturday and yesterday, eleven will leave today, and ten on Tuesday, carrying in all two mixed divisions of troops numbering 24,000 men of these 20,000 are fighting men.

London, Oct. 16—A Shanghai despatch to a London news agency says Yuan Shikai, who has been recalled by the government and appointed viceroy of Hu Peh and Hunan provinces, has declined to accept the appointment, unless it is accompanied by imperial guarantee of immediate effective reforms and the enforcement of constitutional measures, such as are demanded by the leaders of the present agitation. The insurgents disclaim the character of revolutionaries. They have styled themselves, "The Constitutional Party" contending that the constitution granted by the late emperor has been violated under the existing regime.

CHURCHILL MAY BE HOME SECRETARY

London, Oct. 16—The Chronicle says there are persistent rumors in political circles that Winston Churchill, the home secretary will succeed Augustine Durrell as chief secretary for Ireland. Mr. Durrell's health, it is understood will not permit him to stand the strain of the Home Rule fight next year. He probably will be made a lord of Appeal. The paper also suggests that R. B. Haldane who is leaving the war office to take up a judicial appointment will be succeeded by J. B. Seely, parliamentary secretary to the colonial office.

WILL PURSUE FIRM POLICY

The Turkish Government Will Defend its Rights in Tripoli

Emperor William Holds Conference with Italian Ambassador--Turkish Cabinet may be Impeached

Constantinople, Oct. 16—The Porte is without news concerning the Four-parter of the powers on the question of mediation. The cabinet will make a statement of its policy at a secret meeting of the chamber of deputies on Tuesday. It will declare that the government will undertake no measures of a nature calculated to disturb peace in the Balkans. At the same time, the government will pursue a firm policy in defence of Turkish rights in Tripoli and oppose any solution contrary to the interests of National dignity.
Berlin, Oct. 16—Emperor William who is at his hunting lodge near Eberswalde, Prussia, yesterday invited Signor Alberto Pansa, the Italian ambassador to a conference on the political situation. The German imperial chancellor also attended.
The Tripolitan deputies have addressed a request to the president of the chamber for the impeachment of the late cabinet on account of its conduct in the Tripolitan affair. The Unionist majority in the chamber have decided to elect the Arab deputy for Hama Abdulhamid Zukravi who is a member of the opposition, first vice-president of the chamber and Emmanuel Idia, Greek deputy for Smyrna second vice-president, the object being to conciliate the opposition particularly the Arab element.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT ON MISSOURI PACIFIC

Omaha, Neb., Oct. 16—Seven persons were killed and 22 injured, four of them seriously, in a collision between Missouri Pacific passenger train No. 105 north bound, and a fast freight train at Fort Crook yesterday 10 miles south of this city. The accident is believed to have resulted from a misunderstanding of orders on the part of the freight crew.

BICYCLIST PLUNGED INTO A CANAL

St. Catharines, Oct. 16—A. D. Shadda, prominent jeweler here, nearly lost his life yesterday in a peculiar manner. He was riding a bicycle down a steep hill, when he lost control of the machine. Knowing he would strike the bridge over the canal and probably be killed, he took the only other alternative and steered over the bank into the canal. He would have been drowned but for two women seeing him and bringing help in time.
