LORD ROSEBERY'S SPEECH
WILL RANK AS LITERATURE

London, Oct. 7.—Most people think of Lord Rosebery as a politician and statesman—or perhaps as a Derby winner—rather than as a man of letters, yet Archibald Philip Primrose, fifth Earl of Rosebery, is one of the greatest living masters of the English language. He has written essays and monographs that deserve to become classics, but it is in the spoken word that he excels. Lord Rosebery is pre-eminently the most graceful and polished orator in King George's dominions.

He has just been giving us a taste of his quality in his address as Rector of St. Andrew's University, on the occasion of the quinquenary celebrations of that most ancient of Scottish seats of learning and in that address he has given us a much needed definition of that abused term "culture"—"a large and vague phrase," said Lord Rosebery, "which means, I suppose, the intelligent enjoyment of literature."

So little culture had Scotland in the days when the university was founded, that in 1370 not one of the Scottish nobles could sign his name, and two centuries after its foundation Patrick Earl of Orkney, virtual king of a large part of Scotland, could not repeat the Lord's Prayer, and his execution was postponed for a few days so that he might receive a little religious instruction.

EXPERIENCE OF AN IMMORTAL
 To visualize the progress of the world since the foundation of the university, Lord Rosebery called up the ghost of the first rector by imagining, like Swift's Strudbruggs of the Island of Luggnagg, to be immortal.

"I do not propose to go through the circumstances of the centuries which he would observe and endure," said Lord Rosebery. "But there were some notable facts that one cannot omit. He could scarcely, for one thing, have remained a rector of persons. He would have seen a fair proportion of our few archbishops hanged or assassinated. He would have seen dummy bishops content to collect their lawful incomes for the benefit of unscrupulous laymen, and appointed for no other purpose. He would have seen the Scottish peerage almost annihilated on a single battlefield. He would have seen five of his sovereigns die violent deaths and their like eventually wither and perish in a foreign land. He would have seen the great church which had overshadowed Scotland, full of wealth, power, and renown, fall like the walls of Jericho at the blast of the trumpet which would also blast the material prosperity of St. Andrews. He would have seen the great church which succeeded it, not less ambitious of power, attempt to found a theocracy of which they should be the visible instruments, but ultimately confined by the good sense of the people to its spiritual functions, for its own advantage and for the strengthening of its legitimate action. Each and all of these blows would strike straight to our rector's head, but he would have to survive them."

COUNTRY GAINED MUCH

"How then, would our undying rector ever have been of good cheer," I think he would say, "you have gained enormously in my long recollection, much in freedom, much in prosperity, and in the admiration of mankind for your race. If there are momentary shadows, remember that depression often arises from too limited a view. There are ages and cycles in history. The man who judges from a lustre should enlarge his range. He may live under a cloud for a moment, but should raise his eyes to the hills and remember the eternities. My world, he would say, has disappeared. The ideas, the standards, the human types have all been washed away by the deluge of time; those which I can hardly recognize in their new surroundings are the only fragments to which my memory can attach itself. They, and the waves which they lap them, alone remain. I have seen generations come and go like the tides, and they left me stranded in loneliness. I cannot remember and I cannot forget. I have lived through storm and sunshine, sometimes bewildered by both."

WORLD IS BETTER

"But, he would add, 'has time made events clearer and brought occasions into their true proportion? I have been conscious of progress to the light. I entered upon office in medieval times, forty years before the date of the fall of Constantinople, at which modern history is supposed to begin. That overthrow of the great bulwark of our faith and civilization in the East caused a crash throughout Christendom. It seemed the end of half history, but we have lived through its effects. I have seen cyclones on which thrones toppled over like ninnies, and sublime heads rolled in the dust like apples in an orchard; I have seen eclipses that seemed eternal and rivers, as in Egypt, turn to blood; I have seen life and death and glory chasing each other like shadows on a summer sea, and all has seemed to be vanity. But 12 remain in the com-

viction that, though individuals may suffer, when we take stock of a century at its end we shall find that the world is better and happier than it was at the beginning.

WILL BE BETTER YET

"Sursum corda," he would continue, "and lift up your hearts, for the world is moving onwards. Its chariot wheels may crush for the moment but it does not move to evil; it is guided from above, and guided we may be sure with wisdom and goodness which cannot fail. That is the comfort which even in blackest darkness must afford light; and so, your ancient rector would continue, 'if I am destined to live through the next five centuries and held the millenary of St. Andrews, I shall see no doubt a community as different from this as it is from that of 1411, but much happier, and wiser than the university of 1911 as is the last from the first."

MR. BALFOUR AND THE BARDS.

The services rendered to literature by St. Andrews were referred to also by Arthur Balfour, another ex-Piase Minister of England, who said:

"I believe it to be true that at all events from the time that this university was founded right up to the era when Burns and Scott made the poetry of Scotland and the common heritage, not only of Britain but of the English-speaking peoples, and made it even an international possession, most of the great poets were connected with this university. I am not going to enumerate them, still less am I going to discuss their merits, but I do not think that a ceremony like that of these three great days, ought to come to a conclusion without at all events, those of us who are Scotsmen in this assembly saying something—saying that we remember Dunbar, Lindsay, Douglas, Montrose and last but not least, Ferguson, who if not the inspirer of Burns, was his predecessor and in some sense his master."
