RECIPROCITY AGREEMENT WITH THE UNITED STATES

(Continued from page one.)

jointed, and stove bolts.
Pickets and palings.
Plaster rock or gypsum, crude, not ground.
Mica, unmanufactured or rough trimmed, only and mica ground or bolted.

Feldspar, crude, powdered or ground.
Asbestos not further manufactured than ground.
Fludspar, crude, not ground.
Glycerine, crude, not purified.
Talc, ground, bolted or precipitated, naturally or artificially, not for toilet use.

Sulphate of soda, or salt cake, and soda ash.
Extracts of Hemlock bark.
Carbon electrodes.

Brass in bars and rods, in coil or otherwise, not less than six feet in length, or brass in strips, sheets or plates, not polished, planished or coated.

Cream separators of every description, and parts thereof imported for repair of the foregoing.

Roller iron or steel sheets or plates, number fourteen gauge of thinner, galvanized or coated with zinc, tin or other metal or not.
Crucible cast steel wire, valued at not less than six cents per pound.

Galvanized iron or steel wire, curved or not, numbers nine, twelve, and thirteen wire gauge.

Typesetting and typesetting machines and parts thereof, adapted for use in printing offices.

Barbed fencing wire of iron or steel, galvanized or not.
Coke.

Roller round wire rods in the coil, of iron or steel, not over three-eighths of an inch in diameter, and not smaller than number six wire gauge.

Pulp of wood mechanically ground; pulp of wood, chemical, bleached or unbleached; news print paper, and other paper, and paper board, manufactured from mechanical wood pulp or from chemical wood pulp, or of which such pulp is the component material of chief value, coloured in the pulp, or not coloured, and valued at not more than four cents per pound, not including printed or decorated wall paper.

Provided that such paper and board, valued at four cents per pound or less, and wood pulp, being the products of Canada, when imported there from directly into the United States, shall be admitted free of duty, on the condition precedent that no export duty, export license fee, or other export charge of any kind whatsoever (whether in the form of additional charge or license fee or otherwise) or any prohibition or restriction in any way of the exportation (whether by law, order, regulation, contractual relation, or otherwise, directly or indirectly) shall have been imposed upon such paper, board, or wood pulp, or the wood used in the manufacture of such paper, board or wood pulp, or the wood pulp used in the manufacture of such paper or board.

Provided also that such wood pulp, paper or board, being the products of the United States, shall only be admitted free of duty into Canada from the United States when such wood pulp, paper or board, being the product of Canada, are admitted from all parts of Canada free of duty into the United States.

NOTE.—It is understood that fresh fruits to be admitted free of duty into the United States from Canada do not include lemons, oranges, limes, grape fruit, shaddock, pomelos, or pineapples.

It is understood that fish oil, whale oil, seal oil and fish of all kinds, being the product of fisheries carried on by fishermen of the United States, shall be admitted into Canada as the product of the United States, and similarly that fish oil, whale oil, the fishermen of Canada, shall be the product of fisheries carried on by seal oil and fish of all kinds, being admitted into the United States as the product of Canada.

Articles the growth, product or manufacture of the United States to be admitted into Canada at the undermentioned rates of duty when imported from the United States; and reciprocally the same articles the growth, product or manufacture of Canada to be admitted into the United States at identical rates of duty when imported into Canada.

Rates of Duties.

Fresh meats, viz:—beef, veal, mutton, lamb, pork, and all other fresh or refrigerated meats excepting game,One and one-quarter cents per pound
Bacon and hams, not in tins or jars,One and one-quarter cents per pound
Meats of all kinds, dried, smoked, salted, in brine, or prepared or preserved in any manner, not otherwise herein provided for,One and one-quarter cents per pound
Canned meats and canned poultry,Twenty per cent. ad valorem
Extract of meats, fluid or not,Twenty per cent. ad valorem
Lard, and compounds thereof, cotton-tine and cotton stearine, and animal stearine,One and one-quarter cents per pound
Tallow,Forty cents per 100 lbs.
Egg yolk, egg albumen and blood albumen,Seven and one-half per cent. ad valorem

Fish (except shell fish) by whatever name known, packed in oil, in tin boxes or cans, including the weight of the package:

(a) when weighing over twenty ounces and not over thirty-six ounces eachFive cents per package
(b) when weighing over twelve ounces and not over twenty ounces eachFour cents per package
(c) when weighing twelve ounces each, or lessTwo cents per package
(d) when weighing thirty-six ounces each or more, or when packed in oil, in bottles, jars or kegsThirty per cent. ad valorem

Tomatoes and other vegetables, including corn, in cans or other air-tight packages, and including the weight of the packageOne and one-quarter cents per pound

NEW YORK SCHOOLS COST SOMETHING

New York, Sept. 8.—It will cost approximately \$37,000,000 to run the New York schools for the year 1912. The budget estimates submitted by the various bureaus of the board of education, aggregate a total for the year, in excess of \$36,500,000.

The schools are being run this year on \$29,207,747, the increase for next year, therefore amounting to nearly \$8,000,000. This includes \$4,000,000 additional to the teachers payroll resulting from the adoption of the equal pay principle.

Pekin, Sept. 7.—Missionaries in the outlying districts of Sze-Chuen province have been ordered by the Viceroy to concentrate in the larger towns in consequence of the general unrest among the natives, arising from the government's railroad policy.

All foreigners in Chenglu the capital of Sze-Chuen province are taking refuge in the compound of the missionary society of the Methodist Church of Canada.

Sze-Chuen is a western province a China, bordering on Tibet, it has an area of upwards of 200,000 square miles. The region is very mountainous, some of the mountain ranges reaching a great elevation. The population is estimated at about 8,000,000 far exceeding that of any other Chinese province. The people however rose in rebellion against the railroad policy of the Chinese government, the rising being chiefly against the Sze-Chuen Hankow line.
