MR. FRANK DEL. CLEMENTS FAVORS RECIPROCITY

was issued, showing an increase in the crop of the United States of ten per cent. above the estimate given in the first report. As the result of this, prices dropped to 70 cents, and later to 35 cents for a few days. At these low prices one-half of the crop left the farmers' cellars. In April and May the price rose to 90 cents and \$1.25. In June there was a stronger advance, and at the latter part of the month they were selling at 93.25 a barrel, at which price the balance of the crop changed hands.

"Canadian farmers last fall got 75 cents a barrel at the fields. Then our own shortage was discovered and the price rose to \$1.50.

"Last year was the first in the past seven years that New Brunswick has not shipped potatoes to Boston in large quantities. Three years ago even the small community in York County shipped 225 carloads to American ports.

"The farmers of New Brunswick know that the potato market is liable to violent fluctuations, but they would be satisfied with this condition if they could depend on having a large enough market to enable them to dispose of enough potatoes in the good years to make up for the scanty profits in seasons when the prices are low. The average price received by the potato growers of Maine during the last six years was \$1.50, while the average price the Canadian farmers received was not more than 90 cents. With Reciprocity we would get the benefit of this difference in price."

With regard to hay, Mr. Clements said that some of the shippers in Woodstock have had an American agent there nearly all winter grading the hay and shipping it across the line, and, even although they had to pay the duty of \$4 per ton, they were able to carry on a profitable business. In reply to the argument that the United States does not offer a good market for New Brunswick hay, Mr. Clements explained it by saying that most of the New Brunswick hay is not up to the proper standard anyway. To secure the best hay it is necessary to have a rotation of crops. If we had a big enough market for vegetables we would have so much land turned up for this purpose each year that there would be no difficulty, in the off years for the land, of raising the best quality of hay that could be found anywhere.

If Reciprocity is brought into effect, Mr. Clements says he expects to find New Brunswick farms showing an immediate increase in value from one-quarter to one-half. In a few years he would expect to see New Brunswick one of the largest producers of vegetables and similar products in the world.

TODAY'S MARKET.

There was a large country market this morning. Potatoes sold for \$1.45 per barrel, and were offered in large quantities. Butter brought 22 cents per pound and eggs 22 to 24 cents per dozen.

An attempt is being made to have Mr. Michael Crotty of Stanley exhibit at the local fair a mare and two colts which he owns. The colts are four months old. It is very seldom that twin colts can be raised and the twins would be a great attraction at the exhibition. Mr. Crotty is Mr. Harry Crotty's father.

DEATH AT NASHWAAKSIS.

The death of George G. Gill took place last night at his home, Nashwaaksis, at the age of seventy-four. The deceased is survived by a widow and eight sons. The funeral will take place Sunday afternoon at 2.30. Rev. S. A. Baker will conduct the funeral service. Interment will be made at Sunnybank Cemetery.

TO PAY COUPONS.
