RECIPROCITY MEANS A BOOM FOR CANADA

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—A blue book tabled by Hon. Mr. Fielding today, giving detailed figures as to results of the proposed reciprocity agreement with the States, shows that they would mean a total reduction of customs taxation of \$2,507,824. Of this, \$1,412,210 will affect natural products and other items mentioned in Schedule A. Chief of these reductions will be \$455,246 on coal; \$100,507 on agricultural implements and \$97,117 on flour.

The total reduction to be made by the States on Canadian products reaches a total of \$4,849,933. Some of the chief items are horses and mules, \$121,140; wheat, \$103,519; hay, \$386,028; vegetables, except potatoes, \$160,570; flax seed, \$352,600; fish, \$531,482; sawn boards, \$1,233,624.

An effect of the reciprocity arrangement with the United States, according to W. J. White, chief Canadian immigration agent to the United States, will be a heavy increase in the influx of American settlers to the Canadian west. In the beginning of the year it was estimated that the total for the year would be 120,000 settlers. Reports from agents all over the country now indicate that this figure will be exceeded by 40,000.

Washington, Feb. 6.—Favorable action of the House on the Canadian reciprocity agreement was assured tonight when the caucus of Democra-

tic representatives formally pledged the party to vote for the agreement. The resolution pledging the party was adopted by a vote of 90 to 22, and on motion of Champ Clark the action was unanimous.

The 22 who voted against the resolution, it was explained later, were those who had voted for free lumber, etc., and their action in caucus was to make their position consistent. It was stated that they would vote with the party.

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—Members from the east held the attention of the House for most of today's session. However, before they got a chance to monopolize the floor, there were several matters of interest dealt with.

Mr. Blain, Conservative, of Peel, asked Sir Wilfrid if the government would give serious consideration to the representations of any of the deputations which contemplated coming to Ottawa at considerable expense to make representations as to the effect of the trade arrangement with the United States, if it became effective, or to the special Canadian interests which feared American competition. He wanted to know if the mind of the government was finally made up and if the deputations might as well save expense by staying at home.

"We shall give all the representations of every interest affected the most serious consideration," was the reply of Sir Wilfrid.

INTERESTING RUMOR ABOUT QUEBEC BANK

Montreal, Feb. 6.—Probably one of the most interesting statements heard on the 'Street' as regards banking affairs for some time is to the effect that interests close to the Quebec Bank are quietly negotiating for the control of the Sterling and the Home Banks, for the purpose of organizing one large institution under the energetic management of the Quebec Bank.

It is proposed by those who are said to be making the deal to increase the capital of the Quebec Bank to five million dollars, for double its present paid-up capitalization, and to re-organize in all the territory covered by these three institutions. The Quebec Bank is in a strong position, covering as it does, a wide territory of business. Its capital authorized is \$3,000,000, of which \$2,500,000 is paid up. The bank has a rest fund of \$1,250,000, and has deposits of about \$11,000,000. The Sterling has an authorized capital of \$3,000,000, of which \$944,000 is paid up, while the reserve fund is \$281,616. The home bank of Canada has an authorized capital of \$2,000,000, of which \$1,179,203 is paid, while the reserve is placed at \$375,000.

If the deal is carried through it should strengthen and broaden the influence and importance of the Quebec Bank which is recognized as one of the most competent and progressive banking institutions in Canada.
