WITH "TART" TITUS OFF ST. JOHN BEAT FREDERICTON 3 to 2 IN FAST GAME

M. P. A. A. A. Alleges Titus is Still Under Ban, He Says He Was Reinstated in 1908--Matter Will be Followed Up and Game Possibly Replayed--Disorganized Fredericton Defence Surprised Crowd--Locals Were Off on Shooting.

The St. John "World Beaters" won from Fredericton in the New Brunswick Hockey League at the Arctic Rink last night, but it was a hollow victory as the local seven back of the forward line bore no resemblance at all to the team that represents Fredericton in the league. As it was St. John won by the scant margin of one goal, the score being 3 to 2. The Blue and White did all the scoring in the first half, while Fredericton made its two tallies in the second period, in which the St. John team confined itself mainly to defensive work.

"Fredericton can wipe the ice with that combination with Titus and Babbitt playing," was the frequently expressed opinion after the game.

WHY TITUS DID NOT PLAY.

To get down to brass tacks as far as the changes in the Fredericton defence are concerned, it can be said that the M.P.A.A.A. in its wisdom, dealt Fredericton the hardest wallop it has received this season by wiring the club secretary yesterday to the effect that "Tart" Titus was ineligible to play and that the Fredericton team would be suspended if he were played. At the same time the management of the Marysville Crescents received a similar announcement concerning George Brogan. In some mysterious way it became known that parties in St. John had got busy with the result that Titus and Brogan were put out of hockey. The St. John hockey team was given the credit for the trouble, and when its members appeared on the ice last night they received a most unfavorable reception from the spectators, particularly from the Marysville people. Manager Howard and members of the St. John team however, disclaim any knowledge of the action re Titus and say that the first intimation they had of it was when A. W. Covey, M.P.A.A.A. representative in St. John, informed them just before they left for Fredericton.

POSITION OF MEN.

Brogan was permitted to be played by Marysville under protest until his case was investigated. The investigation has evidently resulted in Brogan being placed permanently in the pro class. His connection with baseball in St. John last summer is said to have settled things for him. In the case of "Tart" Titus, the Fredericton club was not given the chance to play him under protest. Why should Fredericton be treated differently from Marysville?

ECHO OF FROOD CASE.

Titus' suspension was due to the famous Claude Oren Frood case. Frood, now with the Berlin, Ont., pros, played with the Fredericton Capitals under an assumed name in 1908, and his team-mates, including Titus, were suspended as a result. Reinstatements followed after the usual red-tape had been gone through. Titus swore out an affidavit to the effect that he had not committed a breach of the amateur law except by playing with Frood. The affidavit was sworn to before Mr. P. A. Guthrie of this city, and forwarded to J. C. Lithgow of Halifax, at that time president of the M.P.A.A.A. Mr. Lithgow was ill and for some time nothing was done concerning the matter. Titus was finally reinstated and the reinstatement bulletined. His case will not be allowed to rest however, and an effort will be made not only to have him replaced in the position of an amateur, but also to find out what prompted the zeal of the M.P.A.A.A. representatives in St. John in the present matter.

LOCAL TEAM A SURPRISE

The hard game the local team gave St. John was a surprise to every one who saw the game. The forwards were about as they have been during the last fortnight except that Fred McLean was back in the position of rover where he played in splendid style. The defence was entirely different, however from any that has played yet, this season. "Hibby" Binney replaced Titus in the net. "Hibby" has been playing with the U. N. B. second team in practice and except for a few nervous moments played in good style. Any St. John man that went near the net usually received a reminder that he was needed elsewhere. George Walker who played rover in stellar fashion in Chatham was shifted back to point where his playing was such

as to be favorably commented on by all. Jack Feeney played cover point although his position is centre. Jack was not feeling well but nevertheless played good hockey. He failed to use his body in checking however.

COULD NOT SHOOT

The Fredericton forwards played a pretty fast game with McLean the most prominent of the four. Shooting was their weak point. Time after time openings on the St. John net revealed themselves but the Red and White forwards were too slow to take advantage of them. At other times the St. John defence was ready for the shots.

ST. JOHN TEAM

The St. John seven played in good style but not as well as against Marysville. Art Tully replaced Philps at point Philps being under the weather although accompanying the team. Tully was responsible for one of St. John's three goals and his dodging rushes and his hurdling were features of the game. His tendency to hurdle gave him a couple of nasty falls. "Bumps" McAvity at cover point was as strong as an onion. He distinguished himself by being the only St. John man penalized. His cork screw rushes were very much in evidence and his defence play was good. He seldom could get farther than Feeney however, when rushing the rubber. The Blue and White forwards played a good combination Gilbert and Clawson were right on the rubber all the time and the wings played a heady game. There was little to choose between the two teams however on last night's game.

FIRST HALF

Fredericton began the game in aggressive fashion Jack Feeney and Walker rushing the puck to the St. John end repeatedly. Fred McLean was the first man to be given a rest Referee Staples catching him when he cross-checked Hallie Clawson against the boards.

Art Tully the St. John point began his usual game of dodging rushes and hurdling. He received some bad falls as a result of his hurdling. Walker shot after a rush but Pierce saved. Clawson scored the first goal. Binney being drawn out of the net. Tully followed in a minute afterwards beating "Hibby" out with a shot after a rush.

PIERCE KNOCKED OUT

Fredericton with the score 2 to 0 against them made things interesting for St. John sending shot after shot in on the net. A shot from McLean's stick struck Pierce in the groin and put him out. The St. John goal-tender retired to the dressing room but was able to get back on the ice in a few minutes. Percy McAvity scored the last goal on a pretty pass from Gilbert. Fredericton then got back at St. John hard and

play got very lively. McLean and Tully had a sparring match near the St. John goal but stayed on the ice. Fredericton's forwards were having hard luck with their shots. St. John finally relieved the pressure and got away to the other end. "Axwell" Walker checked P. McAvity hard and put him out for awhile. Sandy Staples called it a cross-check and put Walker on the fence for 5 minutes.

SECOND HALF.

The second half was all Fredericton. St. John got through on the Fredericton goal occasionally, but Binney and the other defence men were ready. McLean was prominent in the rushes and Galloway scored two minutes from the beginning of the period from a mix-up in front of the St. John net.

PLAY BECOMES ROUGH.

From the face-off play became rough. Feeney cracked Percy McAvity over the head, but Staples did not see it. Walker took the rubber from one end of the rink to the other. M. McAvity brought it back. Fred McLean got after the big St. John cover point and took the puck from him as easy as taking candy from a child. Tully and Gilbert got away on a combination run, but the puck came back and kept sea-sawing from one end of the rink to the other. M. McAvity caught Rowan against the fence at the St. John end and put him on his face. The trip earned the St. John man three minutes' penalty. Seventeen minutes from the beginning of the half McLean found an opening and slammed the disc in, making the score St. John 3, Fredericton 2. Fredericton tried hard to tie the score and kept St. John on the defensive, but failed to score. Galloway tripped Mooney and was sent off for three minutes. With one man off the ice, the task of evening the score was impossible, and the game ended with the score 3 to 2.

Notice of Legislation

The City of Fredericton will present at the next session of the Legislative Assembly, of New Brunswick Bills for enactment as follows:

(1) A Bill to extend the Water, Fire and Light limits of the City of Fredericton from O'Dell Avenue to the Hermitage (so called) and for authority to issue debentures in aid of such extension.

(2) A Bill in aid of John Palmer Company, Limited, authorizing the City to enter into an agreement with the Company to guarantee and pay interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum on ten thousand dollars of the Company's debentures for the space of ten years, upon the erection by the Company of a new Factory and Warehouse in this city at a cost of not less than twenty-five thousand dollars, to provide a free site for such Factory and Warehouse by paying ground rent for the period of twenty-one years, and to grant exemption from taxes on such buildings of the company and free water from the city system for the period of ten years.

(3) A Bill revising and amending the Civic Election Laws of the City of Fredericton, and to provide for a secret ballot thereat, and the election of the Mayor and Aldermen for two years, one Alderman for each ward being elected annually.

(4) A Bill to confirm the issue of Street Debentures.
