## RAILWAY COMMISSION TO RECOGNIZE UNIONS

London, Oct. 18.—It is expected that the railway commission will recommend the recognition of the railway men's unions in working the conciliation board's established at the instance of Mr. Lloyd-George, but while the labor members of the commission desire that recognition be unconditional, the remaining members stipulate that it should entail corresponding duties, involving penalties in case of non-fulfilment.

## COUNTERFEIT \$4 BILLS ARE IN CIRCULATION

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 18.—Inspector Smith of the Dominion Immigration staff on the border between the United States and Canada, reports that counterfeit \$4 bills are being circulated in border cities, presumably by a gang working from the American side. The fake bills are copies of the old style and pretty clever ones. The new issue, so far as known, has not been counterfeited. One of the bogus bills was passed on the Inspector at Niagara Falls, Ont.

## MEMORIES OF THE DUKE OF CONNAUGHT

(Montreal Witness.)  
Canon Ellegood, D.C.L., the aged rector of the Church of St. James the Apostle, is one of the few Montrealers who recall the Duke's residence here forty-one years ago. A 'Witness' representative spent a delightful half-hour with him as he related much concerning Prince Arthur—now the Duke of Connaught.  
"He came to the city," he said, "in the fall, forty-one years ago, with his regiment. I think it was the 60th Rifle Brigade, and that he held the rank of lieutenant. He was in the city about a year, and lived in the house afterwards occupied by Sir John Ross. Here he entertained in a very lavish manner and, as rector of the church, I was often asked to dine with him. At his dinners and receptions were to be found all the creeds and nationalities of the city, for he was anxious to promote kindly feelings among all people.  
"During the time his regiment was stationed in the city he never missed a Sunday service of the church. He was regular and punctual in his attendance and most reverential in his demeanor, an object lesson for all who saw him. In spite of the many temptations to which his position subjected him, he was a model young man. When he went away he sent me his photo and a nice letter, in which he expressed his appreciation of the service at St. George's. No one could have been kinder to me than he was.  
"I never saw in him any touch of pride. He was a man everybody would like, fond of outdoor sports, into which he entered very heartily. He captured the hearts of the people. I could not say too much in favor of the young prince, yet in spite of his light-hearted, jovial conduct, he seemed to realize the responsibility of his position as a future ruler of men. That was the serious background of his character."  
The aged Canon is hoping that his special memories will not prevent his meeting His Royal Highness when he visits Montreal.  
On Sunday last the rector of the Church of St. James the Apostle, Canon Ellegood, asked for the prayers of his congregation on behalf of their Royal Highnesses, then traveling by sea, adding that special interest was attached to the occasion in consequence of His Royal Highness having been a member of the congregation.  
(Canon Ellegood is a native of Prince William, York County.)

## DOMINION BYE-ELECTIONS TO BE HELD ON NOV. 3

Ottawa, Oct. 16.—At a meeting of the cabinet council this afternoon, it was decided to summon the new parliament on the date already fore-shadowed, namely November 15. It is probable that it will be only a short session devoted principally to the passing of supplies for which there is now urgent need. Prorogation may take place before Christmas and a new session called in February or March, after the government has had time to prepare and map out its legislative programme.

So far the ministry has had no chance to consider any of the larger matters of policy waiting to be dealt with and for some time yet the cabinet will have to devote its principal attention to dealing with accumulated matters of routine administration. The first official act of the Duke of Connaught as governor-general was the swearing in today of the new minister of agriculture, Hon. Martin Burrell, who arrived in the capital this morning from British Columbia. The ceremony took place in the governor-general's office. The duke administered the oath in person, and afterward congratulated the new minister. Mr. Burrell celebrated his fifty-first birthday yesterday.

BYE-ELECTIONS NOVEMBER 3  
Following the ceremony his highness passed several orders-in-council passed on Saturday. One of these changes the dates for the bye-elections for the return of the new ministers. November 1 was the date originally fixed but as this is All Saints day it was decided to postpone the polling day to November 3 with nominations on October 27.

Another order-in-council signed by his royal highness makes temporary provision, by way of governor-general's warrant, for the payment of civil service salaries in cases where the money voted by parliament prior to dissolution has been already exhausted.  
On instruction from the minister of railways Hon. Frank Cochrane, the secretary of the National Transcontinental Railway Commission has issued an order to all contractors engaged on contracts in connection with the railway entered into subsequent to the dissolution of parliament to temporarily cease work.  
The principal reason for the order is that no funds are now available to continue payments on progress accounts when parliament dissolved only five-twelfths of the total vote for the National Transcontinental had been passed. This partial vote was only sufficient to authorize payments

up to the end of last month and pending the passage of further supplies when the new parliament meets, or other provision for providing funds by way of governor-general's warrants, the work on the most recent contracts has been held up.  
The minister of railways is at present out of the city and until he returns later in the week and the question is considered in cabinet council it cannot be definitely stated how long it will be before the contractors are allowed to resume work.  
It was announced that Hon. Mr. Cochrane also has in view an investigation into all the circumstances connected with the awarding of contracts after dissolution. These include the contracts for the car shops at Transcona and for a large number of stations along the line from Moncton to Winnipeg.  
The National Transcontinental commissioners say that any investigation will vindicate their action in the matter. The contracts were in each case awarded to the lowest tenderer and were in accordance with recommendations of the engineers.  
The death of S. R. Poulin, chief engineer of district F, at Winnipeg on Saturday will further complicate the suit now pending against the government by the Grand Trunk Pacific and the contractors on construction work relative to the differences as to classification and overbreak. The amount involved is upwards of half a million dollars. Most of the cases in dispute are in district F, and Mr. Poulin as chief engineer of the district, would have been the principal witness for the government in resisting the efforts of the contractors to obtain larger payments than were allowed them according to the classification of the commissioners' engineers.
