The directors of Agricultural Society No. 34, met yesterday afternoon at the office of Secretary W. S. Hooper of the Exhibition Association. President Campbell was in the chair and all but two of the directors were present at the meeting.

The most important business to come before the meeting was the consideration of action to be taken concerning the purchase of grounds from the Odell Estate the option on which is about to expire. A committee composed of Ald. Calder, Mr. George Y. Dillible and Treasurer, Mr. Tennant was appointed to act immediately in the matter. This committee will complete the details of purchase of the property.

LIGHT COMMITTEE REPORTS

The Light Committee reported that the electric light service furnished while the exhibition was in progress by Superintendent Walter Carr had been entirely satisfactory. It was decided to prepare a testimonial expressing appreciation of the services rendered by Mr. Carr.

DR. LEO-WOLF KILLED
MONSTER MOOSE IN
KESWICK WOODS

Dr. Leo-Wolf of Niagara Falls, N. Y., who has been hunting big-game on the Keswick with Rainsford Allen as guide arrived in the city last evening. He was successful in killing a moose with a handsome head and a spread of horns measuring fifty-eight and a half inches. The carcass of the moose is expected to dress at over a thousand pounds being one of the largest obtained by any hunter in the province this season. Dr. Leo-Wolf is arranging to take the entire carcass home with him. He will leave tonight.

HOWARD CHRISTIE, FOURTEEN,
SHOT IN HEAD AND KILLED

Shooting Excursion of Party of Four Boys at Penniac Resulted in Death of one of the Number-- Tommy Wade who Fired the Fatal Shot "Did not Know it was Loaded"

Howard P. Christie, fourteen years of age, son of Mr. John Christie of Penniac was shot through the head a short distance from his home yesterday afternoon and died about twenty minutes later. The rifle from which the fatal bullet was fired was in the hands of Thomas Wade aged nine years who was one of a party of four boys who were shooting partridge and squirrels. No blame is attached to anyone, the death of young Christie being considered to be entirely accidental. The boy who fired the shot which killed his companion did not know his rifle was loaded. The sad occurrence has cast a deep gloom over the community in which it took place and the family of the victim of the accident has the sincere sympathy of a large number of friends.

PARTY OF FOUR

Four boys, Howard Christiem his brother Willie Christie, and Tommy and Edgar Wade, cousins, went out shooting yesterday afternoon. Edgar Wade and Howard Christie had shotguns, Tommy Wade had a 22 calibre rifle, while the younger Christie had no firearm. Between three and four

o'clock in the afternoon the boys were shooting in a field on the farm of Mr. Alexander Donald. It was there that the shooting took place. The bullet struck young Christie and he dropped at once and never spoke again. He was taken to his home which was but a short distance away and died about twenty minutes after being shot.

DAY NOT DECIDED

The dead boy is the eldest son of Mr. John Christie of Penniac by his second wife. His relatives consider the shooting to have been purely accidental and no action is likely to be taken. Arrangements for the funeral have not yet been completed. Several half-brothers of the dead boy are living at some distance and will not be able to reach home before Saturday. It is probable that the funeral will be on Sunday.

Accidents similar to that which occurred at Penniac yesterday are to be expected at this time of the year when a large number of people are out after game of various kinds. This is the first fatality of the kind which has happened in this section of the province, however, in some time.

SUNBURY-QUEEN'S

RECOUNT THIS AFTERNOON
BEFORE JUDGE WILSON

Proceedings connected with the recount in Sunbury-Queens opened before Judge Wilson in chambers this afternoon at two o'clock. The legal representatives of Col. H. H. 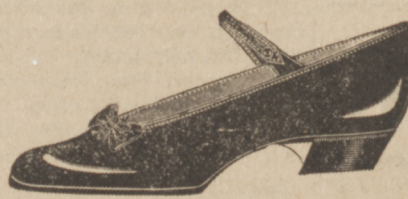


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
