EARL JR. WON FROM RIVALS IN STRAIGHT HEATS IN DETROIT

Detroit, Sept. 22.—Earl Jr., the iron-sided breast-winner of the Cox stable, gave his two rivals a bad beating at the state fair grand circuit races today. There had been so much dispute as to the relative merits of this gray fellow, Evelyn W and Independence Boy that an enormous crowd was on hand.

It may have been that the others could not negotiate the heavy going, but Earl Jr. tripped through it, the last half of the final heat on 1:01, and winning each mile under restraint.

Local pacers fought it out for honors in the 2:12 class race, and there was a bit of scandal in the 2:20 trot. The track dried in spots, but the inside half of the home stretch was mucky in the early afternoon and automobiles were pressed into service to iron it out, while a light harrow hitched to another motor car stirred up the surface.

In the first event the pole horse scored in the middle of the track, but an hour later they were tramping along on the inside rail.

As racing did not start till 2:55 o'clock it was impossible to clear up the card for the day, so it will be resumed at 1 o'clock tomorrow, and as there are five new races and one unfinished, the week-end promises to be notable.

SMALL CROWD SAW EXHIBITION RACES FINISHED ON SATURDAY

Leonard Wilton, Masterpiece and Eugene the Winners—Driver Rideout Fined for Improper Scoring—Lefevre Threatened with Two Years' Suspension for not Driving Tubilina to Win

The Exhibition Meeting at the Fred ericton Park Association's track came to an end Saturday afternoon when three races were run off, rain having interfered with the meet to such an extent that the other races scheduled were called off. Two of Saturday's races were won in straight heats, Masterpiece taking the 2.18 trot and 2.21 pace and Leonard Wilton the 2.15 trot and 2.18 pace. The 230 trot went five heats before Eugene captured first money, Bottom winning the first heat and Our Protien the second. Our Protien was a good second to Eugene in the last three heats but the favorite although pressed hard was able to nose out a win each time.

In the 2.15 trot and 2.18 pace Driver Rideout was fined ten dollars for scoring ahead of the pole horse repeatedly and in the 2.18 trot and 2.21 pace, Lefevre who drove Tubilina was called to the stand by the judges and told to drive to win if he expected to do any more driving this season or next. The warning did not have much effect as Tubilina after being second in two heats was a poor third in the final heat Baby Logan taking second place and as a result third money. The crowd did not take kindly to the performance of Driver Lefevre.

The attendance was small although the weather was fine and the track in first class condition.

2.18 TROT AND 2.21 PACE

There were eight starters in the 2.18 trot and 2.21 pace. Masterpiece showed up strong from the first although Baby Logan has been selling favorite in the pools. There were many in the crowd who thought that Tubilina could make a better showing than she did and that opinion was strengthened by the way the mare was driven. Masterpiece had no trouble winning the first heat with Tubilina second and Premier third.

The second heat began with Premier acting badly Jack Leonard finally getting him away in a poor position. Masterpiece took the lead and held it throughout the mile. Tubilina held second position in such a way that the spectators raised a good loud howl that Lefevre was not driving his horse to win. The judges shared the opinion and Starter Lee called the offender to the stand and told him the risk he ran by using such tactics. Suspension for two years was threatened but did not seem to have much effect. In this heat Premier after delaying matters at the start got going in pretty good style and finished the half in third place. He went bad in the second half and fifth was the best he could get.

The third heat was a repetition of the second. Lefevre made little effort to drive Tubilina and Baby Logan beat her out for second place on the stretch. The best time of the race was 2.18.

2.15 TROT AND 2.18 PACE

Leonard Wilton had things his own way in the 2.15 trot and 2.18 pace. P.K. made him go some in the last heat however, and provided the best finish of the day. Leonard Wilton covered the mile in this heat in 2:14½. Oswego Boy and Prince Louis could not keep their feet in the first heat and the St. Stephen horse was put at a big disadvantage on that account. He pulled up to second position at the half and held it to the finish of the mile. Oswego Boy behaved so badly that he almost got shut out in both first and second heats.

On the second heat of this class got away on the prettiest start of the afternoon. Leonard Wilton raced in the same way that he had in the first heat keeping first place throughout. P.K. in this heat came to the fore, getting second place with Candy Girl third. Prince Louis broke again and again spoiling his chances.

In the final heat the horses finished in the same position as in the second but P. K. made Leonard Wilton go the mile in 2:14½ to win. The finish brought the crowd, if the few spectators could be called a crowd, to its feet.

2.30 TROT

The 2.30 trot was the longest race of the day and it was almost six o'clock when the final heat was run off. Bottom owned by L.B.C. Phair of this city won the first heat. Tommy Raymond took him to the front in the first lap. He went off his feet when near the wire at the end of the first half but held second place. On the back-stretch he again took the lead and finished with Eugene pressing him hard. Bottom got away poorly in the next heat and Achille the Great, a young horse that made a great impression on those who saw

him race, and Our Protien furnished the excitement. Achille finished the half leading with Our Protien second. In the second half Our Protien took first place and Eugene, the horse that was favorite in the betting forced him to the wire. Achille the Great was a good third. In the third heat Eugene came to his own. Bottom was acting badly and was not in it at all. Achille raced well but it was Eugene and Our Protien that made the interest. Our Protien was leading at the half but Eugene was right after her. On the back stretch he came right up on her but a bad break put him back. As the horses came into the stretch it looked like a win for Our Protien but Eugene beat her to the wire winning his first heat. Our Protien got away well in the next heat. She led at the half and until she got into the home stretch where she went off her feet in a bad break and Eugene won. The final heat was one of the best of the day but Our Protien was not able to beat out the Maine horse.

Coach Church of U. N. B. Team Expected Here Today—City Team After Games

The Fredericton City Rugby Football Club will meet at the Queen Hotel at eight o'clock Tuesday night for the purpose of re-organizing for the season of 1911. All persons interested in Rugby, particularly those who have played, are requested to attend, as there are a considerable number of vacancies on the team. SEASON STARTS IN EARNEST.

This week will see the Rugby season begin in earnest. The elections and the exhibition which have interfered with practices and team-organization, are over and the local teams will get down to business. Ben Church, who will coach the U. N. B. team, is expected to arrive here today and take the squad in hand this afternoon. Capt. Bruce Dixon had the College players out Saturday afternoon. The turn-out was a large one and the men worked hard.

CITY TEAM AFTER GAMES.

Fredericton City players will work out at Scully's Grove this afternoon and tomorrow afternoon, weather permitting. Regular practices will be organized after Tuesday night's meeting. Mt. Allison will be here to play U. N. B. in the intercollegiate series and the McGill English Rugby team will also play U. N. B. here on its tour of the Maritime Provinces. The Fredericton City team will try to arrange games with both these teams. The Y. M. C. A. Harriers of St. John, will also be asked for games with the City team. It is probable that the local senior season may open on Saturday next, with U. N. B. and Fredericton City playing.



DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVAL SERVICE

A competitive examination will be held in November next at the examination centres of the Civil Service Commission for the entry of Naval Cadets for the Naval Service of Canada; there will be 25 vacancies.

Candidates must be between the ages of 14 and 16 years on the 1st of January next; must be British subjects and must have resided in Canada for two years immediately preceding the examination; short periods of absence abroad for purpose of education to be considered as residence. Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax, in January next; the course at the College is two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses is approximately \$400 for the first year and \$250 for the second year. On passing out of College, Cadets will be rated midshipmen, and will receive pay at the rate of \$2 per diem. Parents of intending candidates should make application to the Secretary Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before the 15th October next. Further information can be obtained on application to the Secretary, Department of Naval Service, Ottawa.
