EXHIBITION

ATTENDANCE

OVER 30,000

Fredericton's Most Successful Fair Closed Saturday Night--Exhibits Being Shipped Away

The Fredericton Exhibition of 1911 came to an end at 10.30 p.m. Saturday and is acknowledged by all to have been the most successful ever held in this city. Unfavorable weather and the Dominion elections together failed to keep the attendance down and the total for the seven days surpasses that of the fair of 1909, which extended over a longer period, by upwards of two thousand. Secretary Hooper and the other members of the efficient directorate are being warmly congratulated on the success which has attended the 1911 Exhibition which, in addition to the attendance figures, has surpassed preceding fairs in the excellence of exhibits and of amusements and attractions.

The fair grounds are beginning to assume a deserted appearance, the live stock exhibits having been shipped away and the others removed from the buildings. The work of dismantling the booths and exhibits in the main building is proceeding rapidly and the building will soon present its usual appearance.

PRINCIPAL PRIZE WINNERS.

It is announced from the secretary's office that the total number of prize winners is 306. The Hartland Poultry Yards was the largest winner, taking \$307.50 in prize money. R. A. Snowball of Chatham, won \$263.00 and W. W. Black of Amherst, \$254.00. J. Bebbington & Son were the largest local winners, taking \$112.75. Aid. H. C. Jewett of Fredericton, won \$36.00 and The Fraser Lumber Company of Plaster Rock, \$33.50.

MOTOR CAR

INJURED WOMAN SATURDAY NIGHT

Mrs. George E. Logan of Gibson was Struck by a Car on Carleton Street

The most serious automobile accident that has happened in Fredericton occurred Saturday night when a car belonging to the Fredericton Garage struck Mrs. George E. Logan, of Gibson, while she was crossing Carleton Street at the corner of Queen. She was knocked down by the car and suffered injuries about the upper part of her body. No bones were broken however and it is not thought that she suffered internal injuries.

TRIED TO GO BACK

Mrs. Logan and Miss Alice Davenport both of Gibson, were walking up Queen Street. The car driven by Frank Bidlake was going in the same direction. The two ladies thought the car would go up Queen Street and were on the crossing in front of it when it turned into Carleton Street. Miss Davenport ran across the street, but her companion tried to go back and was struck before she could get out of the way. The injured woman was carried to the office of Dr. W. H. Irvine, Carleton Street, where her hurts were attended to, and was afterward conveyed to her home. She will be able to be about in a few days.

DRIVER'S STATEMENT

The driver of the car states that he was driving at low speed and not going more than seven miles an hour when the accident happened. When he saw that his car would strike Mrs. Logan he shut off the power and put on the brake, stopping the car when clear of the injured woman. He says that the wheels could not have gone over her as there was no jar of the car and if they had her injuries would have been much worse than they are. It is thought Mrs. Logan's hurts were caused by the front of the car.

It is fortunate that the exhibition week passed off without any worse accident than that of Saturday night as there have been a large number of motor-cars in the city and some have travelled at a high rate of speed.

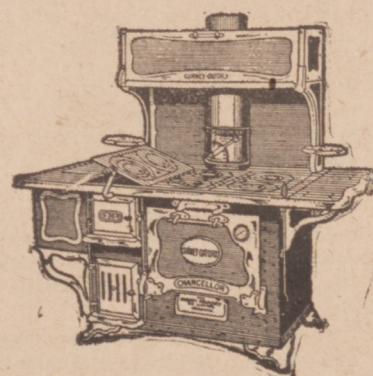
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
