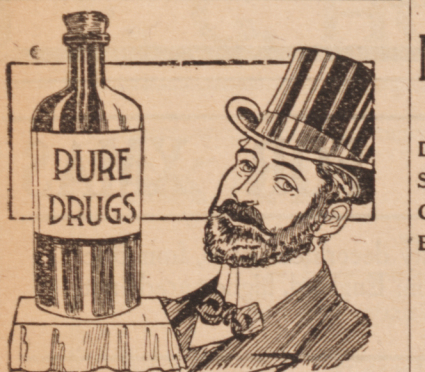

## RETRENCHMENT THE KEYNOTE OF DIX'S MESSAGE

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 4.—Retrenchment and economy is the keynote of Governor Dix's first message received by the legislature today, at its opening session. While recognizing the important work of the water supply commission, the governor recommends its consolidation with the forest, fish and game commission in a single which shall have charge of the natural resources of the state. He urges the adoption of a state wide direct primary law and recommends that the ballot law be so changed that the name of a candidate may appear in but one place. He favors a federal income tax, and a parcel post and the Election of United States senators by popular vote.

## KILLED DURING A POLITICAL DISPUTE

Ste. Martine, Jan. 3.—Bitter political feeling accounts for the fact that Zepherin Primeau of Ste. Martine is dead, after it is alleged he was struck on the head by Arthur Vallee, of Montreal, who was defending his aged father with a cider bottle.

It was a case of Liberal versus Conservative in the argument, which started in a hotel at Ste. Martine, county of Beauharnois, and was later continued outside.

When Cyrille Vallee, aged 65 years went to the Ste. Martine station Saturday night to meet his son Arthur, who was coming from Montreal to spend New Year's Day, he found the train was late.

So he returned to the Vinette Hotel and there met Zepherin and Elou Primeau, who belong to a Conservative family in Beauharnois. Vallee was a Liberal and the present political situation was the subject of their quarrel.

They adjourned outside and there Arthur Vallee, the son, who has just left the train, joined the group. At this point, it is stated Zepherin Primeau pushed Vallee's father who fell on the side of the road.

RESENTED ATTACK ON FATHER.

The son drew a cider bottle from his pocket and it is alleged struck Primeau on the left side of the face, felling him. The injured man was taken to a relative's house and died yesterday morning.

Young Vallee left Ste. Martine for a friend's place fifteen miles away. Coroner Bresner opened an inquest at which Arthur Vallee was not present. As the Coroner knew Vallee's father he said he would not give

## MUCH DAMAGE FROM EARTHQUAKE IN TURKESTAN

New York, Jan. 4.—The earthquake shocks recorded at West Bromwich, England, between 11.35 o'clock last night and 3.56 o'clock this morning, and felt in Russian Turkestan from 4 to 4.30 o'clock this morning, correspond allowing for the difference in time with the disturbances reflected by the seismographs at Georgetown University, Washington, and other points in this country between 6.31 and 9.03 last night. Apparently Russian Turkestan bore the brunt of the violence.

Tash Kent, Asiatic Russia, Jan. 3.—A violent earthquake was felt at various points at Asian Turkestan from 4 to 4.30 o'clock this morning.

Many buildings were destroyed and there were a number of fatalities, though the loss of life is not known. Great fissures opened in the ground. Practically all of the stores and residences at Vyerny, the capital of the territory of Semiretshensk, were destroyed or damaged. The city has a population of 23,000. Communication in the disturbed district is interrupted.
