

Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of

intending homesteader. Duties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of on a farm of at least 80 acres solely or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties-Must reside upon the homestead

pre-emption six months in each of six Admission 25 and 15 cents years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain dis tricts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties-Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
