ORGANIZATION OF SUMMER SCHOOL COMPLETED TODAY

DR. C. C. JONES

Dr. C. C. Jones, Chancellor of the U. N. B., introduced his short address by making a few facetious remarks. Mr. Starratt had referred to the ice-cream and its absence at the present time. He must say that the strawberry-ice-cream and not the ice-cream was what was to be expected at this season. On behalf of the University of New Brunswick he welcomed the school and hoped its members would see fit to climb the hill and visit the University.

MR. T. B. KIDNER

Mr. Starratt introduced Mr. Kidner local secretary of the school. Mr. Kidner said that his association with the Summer School had been shortly after he came to Canada eleven years ago when Dr. Robertson had assigned him to the school then meeting at Bear River, N. S. At that session he had made many firm friends. He felt sure that his farewell session of the school would remain as bright and dear to him as the initiatory one.

REV. MR. STEBBINGS

Rev. Mr. Stebbings made a brief address of welcome to the visitors. Mr. J. J. Weddall on behalf of the local School Board spoke in a similar vein. Rev. Neil McLaughlan also made a brief address of welcome.

SUPT. MCKAY

Dr. A. H. McKay, superintendent of education for Nova Scotia was next heard. Dr. McKay said that he was present to show the warm feelings which Nova Scotia had toward the Summer School of Science and toward the educational administration of New Brunswick. He paid a glowing compliment to the natural beauties of the River St. John.

The great idea of the Summer School, he said, was to give teachers some idea of how to make children study their environment. The man whom Nature is helping is on the highroad to success. The Summer School was held to enable people to get closer to Nature.

SECRETARY SEAMAN

Mr. J. D. Seaman was introduced

by the president. He made a number of important announcements. Referring to the financial arrangements Mr. Seaman said that Fredericton teachers had been granted a special rate of admission because Fredericton had given a generous grant of \$150. Mail for students, he stated, would be delivered at the school office. It would not be necessary to miss classes to obtain enrollment. Arrangements had been made by Capt. Borden to extend the course of physical training so that it will continue after the close of the school meeting. Special buttons to distinguish students of the school would be supplied by the office. Mr. Seaman urged every student to wear one.

MORNING SESSION

This morning the organization of the school was begun and practically completed. The departments were assigned classrooms and classes were organized. It was found that many classes were filled to overflowing. The total attendance of the school being far in advance of any figure reached before.

PHYSICAL DRILL

Capt. A. H. Borden superintendent of physical drill in the schools of the Maritime Provinces arrived in the city this morning and visited the Summer School for the purpose of arranging courses of physical drill for the teachers. A staff of four sergeants from the Royal Canadian Regiment has been assigned for the purpose of instructing the teachers and it is probable that the staff will have to be increased. The instructors are Sergt. Billedeau and Sergt. Endall of No. 3 Regimental Depot of this city and Sergt. Wallace and Sergt. White from the Halifax garrison. The courses began this morning a large number of those in attendance at the school drilling on the grounds of the Normal school under the direction of the instructors.

EVENING SESSION

This evening Dr. G. U. Hay of St. John will deliver an address on a most interesting subject "The Flowers of England and Eastern Canada." The public is invited to attend the session.

TERRIBLE HORROCAUST IN NEW ONTARIO

(Continued from page one)

"Our last report from Porcupine shows conditions to be very serious. Ore Lake, South Porcupine, Pottsville, West Dome, Dome, East Dome, and all the mines in that section are completely wiped out. Mr. Weiss, manager of the mines at West Dome, Mr. Child and twenty men are reported to be burnt to death and suffocated.

The latest report is that our camp No. 9 is all right. Our reports say that over fifty are dead, and over two hundred are injured. The Dome mines are having a special train to take all their men so injured through to Cooper Cliff. We have just sent in a train of eleven cars and two baggage cars to bring out the injured from Porcupine.

"We are using our field hospital to the largest extent."

REFUGEES ARRIVE

Englehart, Ont., 13-A special from

Porcupine pulled into Englehart at twenty minutes past twelve this morning bearing twenty-five refugees. Behid in three box cars huddled on blankets were twenty two injured men three women and two corpses of men who died during the journey. The others were injured from the West Dome which had suffered most severely.

Captain Meeks of the Dome and Mrs. Meeks were on board. Captain Meeks is blind. The injured are being taken to New Liskeard, Halleybury and Copper Cliff. They are accompanied by several doctors and a volunteer staff. Supplies were put on board at Englehart for the sick. Another refugee train is leaving Porcupine. Over forty bodies are still in the lake. The death roll is reported at two hundred. Residents fled in the lake in boats and most upset in a squall.

and fancy goods, and get big money for them. I was told today that F. B. Edgcombe & Co., Ltd., paid two families along \$700 this season for fancy goods and they spent all of it. They have no bank account.

Dr. McGrath, who was at the Reserve every day several times, I think would vouch for our work in trying to care for them to the best of our ability; also the police, or guards, who brought ds orders, lots of which we filled and others we turned down.

Now, in conclusion, I might say, my orders to Mr. Morgan in the presence of Mr. Smith was:—"Give cash prices on this contract, as we will receive cash for it on completion," which I thought was right. I only get thirty days terms on groceries and a lot of this bill was cash, as I have shown. If I want more than thirty days from a wholesale firm they ask 7 per cent. interest. I cannot afford to lie out of this money without making a charge of interest. We gave 27 lbs. flour and 20 lbs. sugar for \$1.00 and all other goods at similar cash prices, which you will find on inquiry was leaving us a very small margin for profits. We, as a store, did our best to please and I would ask the Board of Health to get together and order this bill paid before interest accumulates, because they must know it is impossible for me to accept anything less than my bill with interest after thirty days. Trusting this will make matters plain for the public and thanking you for your valuable space, I remain,

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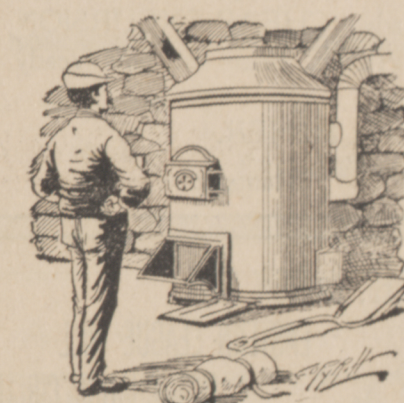
