WIFE SAYS "TONY" FAUST IS INSANE

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 21.—An inquiry into the mental condition of Anthony R. Faust, a wealthy restaurateur known as "Tony" Faust, was begun today before Judge Holcomb in the Probate Court. The inquiry is the result of charges made by Mrs. Faust, who alleges that her husband is insane and incapable of looking after his business affairs. Other members of the Faust family agree with the wife that Mr. Faust is insane. In the opinion of the medical experts, it is said Mr. Faust has been afflicted with acute paresis for several months.

"Tony" Faust is one of best known men in St. Louis. He is the son of the late Anthony Faust and a brother of Edward Faust, vice president of the Anheuser-Busch Brewing Company. When the elder Faust died several years ago "Tony" Faust succeeded him as proprietor of a catering company and several large restaurants.

The Daily Telegraph's Peking correspondent says that anonymous letters have been received by Yuan Shi Kai, warning him that an attempt is to be made to assassinate him and the members of his family. The premier is constantly surrounded by a guard, fearing a revolutionary bomb.

THE NE TEMERE CASE IS IN STATU QUO

Montreal, Nov. 20.—With the withdrawal this morning of Eugene Hebert in the case to decide whether his marriage by a protestant minister of Marie Emma Cloutier was legal under the provisions of the Ne Temere, there is every possibility that the now famous marriage annulment may never be decided by the courts. Following the announcement last week that he had no funds to fight opposition of his former wife to the annulment of their marriage by the Church authorities Mr. I. LeFebvre when court opened before Judge Archer this morning, formally filed the withdrawal on which judgment will be rendered tomorrow. This procedure will be but formal, as Justice Archer this morning granted the defendant permission to retire. Mrs. Hebert's lawyers will tomorrow make a motion upholding the opposition that has been entered on behalf of Mrs. Hebert to Judge Laradeau's judgment which declared the marriage invalid in the eyes of the law. This motion will be allowed by the court, and Judge Laradeau's decision will be declared null and void, thus leaving the matter just where it previously stood. The church will continue to regard the marriage illegal, and the child of the union illegitimate.

INTERESTING NOTES FROM KING'S COLLEGE

On Monday of last week Archdeacon Benson representing the M.S.C.C., addressed the students in the College Chapel on missionary problems of the Canadian Northwest. He referred particularly to work among the Indians, giving a most interesting picture of their domestic life. He was enthusiastic and earnest and his address was a special treat.

The Students' Missionary Society met on Tuesday night to consider mission work in the outlying district of Windsor. Enlistment of volunteers was arranged for. The Society is to be represented at the Men's Missionary Convention, Halifax by Messrs Harrison, Dwyer, Holmes and others. On Tuesday the Rev. Mr. Hall representing the B. & T. Sailors' Society presented "Nelson Shields" to the University and the Collegiate School. In the absence of the President, the Rev. G.P. Martell acted as Chairman. Among the presentations were a brooch, made from the metal of Nelson's flagship Victory to Mrs. Powell, another of the same kind to Mrs. Handsombody, a cane with a Victory metal band to Mr. Handsombody and a watch fob to Mr. P. A. Buckle.

President Powell who has been giving addresses on King's College in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick for the past 5 or 6 weeks has returned to his duties at the College. He reports an increasing interest in King's. This interest has evinced itself in liberal contributions to the Forward Movement.

BATTLESHIP FIGURES IN MURDER TRIAL

Boston, Mass., Nov. 21.—To further the ends of justice the United States battleship Nebraska left her place with the North Atlantic squadron and is now berthed at the Charlestown navy yard awaiting inspection by the jury in the case of James Beeks, who was placed on trial in the United States circuit court here today for the alleged murder of Alexander Allen. Beeks and Allen both negroes, were messmates in the Nebraska. The killing of Allen occurred on the battleship while she was at the Charlestown navy yard last May. It is expected that the jury will be asked to view the scene of the tragedy. On application of counsel for the accused negro the Navy Department ordered the Nebraska to return to Boston for the trial. Beeks claims that the shooting of Allen was in self-defence.

MCDONALD TRIAL BEGINS AT WASHINGTON

Washington, D. C., Nov. 21.—Edward J. McDonald is on trial before Judge Anderson in the district criminal court on a charge of first degree murder in connection with the death of his wife, Gertrude McDonald. McDonald and his wife had been separated, and according to the prosecution, he invited her last May to meet him at a lawyer's office in one of the large downtown office buildings to sign certain papers. When the couple met they quarreled, it is claimed, and McDonald shot the woman to death in the corridor of the building.

SERIOUS TRAIN WRECK NEAR SYRACUSE, N. Y.

Syracuse, N. Y., Nov. 21.—Two men were killed four seriously hurt, and others slightly injured this morning, when a Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg passenger train collided with a freight at the New York Central crossing near the iron pier.
