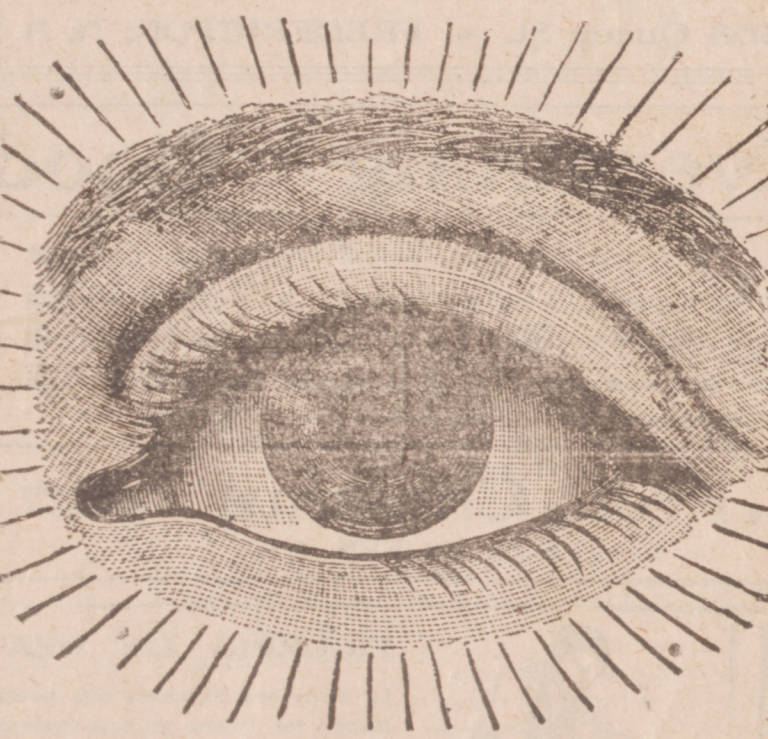

FRED TAYLOR WANTS TO PLAY WITH OTTAWA

Wanderers own the Player, however
and will not Release him--Rankin
with them

(Montreal Herald.)
Fred Taylor, the Listowel Cyclone, was in Montreal Saturday interviewing President Sam Lichtenheim, of the Montreal Wanderers, in the subject of his transfer from the Renfrew team to the Wanderers. Taylor still maintains that it will materially interfere with his future prospects to play in Montreal this winter, and wants to play with Ottawa. Ottawa, also, would be very glad to have their former cast-off back with them again. Consequently, Taylor has made fancy offers to Taylor. Taylor can only accept these offers with the consent of the Wanderer Club, and the Wanderer Club doesn't want to consent.

The Wanderer Club, however, may make a proposition that will be attractive enough to Taylor to induce him to play with the Wanderers. Rankin, the eastern O.H.A. star, has accepted the Wanderers' terms, and will play with the Wanderers on not at all, says President Sam Lichtenheim.

MATTY BALDWIN FOUGHT TO DRAW WITH MANDOT

Memphis, Nov. 20.—Joe Mandot, the Southern aspirant for the lightweight title, and Matty Baldwin, of Boston, fought eight fast rounds to a draw tonight before the Southern A. C. Mandot had an easy lead until the final rounds, when Baldwin finished strong, landing hard rights. He had Mandot staggering in the seventh and eighth.

A large crowd witnessed the bout. A free-for-all fight stopped the contest for ten minutes shortly after the principals commenced the fourth round.

Referee Haack's decision of a draw in the main bout created applause and hoots. The Southern fight fans, who laid 2 to 1 that Mandot would win, could not see any justice in the verdict of a draw, but impartial critics were unanimous in supporting the referee.

Baldwin opened the first round with a fusillade of rights and lefts and had Mandot on the defence before the end of the round. Baldwin tired, however, but came back strong in the seventh and eighth. He staggered Mandot with a right to the point of the jaw in the seventh and repeated twice to the same spot in the final session.

It is likely that the boys will be matched for a return engagement.

HOCKEY NOTES

The N. E. A. season opens Dec. 27. Wanderers have open dates for 10 days, and if arrangements can be made will visit Halifax.

Advices from Sydney are that a new rink will be built this winter. There are a number there who would like to see Sydney in the pro league. With two teams in Halifax this year, Halifax will likely have two games a week.

Moncton will surely have a team, and reports say they are securing a strong aggregation.

Final arrangements for the pro hockey season will be made this week and schedule announced.

The two hockey teams in Halifax this winter will be backed and managed by well known lovers of sport. They will be under distinct and separate management; neither will have any connection with the other, and the Arena management will not be connected with either team.

KILLILEA DROPS NEGOTIATIONS FOR BOSTON NATIONALS

Owners Named Figure Cincinnati man
Thought was Unreasonable--Propo-
sition may be Made Again

(Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 20.—) The price asked for the Boston Nationals was so high we dropped negotiations," declared Henry J. Killilea, tonight upon his return from Cincinnati, where he has been negotiating for the purchase of the Eastern team with former Manager Baird of the Michigan University Athletic Department.

Mr. Killilea said that the reports as to his visit and his negotiations for the Boston team were true and that it was correct that Baird was trying to land in professional baseball. Mr. Killilea said he had always been interested in the National game and was not averse to again becoming a magnate.

"We had our conference and then made an offer for the Boston team," Mr. Killilea continued, "but when we had made our offer the present owners made a counter proposition which was so far beyond any possibility of our considering that we immediately dropped negotiations. We consider now that the deal is off."

Asked if he would resume negotiations if the Boston owners cut their figure, Mr. Killilea said he was always open to receive a proposition on any subject, but was not looking far anything further from Boston.

FRED TENNEY IS AFTER MIKE DONLIN

New York, Nov. 20.—Fred Tenney, manager of the Boston National League baseball team, came to New York today and had a long conference with Manager McGraw of the Giants. Neither of the managers was willing to tell what the result of the conference has been, but it is likely that the New York leader made a proposition to trade Jack Murray and some cash for Mike Donlin.

It is known that McGraw is anxious to obtain a new right fielder for next season and would like to secure Donlin, who batted last year for .315.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate erect a house worth \$300.00.
