SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

PROTEST RE ST. JOHN GAME IS FORWARDED

M. P. A. A. Changes Ground Rules—Titus' Alleged Ineligibility—Brogan Declared Professional Permanently.

The protest of the Fredericton Hockey Club concerning the Fredericton—St. John game and the demand that it be replayed, has been forwarded to W. W. Watling of Chatham, secretary of the N.B.H.L. The league executive will now have to deal with the matter.

Archie Babbitt conferred with the M.P.A.A.A. representatives at St. John yesterday. The result of the conference was that George Brogan, of Marysville, was declared a professional. In the case of "Tart" Titus, the M.P.A.A.A. has discovered a loop-hole through which it is trying to squirm, in the fact that there had been a delay about Titus' registration. The original declaration of Titus' ineligibility was not based on that however, as Secretary McMillan's reply to the telegram concerning Titus' case dealt with registration only incidentally. FRANK KLAUS PUT LEWIS ALMOST OUT

New York Feb. 8.—Frank Klaus of Pittsburgh gave Willie Lewis of New York such a trouncing in their bout at the Fairmount Athletic club last night that the referee stopped the milling in the middle of the sixth round. It was technically a knockout although Lewis was on his feet before the fatal 50 seconds had been counted. Klaus had toppled him over twice in that round with the right uppercut to the jaw.

Lewis was weak as a babe but courageously tried each time after he had been knocked down to regain his feet. Rather than have him knocked out and probably injured the referee stopped the bout.

Lewis was no match for Klaus. This was apparent to all the members in the first round when Klaus put him down for the count of nine with a lightning right swing to the jaw. After stalling for a minute Lewis sent over a hard right to Klaus face.

Klaus continued to force the fighting in the second session. He was very aggressive and ripped in two hard right hooks to the short ribs, Lewis after keeping on the defensive for two minutes sent a hard, left to Klaus' face.

In the sixth round, Klaus with hard swings to the jaw forced Lewis to the ropes. Then the Pittsburgh man hit him a terrible blow on the point of the chin. Lewis was doubled under him and he fell to the floor. After a hard effort he pulled himself to his feet. As soon as he regained his equilibrium Klaus flew at him with a shower of left jabs and uppercuts knocked him down again. Lewis was all in but game. While he was struggling to rise the referee lifted him to his feet and motioned to Klaus that it was all over.

NEW GLASGOW GAVE MONCTON VERY HARD RUN

Score 6 to 5 in Game at Moncton Last Night—Mike Murphy Starred for Losers.

Moncton, N.B., Feb. 8.—It took Moncton seven minutes overtime to play to win from New Glasgow in the professional hockey league series here tonight, the final score being 6 to 5. At half time the score was 3 to 2 in favor of Moncton, but soon after the second half began New Glasgow scored three goals in a comparative short time, while Moncton scored one. It looked like New Glasgow's game within a minute of the time, but ten seconds before the gong sounded, Nicholls shot a goal that tied the score.

It was a narrow escape for Moncton, and the game was only pulled out after a majority of the spectators considered it lost.

New Glasgow showed great improvement since they played here last. Mike Murphy was the star of the New Glasgow team, Gregory, Williams and Dunphy also showed up in good form. The visitors played a strong defence, Morrison making many fine stops.

For Moncton, Doran starred, but the whole team played well. Nicholls scored the most important goals of the game, the tie and winning one. Scott showed his usual good form, while the veteran Joe Crockett proved his sterling qualities.

WOLGAST AND K. O. BROWN FOUGHT DRAW

Philadelphia, Feb. 8.—Ad Wolgast, lightweight champion of the world, and Knockout Brown, of New York, fought a hard six-round draw before the American Athletic club in this city tonight.

Although the New Yorker had a slight advantage in the majority of the rounds, his blows lacked steam, compared with those of the champion. Wolgast seemed unable to fathom the peculiar style of Brown, and the latter many times landed on Wolgast's head and body without a return. Wolgast tried all the tricks of the trade to reach his opponent, rushing and roughing to such an extent that he was warned by the referee on two occasions.

Brown never fought a better battle during his career, while the showing of the champion, especially in the early rounds, was a disappointment. As Wolgast became more accustomed to Brown's style, he fought in much better form.

Digger Stanley, champion bantamweight of England, was defeated by Tommy O'Toole of this city; Joe Jeannette had the advantage over Jim Barry, and Jimmy Carroll, of California, outpointed Young Okeart of New York, in the preliminaries.

DEMOCRATS FAVOR TRADE AGREEMENT

Washington, D. C. Feb. 7.—A caucus of Democratic members of the House of Representatives last night pledged the party to vote for the reciprocity agreement thereby ensuring its passage by the House.

The resolution was adopted by a vote of 90 to 22 and on motion of Champ Clark the motion was made unanimous.

The 22 who voted against the resolution were those who had voted for free lumber, etc., and their action in caucus was to make their position consistent. The resolution as follows:

"Whereas The Canadian reciprocity agreement negotiated by the reciprocity commission of Canada and the President of the United States while not formulated in accordance with the Democratic platform demands is a reduction of some of the prohibitive schedules in the Payne tariff laws will tend to expand the trade of the United States in the Dominion of Canada and is in part a recognition of the principles which the Democratic party has contended for in the congress and in its platform. Therefore be it.

"Resolved that this caucus endorse the Canadian reciprocity agreement and bind ourselves to vote for a bill carrying it into effect."

Notice of Legislation

The City of Fredericton will present at the next session of the Legislative Assembly, of New Brunswick Bills for enactment as follows:

(1) A Bill to extend the Water, Fire and Light limits of the City of Fredericton from O'Dell Avenue to the Hermitage (so called) and for authority to issue debentures in aid of such extension.

(2) A Bill in aid of John Palmer Company, Limited, authorizing the City to enter into an agreement with the Company to guarantee and pay interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum on ten thousand dollars of the Company's debentures for the space of ten years, upon the erection by the Company of a new Factory and Warehouse in this city at a cost of not less than twenty-five thousand dollars, to provide a free site for such Factory and Warehouse by paying ground rent for the period of twenty-one years, and to grant exemption from taxes on such buildings of the company and free water from the city system for the period of ten years.

(3) A Bill revising and amending the Civic Election Laws of the City of Fredericton, and to provide for a secret ballot thereat, and the election of the Mayor and Aldermen for two years, one Alderman for each ward being elected annually.

(4) A Bill to confirm the issue of Street Debentures.
