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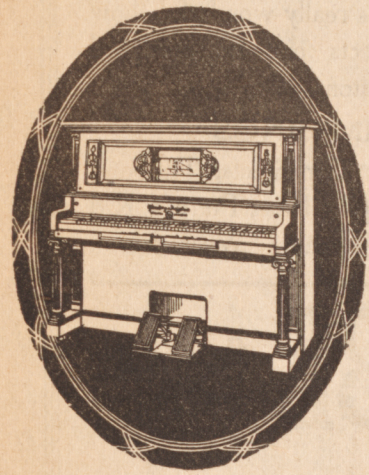

THE MISSES YOUNG

DIME NOVELS WORSE THAN CIGARETTES

Montreal Feb. 7.—There it was the duty of "the teachers and parents of warn their boys against the dangers of reading dime novels was the contention of the Rev. Frank Day at Zion Congregational Church last night.

"Some time ago," said Mr. Day, "there appeared in the Montreal Herald, a paper to which Montreal owes a great deal, and which is always ready to combat civic evils, an article dealing with the dime novels' so-called that were sold in Montreal. It spoke of the dangers of this kind of literature to the boys of the city and the ease with which it was obtained."

After quoting a number of the titles of current dime novels mentioned in the Herald's article such as "Nick Carter's Sataric Enemy," "Diana the Demon," etc., Mr. Day said that although he was perfectly prepared to acknowledge the fascination of such fiction on the minds of boys, he felt certain that the desire on their part could be fully satisfied through a supply of interesting and at the same time harmless literature. "I need not speak of the dangers of dime novel reading," continued the speaker, "for all portrayals of crime are dangerous. The danger being acknowledged, the question is, what can be done to overcome the evil?"

Boys might be brought to read wholesome literature, Mr. Day considered through the influence of the home and school. Parents and teachers would have numberless opportunities to speak to their boys on the subject of literature and he felt that if the boys were once interested in the proper kind, they would throw the dime novels away of their own accord.

"Dime novel reading, is, in my opinion," concluded Mr. Day, "worse than cigarette smoking."

LA ROSE TO INCREASE DIVIDEND

A despatch from New York makes the interesting announcement that at a meeting of the directors of the La Rose Consolidated Mines Company, to be held in that city next month, an increase in the dividend rate will be made, and that it will be at the rate of 10, if not 12 per cent., per annum.

When shown the despatch, Mr. D. Lorne McGibbon stated that the directors will meet in a few weeks to discuss La Rose affairs, and that it was quite possible that the question of an advance in dividend might come up for consideration.

"It is no secret," said Mr. McGibbon, "that La Rose has cash on hand of at least \$1,000,000, while we have a large quantity of ore at the mines. Development work is proceeding at all the properties, and the directors are well satisfied with conditions at the mines."

"One thing is certain," concluded Mr. McGibbon, "the La Rose properties are being worked in the interest of the shareholders, and the money in the treasury is theirs, so that sooner or later it will be distributed among them in some form or another."

CEMENT REPORT IS A FINE EXHIBIT

(Montreal Herald)
In the financial report of the Canada Cement Company for year ended Dec. 31, 1910, there are two outstanding features deserving favorable consideration of all shareholders.

During the year the company so perfected its manufacturing and sales organizations that the price of cement was voluntarily lowered to a price below that of any previous period except a short time in 1909. Shareholders will recognize excellent business tactics in this reduction. Consumption is stimulated and contractors have a stable supply at a price which is not likely to fluctuate to any great extent during the course of a big contract.

The other outstanding feature of the report is the exceptional strength of the company's financial position, in the large amount of cash on hand and other quick assets, compared with the amount of current liabilities. After being in operation less than fifteen months, the company is able to show cash on hand of no less than \$916,169, and total current assets of \$2,633,450. This contrasts with the current liabilities of \$539,46. The cash on hand is sufficient to meet three years' fixed charges, even if the product for that period were sold at cost.

On the "Street," the average trader has worked out the proportion of surplus available on the common stock as 1.05 per cent., and has based all market cement on that analysis. In some cases there has been disappointment that the company did not earn a higher percentage on its common stock, but it should be remembered that not only did the company give its customers some benefits, but added \$160,000 out of revenue to re-

It also should be remembered that only 57 per cent. of capacity was utilized, and that the year just closed was one of almost educational.
