**SHERIFF, DEPUTY AND TWO PRISONERS PERISH IN STORM**

Ellsworth, Nov. 24—The finding of the body of Deputy-Sheriff Finn at the lower end of Green Lake, solves the mystery of the disappearance of Sheriff John E. Webster and his deputy, Joseph D. Clough, aged 30, and Arthur E. Colson 23 whom the officers are supposed to have had in custody. The first body was found about 10 o'clock and the news of the recovery of the others is expected at any time.

Finn's body was found about 100 feet from the shore in front of Camp Comfort where Clough and Colson who had been shaving hoop poles have been staying.

The finding of an oar and a man's hat probably Clough's on Black Island near the lower end of the lake early Friday morning made it practically an assured fact that the men had met their death in the lake, and the cove was dragged diligently with the result that Finn's body was brought to the surface in a short time, it being found about 10.30 o'clock Friday morning.

Sheriff Webster and Deputy Finn, who acted as turnkey at the jail left Ellsworth Wednesday expecting to return at night. They left the jail in which there are at present only two prisoners confined in the charge of the housemaids, and before they left informed the maids that they would return before supper time.

**ARRESTED ON WEDNESDAY.**

It is supposed that the two officers took their prisoners in custody on Wednesday afternoon on their arrival at Camp Comfort and then started out to cross the long cove to the opposite shore thereby saving a walk of about three miles. It was one of the roughest days on the lake for years, Wednesday and when the boat got away from the shelter of the land it is supposed to have capsized. The four men hampered by their heavy clothing were unable to save themselves.

Finn is married and besides his widow leaves one daughter. Sheriff Webster leaves a widow and one son about twelve years old.

**LONG SEARCH**

Ever since Thursday morning a diligent search has been made for the missing men, but without result and the belief that they are both dead prevailed here before the fact was definitely determined. The tragedy has cast a pall over the city.

Two searching parties one of thirty men from Ellsworth and a similar number from Ellsworth Falls left Friday for the lower end of Green Lake where the two men were last seen and diligent search was begun. The Sheriff was bound for Camp Comfort which is located at the lower end of Green Lake on a point of land, known as Scott's Neck. In the camp the two hoop pole shavers Clough and Colson were living.

The sheriff so it had been learned, had received a complaint that the camp at the lower end of the lake belonging to John Thornton of Bangor, had been broken into, and he was going to Camp Comfort to see what the two men there knew of the affair.

Sheriff Webster and Deputy Finn were last seen at the home of Simeon Garland on the Reed's Brook road, which is about nine miles from Ellsworth. Here they left their horse and buggy and started off through the woods for the lake. In addition to their revolvers both men were armed with rifles presumably in the hope of finding some game along the way.

At the Garland place they left but one feed of oats for their horse, and gave the impression there that they intended returning in a short time.

**WIFE ALARMED**

Mrs. Webster, the sheriff's wife was alarmed when she found that her husband did not return home, Wednesday night and she sent Harvard C. Jordan and Harry W. Haynes to Green Lake early Thursday morning. They learned that the sheriff and deputy were at the Garland house and that his rig was still there but could get no other information concerning their whereabouts.

From there they went to Camp Comfort, where they found evidence that it had been quitted by its former occupants in a hurry. The three guns belonging to the men were in their racks, there was a general disorder about the camp, on the table was a knife and plug of smoking tobacco, evidently the property of one

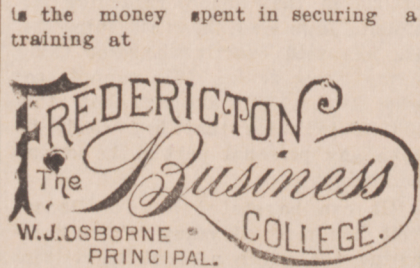
