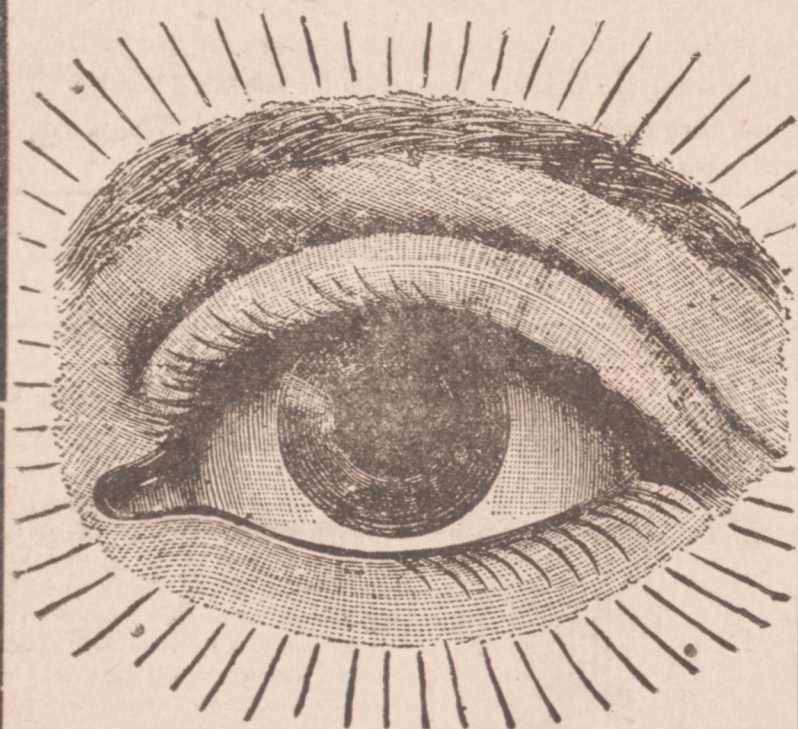

**TALK OF LOCAL HOCKEY BEGINS TO BE HEARD**

Management of Arctic Rink will Give Winter Sport Good Show—Material Available

Already there has been some talk of local hockey and the announcement that Mr. D'Arcy McGrath will manage the Arctic Rink has been received with pleasure by followers of the great winter sport. Manager McGrath has indicated that he will do everything in reason to help along local hockey.

Professional hockey now seems out of the question for Fredericton but it is probable that both Marysville and Fredericton will have senior hockey teams and the U. N. B. hockey team will be in the intercollegiate series.

**MARYSVILLE BUSY**

It is understood that the Marysville Crescents already are getting a line on their players and expected to put a strong team on the ice. The majority of the players they had last winter will again be available and in addition the Crescents have a large number of juniors to draw from.

**FREDERICTON PROSPECTS**

Of the team which wore the Red and White of Fredericton last year the majority of the players are in the city. "Tart" Titus the goalkeeper, Walker and Clynick of the defence, and Rowan, Peeney, Gallo-way and McLean are all here. Archie Sterling who played point is expected to return home shortly and Byron Burden and others will probably also be available.

The make-up of the U. N. B. team is problematical but with few exceptions the men who figured on the Red and Black septette will be out again this winter.

**QUEBEC EXPECTS TO WORK TEAM OUT SHORTLY**

Quebec, Nov. 22.—The Quebec Hockey Executive are hoping for ice so that the team can get to work at once. Every member of the team is expected to report next week. Producers and Marks are looked for tomorrow and Odie Cleghorn will arrive later. Marks, who will be played at the point position, is reported to be a fast and clever defence man, whose signing on with Quebec has created, it is stated, much disappointment in the Toronto club's ranks, who were anxious to sign him. Producers, known as "Goldie," the other new forward for the locals, is spoken of very highly by the London Ontario, press, who state that his absence will be keenly felt in the Ontario Pro. Hockey League.

The annual meeting of the club is to be held on Monday night at the City Hall, where there will be a large gathering of the members of the club, and when final arrangements will be made for the season.

The Naps are weak behind the bat and Davis is eager to get Livingston. The signing of Ben Egan of the Baltimore Easton League Club makes it possible for Mack to let Paddy go.

Montreal, Nov. 24.—Wanderers signed up a new player in Purdy, an American college graduate, who figured on the Tufts College seven in the American College competition.

While his play is not known here, Manager Dickie Boon, of the Wanderers, had no hesitation in signing him up on his reputation.

Purdy is a big husky chap and is a ball player as well as a hockey player. It is possible that if he makes good at hockey he may be placed on the strength of the Montreal Ball Club.

An interesting development of the situation with Wanderers is the fact that Art Ross will likely receive a place on the executive of the club. Arthur is working hard for Wanderers and may possibly become a stockholder of the club.

**RED SOX TO HAVE OWN DIAMOND AT HOT SPRINGS, ARK.**

Hot Springs, Ark., Nov. 23.—Robert McRoy, one of the new owners of the Boston American League Baseball Club, spent the afternoon today in consultation with local contractors and announced tonight that it was practically a sure thing that there would be a second baseball grounds within Majestic Park inclosure next spring, thus giving the Red Sox and Cincinnati Reds each a home of their own.

Heretofore the two teams have practiced on the same diamond. The managers have always kicked, as only half a day's work could be taken, but now each will be able to keep his warriors on the jump morning and afternoon.

Mr. McRoy came to Hot Springs last week and has been working ever since to get the Majestic Park people to see the advantage of building the second diamond. He has Manager Jones' permission to go ahead, saw the contractors today and will receive their bids tomorrow.

Then he and Garry Herrmann will get together, and if the cost of building is not too great, work will be started at once, and the second field put in shape by early spring, so as to be ready for the Red Sox squad on its arrival at the Springs March 10.

Eddie Gerard is slated to play Bruce Ridpath's position on the Ottawa team. The champions' line up is now complete with Currie as spare man.

President Quinn, of the Torontos, still states that his club will play its home games in Boston.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.**

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 40 acres, erect a house worth \$300.00.
