NOTES FROM THE LABOR WORLD

The British government has decided to appoint a board of trade commission, empowered to arbitrate labor disputes.

Labor leaders assert that the fight between the plumbers and the steam fitters has cost the building trades workmen of Chicago \$3,569,000.

At Seattle, Washington, an important alliance has been formed, which embraces farmers, members of the Direct Legislation League and representatives of organized labor.

Seven hundred and fifty-five companies from the United States have built factories in Canada since 1900. Many of these are larger than the original plants in the United States.

The lookout in the building trades of Sweden is gradually drawing to an end through one firm after another deserting the masters' organization and making peace on their own accord.

Great progress has been made during the last year in improving the working conditions of children in the United States, according to the annual report of the national child labor committee.

Carters in the Eastern district of Middlethian, England, have gone on strike and some hundreds of the men are out, the dispute arising over the hours of labor and the recognition of the men's union.

There is a powerful movement in Germany to require all girls, regardless of station, to do compulsory domestic service, just as the young men are required under the law to do compulsory military service.

An increase in wages approximating six per cent., reduced working hours and the sharing of a lump sum of \$75,000 have been granted to the Baltimore and Ohio and the Baltimore and Ohio Southwestern railway's telegraphers.

Indiana union men are going to make an effort to inaugurate a plan that will reduce the cost of living. An effort will be made to arrange for some form of co-operative purchasing that will eliminate the middleman and his exorbitant profits.

In New South Wales and some of the other Australian states the governments are passing bills to assist the working men in erecting homes. The working men can borrow money from the government at a moderate rate of interest, and pay it back in reasonable time like rent.
