SEALED TENDERS addressed to the undersigned and endorsed "Tender for Alba-Baddeck Branch," will be received at this office until six o'clock on Thursday, October 12th, 1911, for the construction of a branch line of railway from a point on the Intercolonial Railway near Alba to the town of Baddeck, a distance of 22.7 miles.

Plans, specifications and form of contract to be entered into may be seen and full information obtained on and after 10th August, 1911, at the office of the Chief Engineer, of the Department of Railways and Canals, Ottawa, and at the office of the Chief Engineer of the Intercolonial Railway at Moncton, N. B.

Parties tendering will be required to accept the fair wages schedule prepared or to be prepared by the Department of Labour, which schedule will form part of the contract.

Contractors are requested to bear in mind that tenders will not be considered, unless made strictly in accordance with the printed forms, and in the case of firms, unless there are attached the actual signature, the nature of the occupation and place of residence of each member of the firm.

An accepted bank cheque for the sum of \$30,000.00, made payable to the order of the Minister of Railways and Canals must accompany each tender, which sum will be forfeited if the party tendering declines entering into contract for the work, at the rates stated in the offer submitted.

The cheque of the successful tenderer will be held as security, or part security, for the due fulfilment of the contract to be entered into.

The lowest or any tender not necessarily accepted.

A DANGEROUS AND
DISLOYAL CAMPAIGN

Montreal, Sept. 11.—If the people of Ontario only realized the nature of the campaign being carried on by Mr. Henri Bourassa and his Nationalist friends there would not be a single vote cast against Sir Wilfrid Laurier in Ontario. Certainly not in the history of Canadian politics has there been such a dangerous and disloyal campaign carried on as the present one by Bourassa.

If Bourassa should obtain office as a result of the present campaign, and then carry into effect the policies which he is now advocating, there would be civil war in Canada within six months. His aims and ideals are anti-Canadian, anti-British and anti-Imperial.

On the other hand, he and his followers plan to set up in this province an independent French state, more French than old France, and more Catholic than Rome itself. His narrowness and bigotry are shown in a hundred ways, not only in a political and national sense, but also in connection with economical and financial matters. For example, he advises his fellow French-Canadians to put their money only in French-Canadian banks, to deal only with French-Canadian wholesale houses, to read only French papers, and in every way possible to build up a united French state on the banks of the St. Lawrence.

This is the type of man with whom the Conservative forces have allied themselves in their effort to defeat Laurier. Mr. Borden is now making a tour of the province, and while he expects to win his way into power by the aid of Bourassa and Monk and the Nationalists, he has not mentioned them in his addresses, nor have they appeared with him on any platform. At the same time, his provincial organizer, Mr. H. B. Ames and other Conservatives are secretly engaged in furthering the cause of the Nationalists by supplying them with literature and the "sinews of war." Mr. Borden has not come out like a man and acknowledged that he hopes to get into power by means of the Nationalists, but in an underhand way his party allies with this traitorous crowd in an effort to defeat Laurier.

Mr. Borden finds himself in a peculiar position in this province. He is playing second fiddle to men whom he disdains to acknowledge as his co-workers. He talks Reciprocity to his audiences, but refrains from mentioning the navy bill. On the other hand, the Nationalists ignore Reciprocity and concentrate their efforts on the navy bill and Laurier's Imperialism.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$100.00.
