

## A MAINE VIEW OF RECIPROCITY

Anti-reciprocity men in New Brunswick are crying out that reciprocity will mean that the farming interests of this province will be at the mercy of Maine and will be ruined. Here is an article contributed to the Bangor Commercial, by a farmer in Parkhurst, Maine—

A short time ago the citizens of Aroostook, in their comfortable homes, surrounded by plenty, were enjoying life and looked toward a happy future. WITHOUT WARNING A CLAP OF THUNDER BROKE OVER THEIR HEADS AND MANY, VERY MANY, OF OUR WORTHY CITIZENS WERE DAZED AND STUNNED. THE THUNDER PROVED TO BE PRESIDENT TAFT'S RECIPROCITY SCHEME AND AROOSTOOK'S ENTERPRISING CITIZENS ARE STILL DAZED AND BLINDED BY THE DARK CLOUD THAT HANGS OVER THE LAND. Today the Garden of Maine is filled with gloom. SHOULD THIS ATROCIOUS BILL become a law Aroostook is doomed. Don't try to tell us to cheer up and look pleasant. WE HAVE CANADA ON THREE SIDES OF US AND KNOW ALL THE CONDITIONS. HUNDREDS OF CANADIANS COME ANNUALLY TO AROOSTOOK. THEY BURN THEIR BRIDGES BEHIND THEM BY SELLING THEIR FARMS AND HOMES FOR A SONG AND BUY LAND IN AROOSTOOK THAT COSTS \$100 PER ACRE. They are thrifty citizens, soon pay for their farms and become independent. In New Brunswick they barely make a living. CANADIAN MERCHANTS THAT CAME HERE TEN YEARS AGO HAVE PROSPERED. SOME OF THEM COULD NOW BUY EVERY STORE ON THE ST. JOHN RIVER BETWEEN GRAND FALLS AND WOODSTOCK. AND STILL IN THE TWO COUNTRIES THAT LIE SIDE BY SIDE, THERE IS THE SAME RICH SOIL UNDER FOOT, THE SAME BLUE SKY OVER HEAD AND THE SAME BREED OF PEOPLE.

Party lines have vanished in Aroostook. There are good Christian people here who would feel like assassinating President Taft and using his body for a fox bait. His policy would give the American farmers eight million people to sell to and THE CANADIAN PEOPLE NINETY MILLIONS, 5,000 OF THE BEST AROOSTOOK FAMILIES WOULD MOVE TO NEW BRUNSWICK AND IN THE COUNTRY AT LARGE TEN MILLION CITIZENS WOULD MAKE HOMES UNDER THE BRITISH FLAG."

## CHINESE WARSHIP VISITS NEW YORK

New York, Sept. 11—A Chinese war vessel, the cruiser Hai Chi made her way into this port, the first sea fighter flying the dragon flag that has ever visited the American coast. Under command of Rear Admiral Chang Pih Kwang, the cruiser, her complement of officers and 450 men came from King George's coronation Naval review and will remain for a week after which visits will be made to Boston, Philadelphia, Newport and Annapolis.

## ELECTORS OF HARVEY HEAR THE TRUTH

Harvey Station, Sept. 7—Rev. J. J. McKaskill and Messrs W. B. Fawcett and Michael Kelly addressed a large meeting in Taylor's Hall last evening in the interest of reciprocity and Dr. Atherton. The speaker did not get here till after nine o'clock, the train being late; but on their arrival the hall was soon filled up quite a number of ladies being present. Mr. Joseph Robinson was elected chairman.

Rev. Caskill occupied about three quarters of an hour giving many reasons why a free exchange of natural products would benefit the Canadian farmer, he pointed out that the Conservative leaders were not very long ago in favor of reciprocity and quoted from an article written by Hon. G. E. Foster last year favoring free trade.

Mr. Foster whom he said was one of the best speakers of his time and the brains of the Conservative party did not think last year that it was disloyal to trade with the United States and had no fear of annexation then, he claimed that the Conservative party were ineffectual in this. He pointed out that the population of the Maritime provinces had not increased nearly so fast as the population of the New England States and that our farmers were not nearly so prosperous as there, which, he said, was due to the lack of good markets for produce, reciprocity would remedy all this.

Mr. Fawcett pointed out that the manufacturers, merchants and middle interests had flourished under protection at the expense of the consumer and that it was time for the farmer to have his turn. The present contest was not so much between the classes and the masses of the people. The U. S. had offered to share their markets with us why not accept. The talk of our markets being flooded with American produce he showed to be absurd. The figures which some of the Tories are using, showing the large amount of farm produce brought into Canada, he pointed out was very misleading as they included corn and cotton and sugar (cane which we need) but cannot produce.

Mr. Kelly the blind orator made a very clever and effective address in dealing with the unholy alliance between the Tories and Bourassa in Quebec he pointed out that wherever a nationalist candidate was reigning the Tories did not nominate a candidate to oppose him, and in the event of the Tory party being successful which he thought was very remote that Bourassa and Monk would be the dominant members of their cabinet. In dealing with the tariff he pointed out that Canada exported to the United States now over a high tariff wall more than one-third more produce than the United States did to Canada over a low tariff wall with reciprocity, Canada would export four times as much produce as she imported he dealt severely with the Solicitor General's statements that Canada would be flooded with cheap Yankee produce he asked why it was that the State of Maine which was free to the rest of the United States was not flooded, but had better markets and their farm values were much higher than ours.

THE PRICE OF HAY  
Canadian hay is still selling in the Boston market for \$23.50 and \$24.50 per ton, while oat straw is quoted at \$8 and \$9. The farmers of York and Sunbury who have hay to sell will know how to cast their ballots on Sept. 21st.

## MORE WAR TALK FROM ACROSS THE WATER

London, Sept. 11—It is reported here that strong drafts of garrison artillery have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness to re-inforce the Mediterranean defence.

Berlin, Sept. 11—At the annual convention of the Pan-German League, in session yesterday, resolutions were unanimously passed protesting against the withdrawal of Germany from her political position in Morocco and against her acceptance of territorial indemnity in the French Congo.

The German imperial chancellor was asked to break off negotiations with France relative to Morocco, rather than settle the dispute on that basis.

The speech of the chairman of the congress was to the effect that acquisition by Germany of Western Morocco, corresponds with the wishes of the German people.

Another resolution adopted, demanded the speedier building of warships.

## LABOR AND RECIPROCITY

At the big Fielding meeting in Halifax on Saturday evening, H. J. Logan in the course of his speech read the following letter from J. G. O'Donoghue, the Solicitor of the Dominion Trades Congress, representing over 200,000 organized Canadian workmen:

Toronto, Aug. 30th 1911.  
H. J. Logan, Esq., K. C., Barrister, etc., Amherst, N. S.

Dear Mr. Logan:  
You ask me where the organized workers stand on the question of Reciprocity? They themselves have already answered that in their annual conventions. They are undoubtedly for it, because it means the removal of a tax that has been imposed upon the whole people for the benefit of the few, and the workers are always against class privileges. As a member of over thirty Boards of Conciliation, I have had a lot to do with the question of the cost of living of the workers, and it is my firm belief that the adoption of Reciprocity pact will mean a cheaper breakfast and dinner table to the workers. That means a couple of dollars a week to the workingman's wife and as she has to "square" the butcher and the baker and the grocer she deserves every consideration. THE TRADES COUNCILS OF WINNIPEG, TORONTO, OTTAWA AND MONTREAL HAVE DECLARED FOR RECIPROCITY. Sincerely yours,
