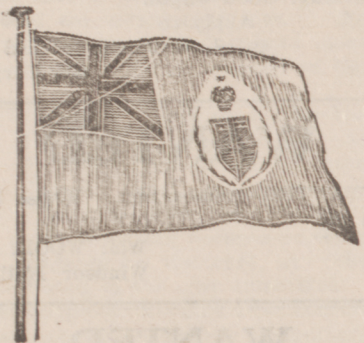

## TONIGHT'S MEETING

Hon. Dr. Pugsley, Canada's minister of Public Works is among the visitors to Fredericton today and will address a meeting of the electors at the Opera House this evening. Hon. Dr. Pugsley is one of the most forceful and talented men this province has ever contributed to the public life of Canada. He is a tireless worker and during his career at Ottawa has stood up for New Brunswick interests first, last, and all the time. He has always been a warm friend of the city of Fredericton. It was in this city that he received his college training and for many years he was a member of the local government and legislature. His friends here are not confined to one side of politics by any means. They admire the man for his great ability and they realize that he has done more for New Brunswick than any man who ever represented this province in the cabinet at Ottawa.

Dr. Pugsley has an abiding faith in the future of New Brunswick and holding as he does a very important portfolio in the cabinet of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, he has done much and will do more to advance the interests of his native province. He has been the target for the coarse abuse and slander of mean, unscrupulous opponents. They have held him up to ridicule and have endeavored by every means known to the political assassin to injure him in the estimation of the public. Their methods were given a crushing rebuke three years ago when the New Brunswick electorate returned Dr. Pugsley with ten supporters and another landslide of even greater force awaits the Tory slanderer on September 21st.

Go to the Opera House tonight and hear Hon. Dr. Pugsley speak in support of Dr. Atherton's candidature in York. He has a message for the people of Fredericton and York County which will be well worthy of serious consideration.

Farmers of York who have doubt as to what course they should pursue in this election should read what Mr. E. C. Drury, president of the Ontario Farmers Association says. Here it is:

"Sir John Macdonald told the farmers of this country that they must be the most contented class in the country, because THEY NEVER ASKED FOR ANYTHING AND THEY NEVER GOT ANYTHING. A year ago they asked for something, and the world sat up and listened, and our government sat up and listened and in response to that demand and that demand only, they have acted in this Reciprocity matter. IF WE DO NOT TAKE THIS NOW WILL ANY GOVERNMENT IN THE FUTURE EVER LISTEN TO ANY DEMAND FROM THE FARMER? This is not a party fight in the usual sense. IT IS A FIGHT ON THE ONE ISSUE RAISED BY THE FARMERS. Will you turn down your own request and place the farmers of this country in a position where they will never ask for anything again?"

Sir William VanHorne spoke at St. John last night in opposition to Reciprocity. As Mr. J. G. O'Donoghue, solicitor of the Trades and Labor Council, says:—"The working-men of Canada should support Reciprocity on account of the enemies it has made."

The unreliable Solicitor General said on the train the other day that he could defeat Carvell in Carleton County. McLean in Queens-Sunbury, in fact he could win in any county where he was known. A smile went round the car at Harry's extreme modesty.

## ENJOYED THE LARGER MARKET

Two good instances of what a good steady market will do is shown in the case of Mr. John McElwain of Temperance Vale and Thomas Prescott of Queensbury, York County. About ten years ago these men with their families went to Caribou, Maine, being induced to do so by reports of the big market awaiting them on that side of the line. McElwain and Prescott after selling out had about \$2000 each in cash. They bought farms and went into potatoes, Hay and grain-growing. Their present financial standing:

McElwain owns a property valued at \$30,000 and refused \$25,000 for it last year. He has an \$800 Steinway piano, an automobile which cost \$1,700. The finest buildings in Aroostook County are his.

Mr. Prescott, who went there two years later than Mr. McElwain bought a farm closer to Caribou two years ago paying \$14,500 for it. He has a piano which cost \$400, five horses worth over \$300 each, binder and an up-to-date outfit of machinery. It is said that Aroostook farms are covered with mortgages. The Mail is authorized by a correspondent to pay \$50 if the Records show a pen against either of these places.

McElwain this year has 63 acres of potatoes. Mr. Prescott 40 acres.

Neither are selling at the present price \$2.00 per bbl. as they expect to get \$2.50 for them. The New York and Michigan crop being short.

These are only two of the instances of York and Carleton farmers who with the big American market behind them did equally as good—Vote for Reciprocity and get the same chance.

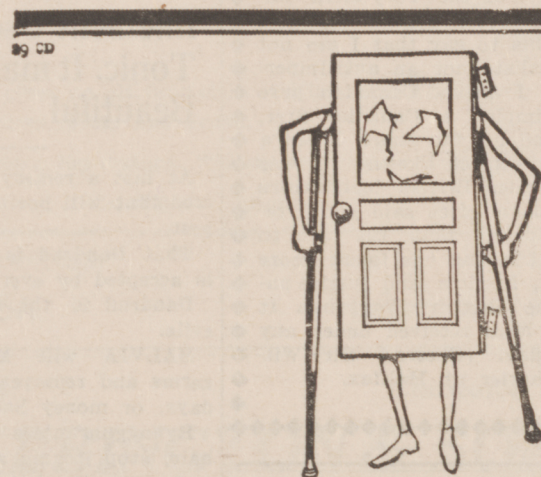

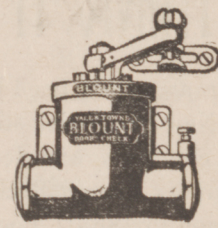
