SUPREME COURT

Court Met this Morning and Adjourned Until Friday 22nd inst.--Large Docket

The Supreme Court met this morning and adjourned until Friday, 22nd inst., all cases on the docket going over until next term. The docket is an extensive one.

On the Motion Paper is the case of The King on the information of J. B. Hawthorn vs E. S. Washington. The defendant was tried before Police Magistrate Marsh for violating a provincial statute regarding the sale of goods on the Sabbath and conviction was obtained. The articles sold were soft drinks and ice cream. Gregory & Winslow acted for the defendant and City Clerk McCready for the prosecution. Mr. J. J. F. Winslow recently appealed the case to Judge Barry, who has referred it to the entire Supreme Court.

DAVID LIPSETT
FOUND DEAD ON
NASONWORTH ROAD

Thought to Have Fallen in Epileptic Fit and Died--Was Taking Load of Barrels Home

David Lipsett, a young man residing in the Parish of New Maryland, on the Nasonworth Road, met his death in a very tragic manner last night, his body, from which the breath had been gone some time, being found upon the highway by neighbors of the deceased. A doctor was summoned from the city at once and on examination found no serious bruises or marks upon the body which would indicate the manner in which he had met his death. It is thought, however, that a severe epileptic fit was the cause of death. No inquest will be held.

The unfortunate young man had driven with a wagon to the farm of Mr. Thomas Moss at Charters Settlement. There he got a load of empty barrels and started for home. The first indication of anything being amiss was the discovery of his team and wagon on the highway some distance from his home. Those who found the horses at once set out on a search for the missing driver. His body was found about a mile farther along the road. The young man had been dead some time.

The deceased was eighteen years of age and a son of Mr. John Lipsett. He was subject to epileptic fits and death was due to that cause.

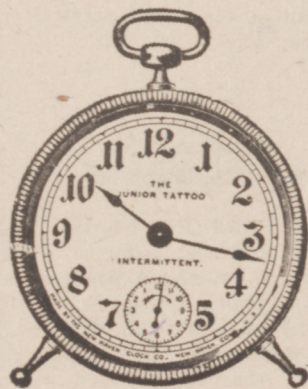

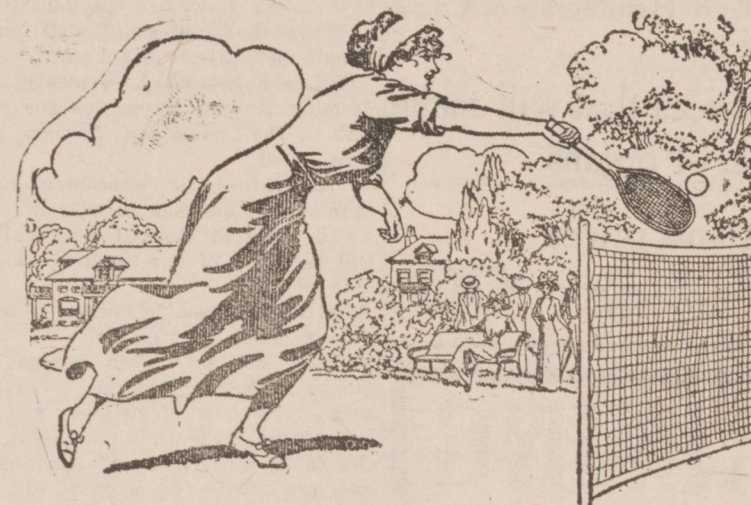

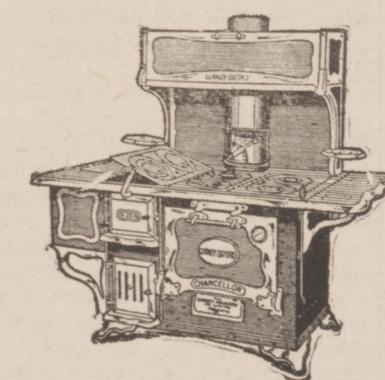
