Big Sale of Timber Lands Located in Quebec and Madawaska County, Has Been Completed

Donald Fraser & Sons, Limited, have purchased the extensive timber property in Madawaska and Quebec, owned by James Murchie's Sons of Calais. Negotiations for the sale of the property have been going on for some time, and today Mr. Donald Fraser of this city, announced that the deal had been closed, and that possession would be taken as soon as the legal formalities are completed. The property consists of a well-equipped saw-mill at Edmundston, and twenty-two square miles of leasehold land in the County of Madawaska. The property in Quebec consists of eighty-five thousand acres of freehold land on Temiscouata Lake and the Madawaska River, and a large tract of leased land on the Cabano River, on which stream the Fraser concern now own and operate a large mill.

TWO CANDIDATES
FILED NOMINATION
PAPERS TODAY

Both Civic Tickets Incomplete—Possible that there will be no Contest in King's Ward

Monday will be the last day on which nominations for the approaching civic elections can be made. This morning City Clerk McCready had filed with him the nomination papers of Ald. Moses Mitchell and Mr. R. T. Baird, both of whom are running on the Good Government ticket in Wellington Ward. The papers of Mr. D. J. Stockford, who has announced his candidature in the same ward, have not yet been filed.

No additional candidates have been brought out on either the Citizens' or Good Government tickets, but it is probable that an additional candidate will be out in Queen's Ward as a running mate to Ald. Osborne. The latter stated today that he would know definitely this evening whether or not the gentleman who had been asked to run with him would consent to be a candidate. In King's Ward Ald. Clark and Ald. Calder are the only candidates in the field at the present time. It is possible that they will be the only candidates nominated in that ward.

MAKES AND OPERATES
WIRELESS INSTRUMENT

Mr. J. E. Hanning, son of Mrs. James Bird of this city, has achieved fame in St. Stephen, where he is an instructor in manual training, as an amateur wireless telegraph operator. The St. Croix Courier has the following:

"J. E. Hanning, the competent instructor in manual training, has fitted up a wireless telegraph station in the school room in the Watson block, and it is well worth inspecting. Mr. Hanning is able to receive messages and frequently hears what is being sent from the Partridge Island and Eastport stations, and from vessels along the coast. The sending apparatus will be added later. Mr. Hanning made all the instruments himself, and they display a lot of skill. It has been learned with regret that Mr. Hanning has developed the western fever and does not expect to remain here after the present term. He has done very excellent work as instructor."

TO BE MADE AT
MAGAGUADAVIC DAM

Prof. Hockin and Inspector Harrison Found Arrangements Satisfactory—Fishway for Green River

The complaint of American sportsmen who have a club-house on Magaguadavic Lake, that the dam of the St. George Pulp & Paper Company at the outlet to the late interferences with the fish, is not likely to result in any action being taken by the Fisheries Department. Prof. Hockin, of Pictou, N.S., who has invented many of the fishways used in the Maritime Provinces, inspected the dam this week. He was accompanied by Fisheries Inspector Harrison of this city. In the opinion of both officials, one of the gates of the dam which is kept open all the time, furnishes sufficient means of ingress and egress for the fish. It was decided however, to extend the flooring of the gate so that it will slope down on the lower side of the dam.

WILL STOCK LAKE.

It is understood that the American sportsmen who have a club-house on Lake Magaguadavic, will stock the lake this season with 25,000 land-locked salmon fry, and also intend to largely increase the membership of the club.

FISHWAY ON GREEN RIVER.

Prof. Hockin and Inspector Harrison also visited the dam which is being built by the town of Edmundston at the falls of Green River, Madawaska County, and a fishway was ordered to be installed in the dam. The latter is well advanced and it is said that electric power will be generated there by August 15th. The dam will have a total height of twenty-seven feet. A large crew of men has been engaged on the erection of the structure.

While at Green River the two officials witnessed an accident which almost proved fatal. A young man belonging to Edmundston, named Morrell, was thrown over the circular saw of the portable mill used to saw lumber for the dam. He had a miraculous escape, the saw merely injuring the toes of one of his feet.
