MONCTON WON EASILY FROM NEW GLASGOW

New Glasgow, Jan. 30.—A decisive victory for the Moncton professional hockey team was gained over New Glasgow in a game here tonight by better team work in the last half of the game, Moncton winning by 12 to 6.

Moncton clearly outplayed the local team during the last fifteen minutes of the game, when Moncton scored at her leisure. Had it not been for the fast skating of Williams, breaking the combination of Doran, Scott and Nichols, the score would have been much larger. The result was a big disappointment to the eight hundred persons at the game.

Nichols the new man for Moncton, did not skow up until the last ten minutes of the game, when he, with Scott and Doran, gave an exhibition of the fastest combination work ever seen in New Glasgow. Scott was in fine form and trailing the puck for every second of the game. Doran gave a splendid exhibition of one-handed stick handling, which was indeed pretty work.
