## THE SCOTLESS CABINET

Somebody has been making a count of the new cabinet and finds that four of its members are Roman Catholics, seven of the Church of England and six Methodists. The discoverer, writing in La Croix, complains that the Catholic representation falls a long way below the population ratio, Roman Catholics being about forty per cent. of the general population. As The Montreal Herald points out, what will occur to most people as much more remarkable is the total absence of Presbyterians. Not one in the seventeen, and only one of them claiming to be of Scottish descent. Here is some change from the days when the parties were both officered by Scottish Canadians, when Sir John and Sandfield Macdonald, Sir A. T. Galt, John Hillyard Cameron and Matthew Crooks Cameron, stood over against the Browns, McKenzies and Mowats. The Whitney cabinet in Toronto is almost equally devoid of the Scottish element. There wasn't much of it left in the Laurier cabinet. And, look at the thing any way one pleases, it is a great pity to see this virile, long-headed, prudent, forceful race apparently dropping out of its own accord.

It is not altogether surprising that the Scottish element should be lacking, and the Church of England element strong, in a Conservative, say a Tory, cabinet. Scotland, it must be remembered, has been Liberal for a very long time, and the Scots who came over brought their political preferences with them. It was their mentality which supplied all the reform movements of other days with the driving power they had. The Liberal party of Canada is not itself if this element has permanently ceased its activities. If the cessation is only temporary then the activity should be renewed at once, or the Scot will be in danger of losing his prestige.

## TORY MEMBER'S VIEWS

Mr. E. B. Osler, a Tory M.P. for one of the Toronto constituencies and a C.P.R. director, in a speech a few days ago, scored Tories of the Crockett type for their lack of patriotism. Mr. Osler, after stating that he had refused the federal portfolio of finance, and that he would not take Lord Strathcona's position if it were offered him, added:

"When I was asked to go to Ottawa to meet Mr. Borden after the elections I was never more humiliated as a Conservative in my life. There was hardly a Conservative member who didn't rush in to him and say he had got to have a cabinet position. It placed Mr. Borden in a serious predicament. He had only got sixteen places and two hundred men were waiting them. If a Grit comes over and is straight about it, I will take him," said Mr. Osler. "We Tories better make no mistake about this. The victory of September 21 was no victory for the Conservative party of Canada. It was a victory absolutely for Canadians irrespective of party. Had it not been for the strength and personal magnetism of Sir Wilfrid Laurier the Liberals would not have got one seat in Ontario. Sir Wilfrid Laurier is a Canadian of great magnitude and outstanding position. His only weakness was that he lost control of the other ministers and almost every member of his cabinet began to scheme on his own account."

If Mr. O.S. Crockett held membership in some of the fraternal societies which gave him such a generous support at the recent election and lived up to their principles, perhaps he would not have displayed such feverish haste in appointing a new postmaster for St. Mary's.

## STRONG FOR RECIPROCITY

Saskatchewan is the banner Liberal province of Canada with Alberta, a good second. In the first named province Laurier and his policy of larger markets was endorsed at the recent election in nine constituencies by overwhelming majorities as the following figures show:

In a speech at Lachine on Friday, Hon. F. D. Monk, The Montreal Witness says, assured his constituents that during the whole course of the time devoted to forming a cabinet, the Hon. Mr. Borden had shown every desire to please the province of Quebec. In spite of assertions that he would not consider Quebec, because his greatest support had come from Ontario, he had called three, Nentel, Pelletier and himself, to high honors. He himself had received what was probably the most important portfolio in the cabinet. What do the flag-flapping Tories of York think about it anyway?

Mr. O. S. Crockett in his newspaper complains because the customs receipts during the last year of Liberal rule were more than three times greater than the amount collected by the Tories during their last year of office. The fact that Mr. Crockett opposed a policy at the recent election which if carried out would have meant the remission of three million dollars of taxation is pretty good evidence that his complaint does not bear the stamp of sincerity. If he really does wish to give the taxpayers some relief let him rise in his place in Parliament at the approaching session and urge a reduction in the customs tariff.

Yesterday was the last day for filing election protests and by agreement between the parties no petitions will be filed against the members returned for New Brunswick. It is scarcely likely that there will be any complaint from the rank and file because of this arrangement. The people have had enough of politics to last them for a time.

It is now stated that no appeal will be taken from the decision of Judge Wilson in the Sunbury Queens election case. Those who had money staked on the Tory candidate, and withheld payment pending the outcome of the legal proceedings will now have to pay up and look pleasant.

It is said in view of the fact that a general local election will have to be held within a year the Liberals will offer no opposition to the return of local government candidates in Charlotte, Sunbury and St. John counties.

## WIRELESS MESSAGE

## SAVED CREW

London, Oct. 31.—Development of wireless telegraphy for maritime uses is shown by the following Marconi telegram received from the steam yacht Sapphire off Banco:

"Nine of the crew of the steamer Ravenshough bound from Glasgow to Riga were picked up by us at 8.45 a. m. in Barra Sound, outer Hebrides, the ship is supposed to have foundered off Skerryvore early on Sunday morning. It is feared ten men have been drowned."

This message from the Atlantic is probably the first by wireless of the foundering of a ship at sea, and the rescue of a portion of a crew.

## SIR DONALD MANN GOES UNDER KNIFE

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 1.—Sir Donald Mann's condition is very satisfactory. The doctors are very well pleased with his progress.

Toronto, Nov. 1.—Sir Donald Mann who was taken ill in Montreal on Thursday and hurried home in his private car, underwent an operation at his home "Falling Brook," this morning for gall stones. He is still under the effect of an anæsthetic and his condition is reported to be critical.

At first it was thought he was suffering from acute indigestion, but his trouble was diagnosed yesterday and an immediate operation decided upon.

This was the statement given out at noon by Sir Donald Mann's secretary. Sir William MacKenzie, who left on Saturday night for Winnipeg, had not returned when operation was performed but Third Vice-president D. B. Hanna was present at the time.

It is expected that Sir Donald will be back at his duties in the Canadian Northern Railway in two weeks time.

## HON. CLIFFORD SIFTON HAD CLOSE CALL

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—A narrow escape from being run down by a C.P.R. Prescott train was experienced yesterday by several participants of the Ottawa Hunt Club, while giving chase to two foxes along the railway track which passes through the course. The huntsmen barely escaped in time while two of the dogs and one of the foxes, who seemingly became bewildered, were run over and crushed and mangled to death.

Included in the party was Hon. Clifford Sifton. He was slightly in advance of the others, seemingly was not apprised of the danger and it at once became apparent that he must be instantly given the alarm or else the train would be upon him. Dr. Webster was the first to reach his side and the two left the track only a few instants before the train sped by.

Blind River, Ont., Nov. 1.—The mills of the White Pine Lumber Co., at Blind River, owned and operated by the J. W. Wells Lumber Company of Menominee, Mich., were destroyed by fire yesterday. The loss is estimated at \$125,000, insurance, \$90,000.

## THE STOCK MARKET TAKES ON A BUOYANT TONE

New York, Nov. 1.—The opening was active and strong on exceedingly favorable quarterly statement published by U.S. Steel after Tuesday's close, and on the confidence based on Attorney General's favorable attitude that the American Tobacco plan be carried through in substantially its present form. U.S. Steel was a strong feature. The sales of Union Pacific were simultaneously at 164½ and 165½ at the opening, the latter representing an advance of 1. Traders were bearing on stock and according to close observers the short interest seems to be growing instead of diminishing.

An over-night gain of ½ was shown in Smelters and one large house advised its customers that the stock appeared to be oversold.

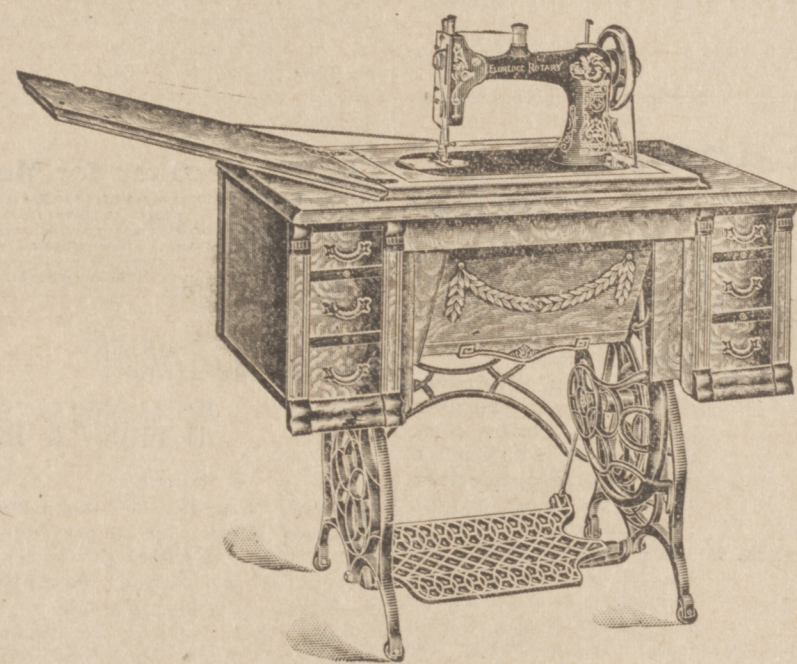
