SHARP FIGHTING IN CHINA

(Continued from page 1)

The Americans will hold a meeting at the legation tomorrow to decide upon definite measures for their own protection. Foreign troops are guarding the mission houses in Peking. The native press received the reform edicts favorably.

REFORMERS DIVIDED

The reformers in Peking are divided into two parties, the extremists, mainly southerners, who insist upon the expulsion of the Manchus, and the moderates who are numerous throughout the empire. The latter are indifferent as to whether the dynasty is Manchu or Chinese, but they want great administrative changes and believe that drastic measures are necessary to give the reform a fair start. The vital question is whether two wings will be able to unite.

It is reported that the garrisons at Tse-Nau-Fu, Chancung, Pao-Ting-Fu and Tschow have declared in favor of the revolutionists and that Kai-Feng is expected to revolt shortly. A revolt at Pao-Ting-Fu would be of great importance, as it would result in cutting Yin Tehang's communications completely. A despatch from that place says that the sixth division has marched out, that the women and children are leaving, but the city is peaceful. General Yin Tehang has sent back home all the Honan troops suspected of disloyalty. His army at Sin Yang Chau is deploredly provisioned, one division being without food for two days. All the government grain has been commandeered and the cattle and other animals seized.

The Chinese army is far from satisfied with the extent of the concessions made by the throne yesterday. The troops, so that in addition to those in the immediate neighborhood of disaffection had spread among the Peking who forced the crisis by backing up the demands of the national assembly large bodies of soldiers in other provinces have given their adherence to the twelve demands of the troops at Tuan Chow. These troops number no less than 15,000 men in Cheng Tang province and 4,000 troops in Paoting.

PEKING HEARS OF REBEL'S SUCCESS

Peking, Oct. 31—It is reported on good authority that the rebels have recaptured the Hankow railway station. This is in line with rumors from the south of continued desperate fighting in the vicinity of Hankow, which according to the official advice of last week, was wholly in the possession of the imperialists, who also controlled the railway and were preparing to move on Han-Yang.

WANT SCULLY'S GROVE BOUGHT BY CITY FOR PUBLIC PLAYGROUND

Yesterday afternoon the Ministerial Association held its annual meeting in the Y. M. C. A. with Vice-President, Rev. J. C. Berrie in the chair. The officers for the year are, Rev. Neil McLaughlin, President; Rev. W. H. Jenkins, Vice-President and Rev. J. E. Wilson, Secretary.

The programme committee consists of Rev. Dr. Smith, Very Rev. Dean Schofield and the President. Rev. Neil McLaughlin reporting for the committee appointed in reference to a District Nurse stated that the committee had met and made an appointment of the amounts (the several churches would likely be willing to contribute towards the scheme. On motion of Dean Schofield seconded by Rev. J. A. Wilson the Association approved of the purchase of the Scully's Grove property by the city as a resort and play ground and undertakes to prepare circulars and present petitions to the city Council to this end.

Rev. J. H. MacDonald reporting for the Ne Temere Committee decided that in view of the action to be taken by the Evangelical Alliance of Canada it was unnecessary to present a resolution.

Rev. J. J. Colter strongly urged the work of the Lord's Day Alliance. Rev. Dr. MacDonald spoke of the need of the representatives of the Laymen's Missionary Movement visiting Fredericton. It is understood that Rev. Dr. Smith is conducting correspondence with this object in view.

AT AULD KIRK TONIGHT

Mrs. E. A. Smith of St John who will lecture in the Auld Kirk this evening arrived in the city this morning. Mrs. Smith who has been heard before in Fredericton is well known as a lecturer. Her subject this evening will be "Historic London" and will be illustrated by a number of beautiful lantern views. The price of admission this evening is twenty-five cents, the proceeds to go to the Korean Fund of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church.

San Francisco, Oct. 31—A despatch reporting the recapture of Hankow by the rebels was received here today from Shanghai by the Chinese Free Press.

According to the message the rebel army from Han Yen moved against the imperial forces and surrounded the city, necessitating them to withdraw after capturing two regiments. Four field cannon were among the spoil of the fight.

San Francisco, Oct. 31—Two hundred and forty Chinese members of a crew of a passenger ship plying between this city and oriental ports, voluntarily had their queues shaved off here today as an expression of their opposition to the Manchu regime.

Amoy, China, Nov. 1—Planters here are taking advantage of the confusion arising from revolutionary activities and are rising an unprecedented crop of opium in defiance of the prohibitory laws. It appears likely that the authorities will be powerless to mete out punishment for some time to come, and as a result, the price of opium on the local market has fallen suddenly from \$5,500 to \$4,000 per chest.

Peking, Nov. 1—Yuan Shi Kai has been appointed premier of China, and he will organize a new cabinet as soon as he assumes his post.

Meanwhile, Prince Ching whom Yuan Shi Kai succeeds, will continue his duties as acting premier and have as associates premiers Na Tung and Hsu Shih Chang, who up to the present, have been vice-presidents of the cabinet. Prince Ching has been made president of the privy council and Na Tung vice-presidents. Wei Kuang Tao formerly vice-roy of Kwang Tung, provinces, becomes vice-roy of Hu Peh and Hu Nan provinces to which office Yuan Shi Kai was elevated, when he was recently recalled from official banishment to restore the imperial authority in the southern provinces.

On the redistribution of offices, the minister of Tai Yen Yen Tchang, was in supreme command of the imperial troops until he was superseded by Yuan Shi Kai, is made chief of the general staff.

This much of the program has been constructed by the throne on hope of appeasing the rebellious Chinese and was made effective by an imperial edict promulgated. Earlier in the day a telegram had been received from Yuan Shi Kai in which he asked that he be appointed acting premier and set for his immediate plans for restoring peace. He proposed he said, to stop the progressive movement of the imperial troops and to open negotiations with the rebel leader General Li Yuan Heng forthwith.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND MAY HAVE ELECTION

Charlottetown, P.E.I., Oct. 31.—The peculiar situation now exists in Prince Edward Island of a government which for some months has stood with parties in the legislature fourteen to fourteen, so that of the House were to be called and the speaker in the chair a Conservative opposition would be fourteen and the government supporters would number thirteen. Further, the premier, who is attorney general, has no seat in the House, and has not had a seat for eight months. On November 11 two by-elections will take place to fill two vacancies. Premier Palmer will run in Port Augustus, opposed by Dr. Dewar, Conservative, and in Belfast the candidates are F. J. Nash, Liberal, and Prof. James A. McPhail, of Queen's University, Conservative.

The Liberals came into power in Prince Edward Island in 1891.

Mr. Palmer became attorney general and premier eight months ago. His seat has since been vacant. Now he seeks re-election in Port Augustus, and there is also to be an election in Belfast, vacated by the appointment of ex-Premier Hazzard to a judgeship.

There is much speculation as to what would happen should Palmer lose his election on November 15. In that event if Nash should win in Belfast, the government would be in a minority. Some of the Liberals say he would hold on till next spring, when a general election would be called before the House is summoned. Palmer could remain attorney general, though, of course, not as a member of the House.

When the old legislative council was abolished it was arranged that the two members for each district should be elected by different franchises, and be called by different names. One is called an "Assembly man," and is elected by what is called a franchise vote, which is practically manhood suffrage. The other representative is called a "councillor" and is chosen by the less numerous electors, who possess real estate. Premier Palmer runs as an "Assembly man."

Ex-Premier Hazzard was elected in Belfast as a "councillor" and that is the seat now vacant there.

WAIST FACTORY MEN MUST STAND TRIAL

New York, Nov. 1.—Isaac Harris and Max Blank, proprietors of the Triangle Waist Co., the fire in whose loft on March 25th last, resulted in the loss of 143 lives, will have to go to trial in the near future, under indictments of manslaughter in the first degree. Judge O'Sullivan in the court of general sessions, has disallowed demurrers to seven indictments against them and their cases will probably be called on Friday.

GUY FAWKES' DAY.

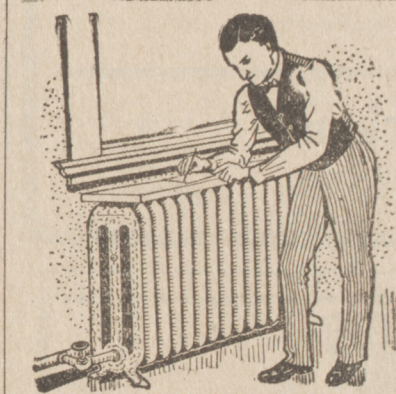

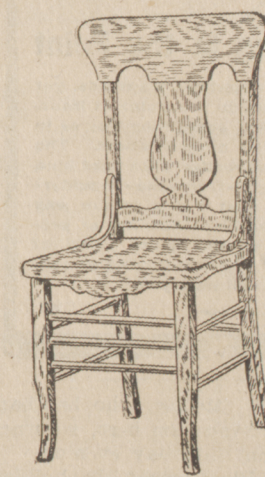
