## MAKING GOOD PROGRESS

Messrs Power and Brewer who have the contract for building a machine shop and round house for the N.T.R. at Napudogan are making splendid progress with the work. The brick laying is nearly completed and the mammoth steel girders are now being placed in position. The buildings which are connected have a total length of 218 feet and are most substantial structures. The round house will have twelve engine stalls and more can be added when needed. The turn-table which was completed some time ago will be operated by air pressure. It is an exact counterpart of the turntables used by the Atchafalaya, Topeka and Kansas system.

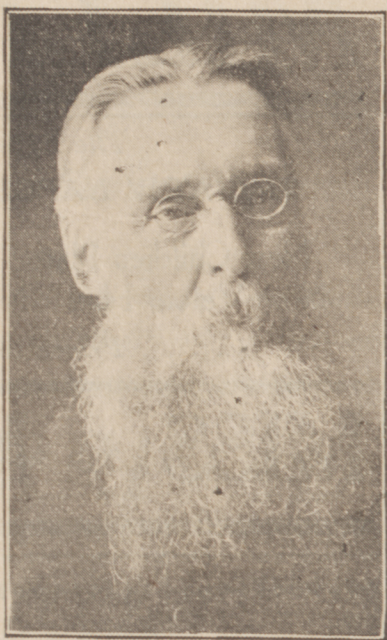

REV. J. C. BERRIE  
HAS MINISTERED 40  
YEARS IN CANADA

Methodist Pastor of Marysville has had Long and Interesting Career in Church

Rev. J. C. Berrie, pastor of the Marysville Methodist Church, yesterday observed the fortieth anniversary of the beginning of his labors as a clergyman in the Maritime Provinces. On October 31st, 1871, Rev. Mr. Berrie came to the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Conference of the Methodist Church, and was assigned to Summerside, P.E.I. He arrived at Charlottetown in the morning and proceeded to drive to Summerside the same evening. The road was muddy and bad and frequently the young clergyman was also obliged to stop and remove gates and other obstacles placed across the highway by boys playing Hallowe'en pranks. Mr. Berrie found Summerside a small hamlet much different from the flourishing town of today.

## MET WITH ACCIDENT.

A few weeks after his arrival, Mr. Berrie was going to take supper with a friend one evening and in driving along the road met with an accident to his leg which necessitated its amputation some months later. This, however, has not prevented him from being one of the most active members of the Methodist Church in the Maritime Provinces.

## MANY IMPORTANT PASTORATES.

Rev. Mr. Berrie had been connected with the church as a local preacher previous to his coming to this country. He was ordained to the ministry almost as soon as he arrived in Canada and has since occupied important stations at Summerside, Souris, Little York, Murray Harbor, and Montague in P. E. Island and Shediac, Jacksonville, Sussex, Millerton, Hillsboro, Fairville, St. Andrews, Woodstock, Gibson and for the past few years has been the popular pastor of the Marysville Church.

Rev. Mr. Berrie has driven over many miles of road during his residence in this country. He states that the horse which he has at present is twenty-five years old and that he has driven it 75,000 miles in that time.

Rev. Mr. Berrie was married at Halifax in 1876 by the late Rev. Dr. Ralph Brecken, to Miss McIntyre, daughter of the Rev. Angus McIntyre, of Edinburgh, the noted Gaelic scholar and writer, who was for a time stationed in Prince Edward Island, and who was a leading divine of the Presbyterian Church.

Mr. and Mrs. Berrie have one son, Mr. Charlton Berrie of Woodstock, and one daughter, wife of Major W. C. Good of Woodstock.

## SAWING SEASON FINISHED.

The saw-mill of Mr. Elwood Burrill at Burrill's Corner, finished sawing today. The mill has been running since January 3rd last and has cut about 6,000,000 feet of lumber during the season. Mr. Burrill intends to begin sawing again about January 15th, after which the mill will run steadily. During the sawing season the mill gave continuous employment to about forty hands. The greater part of the lumber sawed went to the American market. Harry Allen of Burrill's Corner, is now in the woods with a crew for Mr. Burrill and will cut about 500,000 feet, which will be hauled to the mill during the winter. Other crews are also in the woods for Mr. Burrill.

DEFENDANT HAD  
SERVED EIGHTEEN  
MONTHS' SENTENCE

Damaging Evidence in Stewart Divorce Case Before Judge McKeown—Judgment Nov. 29th

The Divorce Court opened this morning before His Honor Judge McKeown. But one case, Flora Etta Stewart vs George Eldridge Stewart was before the court. One witness, the plaintiff was heard and the court adjourned until Wednesday, November 29th when judgment will be given. The case occupied not more than half an hour. Hon. George J. Clark of St. Stephen is proctor. The case was undefended.

## PLAINTIFF'S EVIDENCE

The plaintiff Mrs. Flora Etta Stewart of St. Stephen when examined swore that she and the defendant had been married in St. Stephen in 1896 by Thos. W. Scott a commissioned officer in the Salvation Army and lived together for six years during which time four children were born to them. In 1902 the defendant deserted wife and family going to St. John where he lived about eight months. From St. John he went to Somerville Mass. At present he is a resident of Waltham, Mass. The grounds on which divorce is sued for are desertion and infidelity. The plaintiff swore that in 1908 she had been summoned to Cambridge, Mass., where the defendant was standing trial on the charge of adultery. He had been found guilty and sentenced to eighteen months imprisonment. The other party in the case was Mary H. David of Somerville who is named as co-respondent in the present divorce suit.

NOMINATION  
IN SUNBURY IN  
GREAT DEMAND

Several Tories of Sunbury and York after it—No Protests in Dominion Election Filed Yesterday

Great activity is evidenced among the Conservatives of York and Sunbury on account of the vacancy that exists in the provincial legislature as far as Sunbury County is concerned. There are several members of the party who consider their prominence sufficient to ensure their nomination. Coun. Taylor of Blissville, and Coun. George Perley of Mangerville, both have strong backing and each has the added advantage of being a resident of the constituency, a factor which is of increasing importance as the Conservatives of Sunbury are decidedly opposed to the nomination of a non-resident candidate. Several York County men are after the nomination, however, and are making determined efforts to land it. Among these are Mr. Lewis H. Bliss of St. Mary's, and Mr. P. A. Guthrie and Mr. R. B. Hanson of Fredericton. Mr. Bliss, who is messenger for the St. John River Log Driving Company, has the hearty support of his brother-in-law, Mr. Parker Glasier, M.P.P. The others mentioned have also strong backing and heart-burnings have begun already in connection with the struggle for nomination.

## NO PROTESTS.

As forecasted, no petitions protesting against the election of any of the successful candidates in the recent Dominion election were filed with the Registrar of the Supreme Court yesterday, the last day on which such petitions can be filed. Col. H. H. McLean, Mr. Oscar Ring of St. John, Dr. L. A. Cursey and Mr. R. W. McLellan, representing the Liberals, and Mr. R. B. Hanson and Mr. J. Earle Logan of St. John, representing the Conservatives, were in attendance at the office of the registrar, but neither party filed a petition, although each had three prepared. It is also understood that no appeal is to be made by the Conservatives from the decision of Judge Wilson to allow no recount of ballots in Sunbury—Queens, and it is further probable that in Sunbury, St. John County and Charlotte, where there are seats in the provincial House of Assembly, made vacant by resignation, there will be no opposition to the candidates nominated by the provincial government party.
