Groom Graduate of U.N.B. and Bride Has Relatives Here—Wedding a Romantic One

A Canadian Press despatch announces the marriage in Montreal of Mr. Joseph P. Wood of the Public Works office, Chatham, to Miss Edith Winslow of Chatham. Both are well known in Fredericton where Miss Winslow has relatives. The groom as a graduate of the University of New Brunswick receiving degree in engineering in 1907. Throughout his course he was prominent in athletics and other lines of college activity. The announcement of the marriage comes as a surprise to the many friends of the happy couple in this city.

The despatch is as follows:—Montreal, Q., Sept. 6—A wedding which will be learned of with interest in New Brunswick, particularly as there is associated with it, more than the usual tinge of romance, took place here today, very quietly, when Joseph P. Wood formerly of Moncton was quietly married to Miss Edith Winslow, formerly of Chatham more lately of Calgary, Alberta. Mr. Wood is well known throughout the provinces as former captain of the University of New Brunswick Track Team and all round athlete of more than usual ability and is assistant engineer in the government engineering office at Chatham, N. B., where his bride, a daughter of the late Warren C. Winslow belonged. The course of true love followed in their case, its rather stony course and the engagement of the young couple, known to but a few intimate friends, did not receive parental sanction. Miss Winslow left last spring for Calgary. Yesterday she arrived in Montreal from the far west, enroute home and Mr. Wood arrived on the same day. A few hours later, the pair were quietly wedded last evening for New Brunswick. Miss Winslow this year won the city tennis championship of Calgary, and qualified for the final in the provincial championship.

REVISITS FREDERICTON AFTER FORTY-FOUR YEARS

Mr. George Reed, one of the pioneers of the American West, is revisiting Fredericton after an absence of forty-four years. Mr. Reed is a resident of Eugene, Oregon, where he has been located some years. He is a native of Springfield, York County. Mr. Richard Reed of that place, is his brother. Mrs. Campbell Gordon of Keswick Ridge, and Mrs. John Murch of Queensbury, are sisters. Mr. Reed married Miss Annie Mitchell, daughter of James Mitchell, of Macnaquac. Mrs. Moses Mitchell of this city, is a nephew. Mr. Reed went from New Brunswick to Dakota forty-four years ago and from Dakota went by wagon to the Pacific Coast. In his pioneer days he was in frequent fights with hostile Indians and one of his experiences was a "trek" from Colorado to Wyoming, which occupied thirteen weeks. Mr. Reed took a drive about the city yesterday, accompanied by Mr. Mitchell. Many buildings in the older part of the city were as he remembered them when a young man. Mr. Reed is registered at Windsor Hall.

PHOENIX SQUARE WHARF TO COME BEFORE COUNCIL

The regular meeting of the City Council, which should have taken place last night, did not materialize on account of the absence of a quorum. His Worship today called a special meeting for four o'clock Friday afternoon, at which the council will consider the business set for last night.

The council will be called upon to act on the report of the wharf committee on the application of Mr. A. F. VanWart for permission to build concrete piers on the low water wharf at the rear of his warehouses on Campbell street. Another important matter will be consideration of the proposal of the Dominion Public Works Department with regard to the erection of a concrete wharf at the rear of Phoenix Square. Engineers of the Public Works Department have surveyed for this important work and the city council will be called upon to make the customary arrangements for it.

FIVE COUNTY COUNCILLORS MET DEFEAT AT POLLS

Dr. Sterling Led Poll in Stanley Despite Onset of Conservative Machine—Coun. Fred Pond Defeated in St. Mary's—Eleven New Councillors

The municipal elections in York County were held yesterday, contests taking place in ten parishes, councillors being returned by acclamation in the other five. Eleven new councillors will take their seats in the council chamber in the Court House in January. Several members of the present council were not candidates in yesterday's election and others were defeated at the polls.

Coun. Fred Pond in St. Mary's, Coun. Patrick Graham in Southampt. Coun. David M. Carson in Dumfries, Coun. G. C. Grant in Canterbury, and Coun. C. W. Pond in Stanley, were all defeated at the polls.

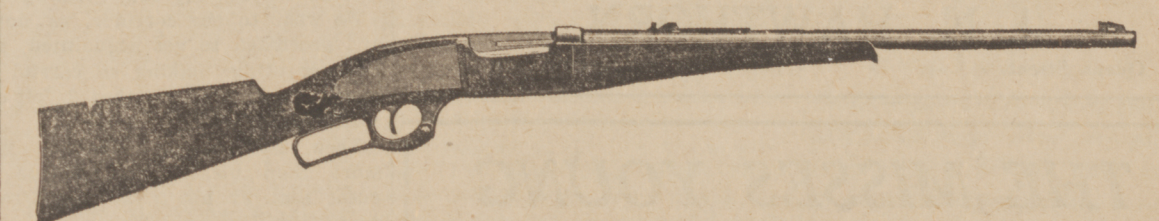
