MADAME LABODIE AT THE OPERA HOUSE

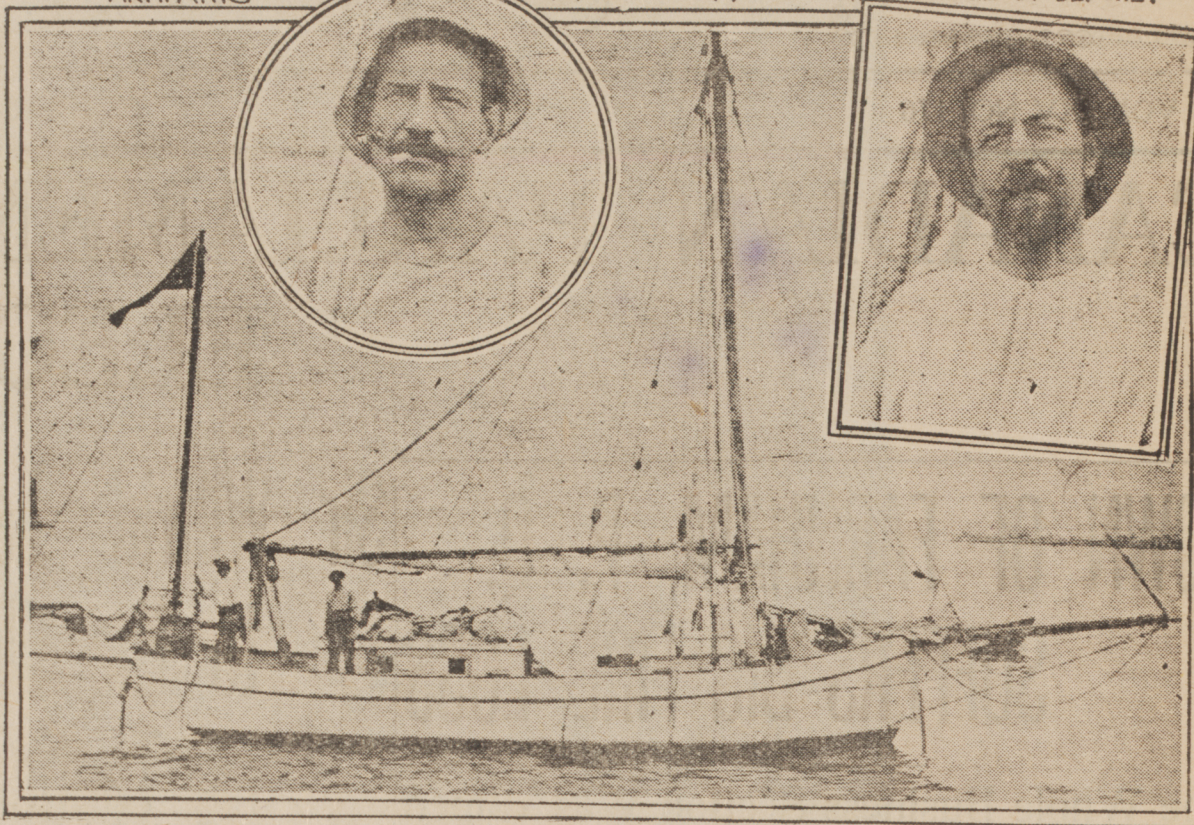
Madame Harriet Labadie, who will give a dramatic interpretation of "Goosip" at the Opera House on Aug. 7th, under the auspices and for the benefit of the Ministering Circle of King's Daughters, is a woman of many gifts and an artist of no ordinary attainments. In addition to a refined and attractive stage presence, and a most magnetic personality, she has a wonderfully appealing voice of as great volume as sweetness. She is rich in having so excellent a vehicle for the surging emotions of the humanity she depicts, and through her tour of the country economies of praise have been showered upon this possession of hers. In a review of her work one enthusiastic critic writes:

"Mme. Labadie is not a reader, she is not an actor. She is an interpreter—that rare thing, an intellectual interpreter, waving an imperial hand over all subordinate and concomitants and servitors to the author. She absorbs the drama and the author, and most of all she makes her audience absorb after her. She deliciously uses her audience up. They are glad of a pause to recuperate, but eagerly eager to begin again and when she is through they are glad that they came, that it is over and would like to begin again tomorrow. She stimulates to exhaustion; and yet it is the healthiest stimulation because it is in the highest degree intellectual and fascinating. The final sense is of intellectual and ethical stimulation of a kind than which nothing is more needed. Last night's audience came nearer to her every minute, enthralled more and more. There was not a fixed pose or emphasis. No effect dependent upon any atom of observant art. Transitions were not observed because there were no mental or emotional breaks. And no, setting was misused because none was needed; anything of that order would have been a superfluity. It was a remarkable, intellectual and ethical dramatic interpretation."
